2. LAKE BURLEY GRIFFIN CARNIVAL

The inaugural Canberra 20 Mile walk was held on the Queen's Birthday Long Weekend in June 1967. On that occasion, there were 14 finishers in what was an inauspicious start. Very quickly a carnival built up around the 20 MileWalk and other events were added. The carnival was backed by the Australian Federation of Race Walking Clubs (trading as Racewalking Australia) and quickly became its major yearly event.

In the second year, further events were added:

Sub Junior & Senior Men 6 Miles
Sub Junior, Junior and Senior women 2 Miles
Under 14 ¾ Mile

In 1970, the Harry Campbell Teams event was added for the 20 Miles walk.

In 1971, the Under 14 event was increased to 1 Mile and an Under 9 880 yards was introduced.

In 1974, the Under 12 1 Mile walk was introduced.

In 1975, The Under 14 age group was changed to Under 15 (but still over the 1 mile distance) and Veterans Teams contested the 20 mile for the first time.

In 1978, most events were converted to their metric equivalents. The one exception was the blue riband 20 Mile event which was left untouched.

In 1981, a Women's 10 Miles Invitation walk was added, attracting 10 entrants. The U9 800m was changed to an U9 1km Walk.

In 1983, the distances for the younger age groups were increased, in line with trends elsewhere in the walking community.

In 1997, The Under 15 events were changed from 2km to 3km and a new race, the Under 17 Boys 5km, was introduced.

By the early eighties the carnival boasted over 200 walkers and by 1987, it had grown to over 300. The all-time record of 420 entries (from just over 300 competitors) was set in 2010.

Throughout the carnival's history, 20 Mile event remained the central showpiece and regularly attracted between 30 and 50 walkers each year. The tough hilly course challenged the walkers, both topline and club standard, and the cream of Australia's walkers have strived to win this prestigious event year after year. Even now it remains one of the most highly sought prizes in the Australian racewalking calendar.

Over the years, a number of women have conquered this demanding course and the best of them is Regan Lamble whose time of 2:32:17, set in 2012, sets a daunting standard.

For many years, Willi Sawall was the undisputed king of the Canberra 20 miles. His race record of 2:16:48, set in 1980, withstood all attacks until 2007 when Jared Tallent finally beat it with 2:15:43. In fact, he held the two fastest times overall until Jared's fantastic walk. This, combined with his 8 wins and 2 second placings, put him at the top of the pedestal. Those of us who were privileged to see Willi at his peak are not surprised at this.

But with his 2014 win, Jared Tallent bettered Willi's enviable record of 8 wins and he now has six of the top 12 times ever recorded on this daunting 20 mile course as well as the overall course record of 2:15:43.

The 51st edition of the Lake Burley Griffin Carnival in 2017 saw the event move away from Lake Burley Griffin in favour of the Stromlo Forest Park. This was a tough decision for ACTRWC but had been forced upon them by the ever increasing demands of the ACT council. The iconic 10 Miles course around the Lake now had too much motor, cycle and foot traffic to contend with. For 2017, the 10M and 20M would be contested on a 1km loop at Stromlo.

The following year saw the 20 Mile and 10 Mile walks change to 30km and 15km walks.

LBG CARNIVAL – 30KM MEN INDIVIDUAL WINNER PETER WADDELL TROPHY

The Peter Waddell Trophy was named in memory of Peter Waddell who died in Dec 2002 after serving RWA as President for 30 years (1973 – 2002) and was awarded to the winner of the Lake Burley Griffin 20 Miles Walk. It is now awarded to the winner of the 30km walk.

Peter was also one of the driving forces behind the LBG Carnival so it is only fitting that the premier event at that carnival should be named after him.

LBG CARNIVAL – 30KM WINNING TEAM 1970 H. C. CAMPBELL SHIELD

Harry Campbell of NSW served the sport of racewalking both as a competitor and later as an administrator from 1924 till his death in December 1963. He was a regular attendee at all walking events throughout Australia and, when a teams event was added to the AFRWC 20 mile event in 1970, it was fittingly named in memory of him.

In 2018, the distance was changed from 20 Miles to 30km. The Shield is now contested against this new standard.

LBG CARNIVAL – 30KM MASTERS WINNING TEAM 1975 - DUNCAN KNOX TROPHY

This LBG Carnival perpetual trophy, called the *LBG Veterans Teams Trophy*, was donated by the SAWC and the Veterans Club of SA and first awarded in 1975. It is a beautiful silver ice bucket, which is now kept in the VRWC trophy cabinet at the club headquarters at Middle Park.



In 2008, the trophy was renamed to recognise the contribution of Duncan Knox who, at that time, had 28 finishes to his name in the 20 Mile event and had been a huge supporter of Federation events over the previous 35 years. This was seen as a fitting recognition for a consummate Team athlete.

A newly labelled perpetual shield is now used to recognise the winning masters team in the LBG 20 Miles / 30km walk.

Claire Woods has had a stellar career which includes 2 Olympics, 5 IAAF World Cups, 3 IAAF World Championships, 2 Commonwealth Games (where she got silver) and 1 World University Games. Her 20km time of 1:28:53 put her second only to Jane Saville in our all time rankings and she holds the Australian 50km record with 4:09:33, a performance which won bronze in the 2018 World Cup. She is also a multiple winner of the LBG Women's 10 Mile and 5km walks and a great supporter of Australian racewalking.

This trophy is currently badged as the Lake Burley Griffin Trophy and will be rebadged when it is to be replaced.

The LBG Carnival was first held in 1967. Although the main event was a 20 Mile for men, other events were included and amongst them was a 2 mile for women. The first few editions of the women's event saw small fields but within a few years, the carnival as we now know it had gathered Australia wide support and the 2 Mile walk for women was attracting large fields (in 1971, there were 24 starters). The women's events have for many years now seen the largest fields in the Carnival and the competitive nature of these events remains high.

Right from the start, the 2 Mile for Women included the divisions of Senior, Junior and Sub-Junior. On many occasions, it was one of the younger walkers who won the event overall and this leads to the current situation where the names on the Open Women's Trophy show the first Senior woman to finish. The Open Winners in each case are shown with an * next to the name.

LBG CARNIVAL – 3KM U16 BOYS INDIVIDUAL WINNER SIMON BAKER TROPHY

Simon Baker became our first World Racewalking Cup winner when he won the 50km event in Barcelona in 1989. He took second in the 50km event in the 1991 World Cup in San Jose, showing that it was no fluke. A 1986 Commonwealth Games gold medallist, he represented Australia in a record 4 Olympics as well as 4 IAAF World Championships and 6 World Cups. One of our most prolific walkers ever, as well as one of our best.

LBG CARNIVAL – 2KM U12 BOYS INDIVIDUAL WINNER BOB GARDINER TROPHY

The consummate competitor, Bob Gardiner won Australian Championships and big races at all distances from 2 Miles to 50km, in a career dating from the late 1950s until his international retirement in 1972. Selected in 3 Olympics (1964, 1968 and 1972), the 1970 Commonwealth Games, and a variety of international matches, his career highlights included 5th in the 1964 Olympic 50km and 2nd in the 1970 Commonwealth Games 20 Miles. Holder of the National Road and Track 50km records, he also won 5 Australian Track walk titles in a row and was one of the few competitors to hold the Australian 2 Mile Track, 20km road and 50km road titles at the same time. He has never retired, continuing to race even now. He has been a great supporter of all Federation events and still makes the occasional trip to LBG to watch the newer generations of young walkers.

3. SECOND FEDERATION TROPHIES

Late in 1921, Laurie Drake (NSW Walking Club) and Frank O'Rourke (VRWC) decided to instigate an Interstate race between the Victorian and New South Wales Walking Clubs. This marked the start of the Glover Shield, first contested in 1923 over a distance of 7 Miles.

In 1930, a second Interstate race was instituted, called the Alexander Cup and contested over the 50km distance.

The Glover Shield and the Alexander Cup rotated on a yearly basis from then on.

The Australian Federation of Amateur Walking Clubs was formed in 1958 in the aftermath of the 1956 Olympics. The sport was now firmly established in the various States and the need for a National body had become apparent. The 4 walking clubs that initially formed this Federation were VAWC, NSWAWC, SAAWC and QLDAWC. In 1964, WA joined the Federation and the membership now covered 5 of the Australian States.

Two alternating yearly carnivals were soon set up with additional races on offer for women and underage walkers. The first carnival, held in even years, would see the Robinson and Glover Shields and the Lorna Carrington Cup. The second carnival, held in odd years, would see the Alexander Cup, the Jubilee Shield and the Lorna Carrington Cup. Each carnival would be held in the May School Holidays.

In 1972, the Knight Trophy was added to the Federation Carnival schedule for Under 14 Girls and was contested over 3 km. In 1974, the Goble Trophy was added for Under 14 Boys, also over 3km.

In 1979, this Federation Carnival was moved from May to September, to be held during the Second Term School Holidays. With the LBG Carnival in June, it was felt that the two carnivals were too close in time.

This carnival is now called The Second Federation Carnival (LBG is now called The First Federation Carnival) and continues in its current timeslot at the end of the winter season.

Note that all Perpetual Trophies at the Second Federation Carnival are for winning teams. There are now perpetual trophies for the individual event winners.

The following pages discuss the Federation Trophies associated with that carnival.

**SECOND FEDERATION – 20KM OPEN MEN WINNING TEAM
1923 – GLOVER SHIELD**



This was the first Interstate walking event regularly conducted in Australia. It started as a 3-way interstate match over a 7 mile distance between NSW, Victoria and SA in 1923, long before any official Australian roadwalking championships. It became the defacto Australian Walking Championship and was keenly contested by the walking clubs.

The trophy was donated by Mr T. Glover and Son on 14 July 1923 and is still in use today. During the last 80 years, it has undergone many changes but still remains a relevant and highly coveted teams race.

Nine 'Australian 7 Mile Championships' were held between the years of 1923 and 1937.

The 2023 Winter Roadwalking Championships were not held, having been decommissioned by Athletics Australia. A.A. offered two alternatives – hold the Australian Roadwalk Championships either in conjunction with the Fawkner Park meet in Melbourne in December or the Australian 20km Championship meet in February. The racewalk community did not endorse either option, but A.A. went ahead and scheduled the Australian Roadwalk Championships for February 2024 in Adelaide. Unsurprisingly, there were few competitors in the underage events and the carnival did not include any RWA component.

The original shield was eventually filled again, and was officially replaced with a new more modern and simpler design. The original shield is held by the Victorian Race Walking Club and is proudly displayed in its clubrooms at Middle Park.

This Shield remains the oldest and historically most valuable item of walking history in Australia. We are so lucky that former walking officials had the foresight to institute it and keep it going.

During the last 100 years, it has undergone many changes but still remains a relevant and highly coveted teams race.

Lorna Carrington, 17, gained Australian wide fame when she won the 1929 national/invitation 880 yards walking title in Australian record time (3:53). At the 1930 Australian championships, she reduced this to 3:49. This was to remain an Australian record until March 1951 when another 17 year old, Leslie Cabrera, clocked 3:43 at the Sydney Sports Ground grass track.

When this brilliant athlete died of cancer at age 27 in 1940, she held every Australian record, the 440 yards (1:38.8), 880 yards (3:49), 1 mile (8:55) and 1500m (8:24.2).

The Lorna Carrington Cup was instituted by the Australian Federation of Amateur Walking Clubs in 1958 when they formed. The first edition was held in 1960 and it was held every second year from then on. However, very soon it became an annual event and has been contested annually since 1966.

NSWRWC has consistently won this event and has shown itself to be the premier club with regard to women's walking in Australia. It remains the standard on which the other clubs can test themselves.

The Jubilee Shield was added in 1964 when an Under 16 Boys 1 Mile walk was added to the First Federation Carnival. This was changed to an Under 17 2 Miles in 1966 and then to an Under 17 5km in 1971. In 2004, the Age Group was changed to Under 18 and in 2008 the distance was increased from 5km to 10km.

The Jubilee Shield was donated by NSW RWC to mark the 50th anniversary of that club's formation in 1912.

SECOND FEDERATION – 5KM U18 GIRLS WINNING TEAM 1983 - THE JACOBSON TROPHY

Charlie Jacobson was the inaugural Vice President of Racewalking Australia in 1958 and worked alongside the President Alf Robinson for many years on the Executive. SECOND FEDERATION -5KM U16 BOYS WINNING TEAM 1974 - GOBLE TROPHY

This trophy was added in 1974, initially for the U14 Boys 3km walk, and was first contested in 1976. Initially the trophy was contested every second year, but it has been contested annually since 1980. In 1989, the trophy was changed to the U15 Boys 3km. In 2004, the event was changed to the U16 3km and in 2008, it was changed to U16 5km.

The trophy is named after Norm Goble who was the Secretary/Treasurer of AFRWC for a number of years and was also a giant in Victorian racewalking circles, holding the post of Secretary/Treasurer of VAWC from 1952 to 1971. Before that, he was a competitive racewalker who represented Victoria for many years in interstate competition. When he died in 1979, he had accumulated nearly 50 years in the Australian racewalking community.

Claude Knight Memorial Trophy

*Walk on walk on with faith in your heart
and you'll never walk alone*

Below the graphic, the central plaque reads

*PRESENTED BY SAWC AND FRIENDS
IN MEMORY OF OUR MATE
AND CLUB PRESIDENT
1972*

The trophy was named after Claude Knight, the long time President of the SAWC. Claude ran the SA club with great enthusiasm for many years until tragically being stuck by a car in 1971 and killed. As an aside, Claude's son Dean was a top walker in the sixties and early seventies.

The trophy was added to the Second Federation Carnival and first presented in 1972. Initially it was for the winning team in the U14 Girls 3km Walk but is now presented to the winning team in the Under 16 Girls 5km Walk.

In 1981 when he was donating the money to set up the Alf Robinson Memorial Foundation, Mr Harold Brennen also donated a trophy of considerable value (see attached photo) to be competed for on a State team basis during Federation events. This explains the engraving on the trophy itself which reads as follows:

*THE ALF ROBINSON MEMORIAL FOUNDATION
STATE CHAMPIONSHIP
AGGREGATE POINTS TROPHY
Donated by
H. & G. BRENNEN*

A committee of three persons was nominated for setting out the rules and procedures governing the presentation of this trophy – Peter Waddell, Jill Huxley and Marion Patterson. They came up with the following set of rules which award the trophy to the Member Club which scores the most Teams based points in the two main Racewalking Australia carnivals each year.

The Brennen Shield is contested by the number one team from each Member Club in each event. To be allocated Brennen points a team must have three finishers. Total points for each race are determined as follows:

Three points for each financial Member Club of the A.F.O.R.W.C., plus one point will be calculated. The winner of the race receives the total points, second receives two fewer points than the winner, third receives three fewer points, etc.

This prestigious shield remains almost the exclusive property of NSWRWC. Since its inception, they have won it 31 times out of 40. The following table spells it out.

The challenge for all other clubs is to match the ongoing excellence of NSWRWC.

2004 - STATE CHALLENGE SHIELD

This trophy was donated by Tim Erickson when a State Challenge Shield competition was instituted in 2004.

The rules governing the State Challenge are as follows

- The Racewalking Australia State Challenge event is a RWA club-versus-club teams competition with points being awarded within each race to the top finisher for each club.
- Walkers may compete in more than one event on the day provided the events are held at different times. A walker cannot walk in two different age groups in a concurrent race.
- Age is 'age on the day' for all walkers including Masters. Note RWA Masters is 35+.
- Points are allocated as follows: (1 pt for first overall, 2 pts for 2nd, 3 pts for 3rd, 4 pts for 4th and then all others clubs will be awarded 5 pts whether they have entered a competitor in that event or not.
- Once the scores for the individual races has been determined, the overall score for clubs of 40 members or less will be divided by 1.6, the overall score for clubs with 80 members or less will be divided by 1.3 and the overall score of clubs with over 80 members will be divided by 1. Club numbers are based on membership numbers as submitted at the previous RWA AGM.
- The club with the smallest total wins the Challenge.

5. DECOMMISSIONED PERPETUAL TROPHIES

1930 - THE ALEXANDER CUP

This cup was presented to NSW Amateur Walking Club by J. D. Alexander of 93 York Street, Sydney for perpetual competition in the team's section of the 50km Road Walk between Victorian and NSW. It was first awarded in Sydney on Saturday 6th September 1930 with Victoria the winning team. It was then awarded approximately every two years. It was one of two major trophies for which the walking clubs competed. The other was the Glover Shield which was held over the 7 Mile distance. Both were awarded to the winning State team.

For many years, the Alexander Cup and Glover Shield Championship races were considered the unofficial Australian championships until Athletics Australia finally started conducting regular Australian championships in 1948. In the 1960's the Alexander Cup distance was changed from 50 km to 20 km and it continued as a bi-annual Federation 20 km Championship event until its last staging in 1990. It was then retired in favour of the Glover Shield is now contested annually, alternating between the 10 km and 20 km distances.



The Alexander Cup is now on display in the VRWC club's trophy cabinet. It is engraved as follows
