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TIM'S WALKER OF THE WEEK

How's this for some great walking on the local and overseas front by Australians during the last week (in order of date/time)

- **Jess Rothwell** came 6th in the IAAF Challenge Series event in Sesto San Giovanni last Wednesday in an A qualifying time of 1:34:13. It was her first 20km time in nearly 3 years (her last 20km finish was in June 2010 when she race 1:30:53 in La Coruna). It has been a long battle back from injury and operation for Jess and it is a credit to her that she has battled through it.
- Dane Bird-Smith came 3rd in Sesto with his own A qualifying time of 1:23:18. He is now putting together consistently good Open walks and, at age 20, has a big future.
- **Rhydian Cowley** came 6th in Sesto with a B qualifying time of 1:25:45 so now has his name in the mix for possible World Champs selection. It was therefore a breakthrough race of sorts for the 21 year old Victorian.
- **Chris Erickson** won the Victorian 10km roadwalk championship on Saturday with a swift 41:37. In the early stages of his buildup to the Worlds later this year, he showed his training is right on the mark.
- 18 year old **Jesse Osborne** finished second to Chris with 43:41 in the Victorian 10km, not too far outside his PB and also an indication of things to come this winter.
- At the other end of the age spectrum, 66 year old **Andrew Jamieson** walked an extraordinary time of 49:24 in the VRWC 10km race at Middle Park on Saturday. That comes out at an age graded percentage of 99.34%. The only reason it is not an M65 world record is because Andrew already holds it with an even faster time, done a year ago in Melbourne
- 13 year old **Kyle Swan** broke his VRWC U14 club record with his 3km time of 13:58. Kyle continues to improve each year and is always amongst the medallists at the National level in his age group. A young walker with a big future.

Well, it has been a tough ask but I have selected three performances on which we can vote - they are **Jess Rothwell, Dane Bird-Smith** and **Andrew Jamieson**. You can cast your vote as normal at http://www.vrwc.org.au/vrwcWOW.php.

AV AND VRWC ROAD RACES, MIDDLE PARK, SATURDAY 4 MAY 2013

The weather was greatly improved from last Saturday when walkers battled strong winds in our opening round of the winter season. This Saturday at Middle Park, the 100 walkers (what a great number for so early in the season) had a much better time of it - cool, overcast and a much friendlier breeze. We also hosted our first Victorian roadwalk championship for the year and it was exciting to see our top walkers showing us how it is done over the classic 10km. The 10km Victorian Championships took pride of place on the day with **Chris Erickson (ATE)** and **Michelle Laufer (COL)** clear winners. Chris, a dual Olympian, walked an excellent time or 41:37 to finish just over 2 minutes ahead of 18 year old **Jesse Osborne (BOH)** whose time of 43:41 was not too shabby either. Adam Garganis (COL) crossed the line in third spot but had picked up 3 red cards so was subsequently disqualified. That left **Brad Simpson (ANW)** to take the bronze medal in a big PB time of 47:54 ahead of Stuart Kollmorgen (COL) 48:39. For Michelle Laufer, it was a case of carrying on from last winter when she won the Victorian 15km and 20km championships and took silver in the 10km. This year's gold in the opening 10km omens well for the rest of the season. **Sarah Brennan (BYC)** took silver in a PB time of 54:21 and **Heather Carr (EAG)** took bronze with 58:38.

The only reason it wasn't an M65 world record is because he already holds that record with an even faster time of 48:38.5, set last year.

Each year the BRWC hosts the Benita van Raaphorst Memorial 3km in honour of the young Ballarat athlete who was tragically killed in May 2001. Benita was part of the Ballarat Racewalking Club and a competitive racewalker at both a state and national level. This year, it was fitting that Andy Blood, who was a good friend of Benita, took line honours in the 3km race in a solid 15:32. Behind him was Ross Darlow in a quick 15:43, a new U16 M Record. Amy Canavan finished as the fastest female with 17:24, a PB of 48 seconds. The sealed handicap, and the memorial trophy, was won by young Leah Canavan in 21:24. Not to be outdone by her older sister, Leah also did a 48 second PB. Ross Darlow and Amy Canavan took out the minor placings. Many PBs were recorded and Fraser Saunder and Bailey Ohlsen also claimed records in their respective age groups.

COPPA CITTÀ DI SESTO SAN GIOVANNI, SESTO SAN GIOVANNI, ITALY, WEDNESDAY 1 MAY

The latest 2013 IAAF Challenge Series race was held last Wednesday in Sesto San Giovanni in Italy and it held a special interest for us with four Australian walkers in action. Diego Sampaolo reported on the event as follows on the IAAF website (see http://www.iaaf.org/news/report/lashmanova-and-toth-victorious-in-sesto-san-g).

Olympic 20km race walk champion Yelena Lashmanova won unopposed at the Coppa Città di Sesto San Giovanni, the Italian leg of the IAAF Race Walking Challenge, while Matej Toth of the Slovak Republic triumphed in the men's race. Lashmanova, the 20km World record-holder, finished in 1:32:07 to beat Portugal's Ines Henriquez (1:33:06) by almost exactly one minute as Henriques' compatriot Ana Cabecinha was third (1:33:18). After setting a lifetime best of 1:20:14 in his last race, Toth found 1:22:02 enough on this occasion to take the victory, 27 seconds ahead of runner-up Jakub Jelonek from Poland, while Australian Dane Bird-Smith took third place in 1:23:18.

Women's 20km Walk

The Portuguese pair of Henriques and Cabecinha took the early lead with Australian Jessica Rothwell, Spaniard Julia Takacs and Japanese Kumi Otoshi in the first few kilometres, while Lashmanova chose a more conservative tactic and stayed behind the early leaders, although she was always in control. Rothwell led the pack through 5km in 23:45 with Henriques and Cabecinha right behind.

The leaders maintained a conservative pace due to the warm and humid weather, as Henriques went through the half-way mark in 47:11 (1:34 pace). With less than 10km to go, the front group had been whittled down to just five athletes – Henriques, Cabecinha, Lashmanova, Otoshi and young Czech rising star Lucie Pelantova. The race really heated up at 12km when four women – Henriques, Cabecinha, Lashmanova and Otoshi – pulled away from Pelantova. After the quartet passed 15km in 1:10:26, Lashmanova began pushing the pace and broke away with two laps to go.

The 20-year-old Russian, who last year won the IAAF World Cup in Saransk and beat three-time World champion Olga Kanishkina at the Olympic Games with a World record of 1:25:02, increased her pace, opening up a huge gap over Henriques and Cabecinha with the three fastest km splits of the race (4:22 at 17km, 4:15 at 18km and 4:13 at 19km). Her final time of 1:32:07 was a far cry from her World record, but on a day where conditions were not conducive to fast times, Lashmanova's priority was simply to ensure she crossed the line in first place, extending her winning streak to five. "I did not think about the time, the main thing was to win," said a delighted Lashmanova. "I really enjoyed the race. I pushed the pace in the final lap and I realised there that I could take the win."

The Russian national anthem sounded in the Pino Dordoni athletics stadium, perhaps giving a preview of what to expect at this summer's IAAF World Championships at the Luzhniki Stadium in Moscow. "I started walking at the age of 13 in my city Saransk near the Volga River," explained Lashmanova. "My father is a car driver. My elder brother is 23 years old and is married. My boyfriend is also a good athlete. I am grateful to Italy as I won my first major title here, at the 2009 World Youth Championships in Bressanone," she added. "I have great memories of Sudtyrol."

Men's 20km Walk

Matej Toth, Jakub Jelonek, Dane Bird Smith, Yusuke Suzuki from Japan and Rafal Augustyn from Poland formed the leading group who pulled away from the rest of the field in the early stages of the race, passing through 5km in 20:43. Joao Vieira from Portugal, winner in Rio Major this year, led the chasing pack which featured 2011 World bronze medallist Fernando Luiz Lopez, and they passed 5km in 21:02. Toth, Jelonek, Suzuki and Bird-Smith broke away at 9km before reaching the half-way mark in 41:15. With a 4:04 split at 11km, 20-year-old Bird-Smith was dropped as Toth, Suzuki and Jelonek surged ahead.

Toth and Jelonek continued to push the pace and with a 4:02 split at 15km they dropped Suzuki, who finished third in this race last year. With 3km to go Toth maintained his lead, closely followed by Jelonek. Toth finally managed to drop Jelonek on the final lap with a decisive surge and with a strong finish he opened up a gap of more than 20 seconds to romp home in 1:22:02, finishing at the athletics track named after the late 1952 Olympic 50km champion Pino Dordoni.

"For me this race was preparation for the European Cup in Dudince," explained the Slovak winner, who is currently training in the

Italian town of Livigno. "It was an easy race, and when it was down to just me and Jakub I felt good. "Dudince is very important for me as it is near my home town," he added. "I will compete in the 20km at the European Cup, but in Moscow I will take part in the 50km. I started training in January and I'm in good shape – two weeks ago I set a 20km PB in Podebrady. My form is improving step by step."

Bird-Smith and Rothwell walk to A-Qualifiers in Italy

Up and coming race walker **Dane Bird-Smith (Qld)** and Australian Flame **Jess Rothwell (Vic)** smashed the men's and women's IAAF World Championships A-Qualifying times to be the best placed Australians at Coppa Città di Sesto San Giovanni, the Italian leg of the IAAF Race Walking Challenge overnight.

Bird-Smith, who placed third, crossed in 1:23:18 to finish amongst the medals with Matej Toth (SVK, first, 1:22.02) and Jakub Jelonec (POL, third, 1:22:29). Bird-Smith was amongst the lead pack in the early stages, moving through 5km in 21:02. Breaking away in a group of four at the 9km mark, Bird-Smith held on through 11km before dropping off the pace and holding to take third.

Excitingly, **Rhydian Cowley (Vic)** placed 7^{th} overall in 1:25:45 to record his first B-Qualifier for the IAAF World Championships and stake his claim for possible selection.

In the women's race, Rothwell, who is continuing her comeback from serious injury that have hampered her athletics career in recent years, was impressive to finish in 1:34:13. Taking an early lead in a group of five, Rothwell led the race through 5km in 23:45. Falling just back from the leaders through 10km, Rothwell coped well with the humid conditions to cross 6th behind race winner Yelena Lashmanova (RUS, first, 1:32:07).

Unfortunately, Tanya Holliday (SA) was disqualified but I am sure that she will bounce back. Sometimes you have to go for it!

FESTA DELL ATHLETA MEETING, MONDOVI, ITALY, 1 MAY

2008 Olympic bronze medallist Elisa Rigaudo clocked a fantastic 42:29.06 in the women's 10000m walk at the Festa Dell Athleta meet in Mondovi, Italy, earlier this month. Not only was it a big PB (her previous best of 43:06 was set in Saluzzo in August 2008) but she was only 6 seconds outside the Italian all-time best of 42:23.7, set by Ileana Salvador in Fana, Sweden, in 1993. This performance is the eighth best ever in the World all-time list (the best time is 41:56, set by Nadezhda Ryashkina in Seattle in 1994). The race splits indicate the even nature of her race: 4:15-4:11-4:16-4:12-4:16-4:14-4:17-4:18-4:18-4:18.

Rigaudo's next race will be at the European Race Walking Cup later this month in Dudince. What a huge meet that is going to be!

LA RONDE DE DUCS, DIJON, FRANCE, 27-28 APRIL 2013

After a successful first edition in 2012, the Dijon University Club were in action again on the weekend of 27-28 April 2013 with La Ronde des Ducs, a 24 Hur walking race around Lake Kir in Dijon (see http://www.larondedesducs.fr). This year's race was expected to be keenly contested with three French walkers who have walked in excess of 200km in 24 Hours - Philippe Thibaux who was second in the 2012 Paris-Colmar 2012, Philippe Morel who is amongst the favorites for this year's Paris-Colmarand Fabrice Henry who completed 206km a month ago in Château-Thierry. Add into the mix the presence of Russian walker Sergei Lukyanov who was third last year, Eddy Roze who was fourth last year, former French 100km champion Philippe Gilles and Rémi Bonnotte who walked 190km in February in the French championship. Among the women, Claudine Anxionnat was back to defend her title against youngster Deborah Geimer. A 6 Hour event was held concurrently during the last 6 hours of the Ronde on Sunday morning and it also attracted a good field of walkers. And of course, Emmanuel Tardi was there to report on the event. His comments:

Last week end was the last event for walkers to qualify for this year's Paris-Colmar in June. The initial lap was 1.010km followed by laps of 3.666km to enable an accurate 100km split. In the last hour, the lap was reduced to 827m. The main lap around Lake Kir is flat for nearly the whole way, with only 100m of hill to negotiate. If the weather is good, it is a pleasant lap near beaches and woods but this year it was raining hard. In Bourges the walkers had to contend with snow. This time around it was rain with the temperature at event start only 6°C and, at one stage, the event was nearly stopped because of flooding!

Fabrice Henry and Eddy Roze set off at a fast pace, Henry stopping after 40km. That left Roze on front and he passed the 50km mark in just under 5 hours, some 3 minutes ahead of Philippe Morel. He maintained his lead to the 100km mark but then stopped, leaving Morel to take the lead and eventually win the race. In the women's event, Deborah Geimer has produced an huge race effort, winning with over 175km.

SPANISH CLUB CHAMPIONSHIPS, ARANJUEZ, SATURDAY 27 APRIL

The OMarchador blog website (http://omarchador.blogspot.pt/2013/05/diego-garcia-estabelece-recorde.html) reports a new Spanish U18 5000m track record to Madrid's Diego Garcia, done in the first round of the Spanish Club Championships a week ago. Finishing less than one second behind winner Marc Tur (who is only a Junior himself), Garcia's time of 20:05.39 took nearly 30 seconds off the Spanish U18 record, held previously by José Sánchez (2002 - 20:34.3).

With only 3 years of racewalking under his belt, Garcia showed great improvement to beat his previous best of 20:50.01, set last December in Gaudix, Granada. Born in Madrid on 19th January 1996, García has road PBs of 20:50 (5km - Toledo 24/11/2012) and 42.36 (10km -Murcia, 3/3/2013). He is a member of the Spanish U20 men's team that will participate in the European Cup Race Walking in Dudince later this month, alongside Álvaro Martín and Marc Tur. Interestingly, all three athletes have the same coach and Álvaro Martín won the Club Championships race in Pamplona with 20:08.22. Here are the full results from the Aranjuez races

RICK COOK - INTERNATIONAL 50KM WALKER TO INTERNATIONAL ULTRA RUNNER

Congratulations to former Australian 50km walker Rick Cook who is part of the Australian team to contest the World 24 Hour Running Championships in Steenbergen, Holland, on 11-12 May. Rick, born in 1969 and racewalked for Tasmania. He had an excellent career as a junior and made a very quick transition into the senior ranks, taking bronze in the 1991 Australian 50km championship (4:21:44) at only 21 years of age. This gained him selection to represent Australia in the 1991 Racewalking World Cup which was held in San Jose and there, in very hot conditions, he finished 58th in 4:28:15.

After retiring from racewalking, he transitioned to marathons and triathlons and eventually caught the ultra running bug. This is his second Australian vest as an ultra runner. He won the 2011 Coburg 24 Hour run with a big PB of 216.43km, thus gaining selection for the 2012 World Champs in Katowiche, Poland, where he ran a PB distance of 226.833 km for 36th place. This year, we will be keeping our fingers crossed that he can do even better in Steenbergen.

He was interviewed last week on the Australian 24 Hour Team Facebook page (http://www.facebook.com/events/294005377398655/)

1. Rick, how are you feeling about your inclusion in the 2013 WC 24 hour team?

Always excited and proud to be representing my country.

2. Why did you apply for the 24 hour team?

After having a successful run in Poland, I was very keen on trying to better that performance in Holland. Nothing beats running for Australia.

3. What is your best 24 hour distance and where did you achieve it?

My personal best is 226.8kms. I did this at last year's Worlds in Poland.

4. What have you learnt about 24 hour racing that will help you in the Netherlands

Always learning mate. The nutrition side is extremely hard to get right. I understand all the science, but the human body doesn't always follow the rules.

5. How has your preparation been leading into this event?

My preparation has been hampered somewhat with a calf injury, my second one since Xmas! I've been training in the gym for three and a half weeks and only today headed out for a run. I'm very much under done.

6. What events have you recently undertaken and how did your results compare with your expectations?

Well since last year's worlds, I've really done poorly. I've started two races since Xmas and done my calf in both! Before Xmas I raced C2K, but that one was a disaster too. A combination of bad pacing and a lack of conditioning in the quads.

7. What are your goals for this event?

To finish with something respectable. It won't be pretty though and it might not be a flashy number.

8. What is the one thing most likely to ensure your success in The Netherlands?

Having my oldest son and biggest supporter on the crew will ensure that I'll give everything. When that fatigue sets in earlier than it should, I'll just look at his face and dig deeper and deeper.

9. What motivates you to undertake ultra running?

I have always run for the love of the sport and the challenges it presents. Ultra running provides that ultimate challenge. And let's face it, as you get older you get slower, so I'll leave Usain to run the 100 metres!

10. What is the best advice you could give a novice runner aspiring to a 24 hour event?

The best advice I could give anyone, novice or elite, in approaching their first 24 hour run, is to just go out there and enjoy it. That is the approach I took in my first one and it worked.

The British Olympic Team Report read as follows

THE judges who adjudicated in the 50 kilometres walking event also officiated here, but they failed to show the same strictness as in the longer race and the standard of walking was certainly far from that expected in an Olympic contest. Twenty-one started in this new Olympic event, which took place in very much cooler conditions than those experienced by the longer distance walkers.

Oakley, of Canada, led going out of the stadium for the first of the 2,000 metres laps; but it was no surprise when he was disqualified. At five kilometres, Dolezal, of Czechoslovakia, was a foot ahead of Coleman and Vickers. of Great Britain, with the Swedish pair, Ljunggren and Hindmar, a yard or so behind. At the half-distance, Dolezal and Ljunggren were the leaders in 45 minutes -36 seconds, Mikenas, one second behind, having four seconds in hand over Coleman and Vickers. Junk and Spirin, of the U.S.S.R., were then Iying ninth, 71 seconds slower than the leaders.

It was at this point that the Soviet challenge developed fully, and at 15 kilometres Mikenas had a 13 seconds' lead of Ljunggren, while Spirin had reduced the leeway by coming up to third place. Dolezal tired and, having gone back to fifth place, 20 yards behind Vickers, dropped out shortly afterwards. Spirin, walking fast but far from stylishly, went to the front just before the walkers reached the stadium and was followed m by Mikenas, with Junk a close third to provide the U.S.S.R. with a clean sweep of the medals.

Ljunggren made a courageous effort to ward off the mass Soviet challenge and did magnificently, in view of his efforts in the longer race, to finish fourth, and the best stylist of the leading men, Vickers, in his first international race, performed splendidly to occupy fifth place, gaining slightly on Ljunggren in the last five kilometres. The Australian Keane, did well to split split the English trio, of whom Hardy was affected by a caution which caused him to slow down considerably. Seventeen finished, Dolezal, Lindner and Hindmar retiring. Oakley was the only man to be disqualified, although leniency on the part of the judges explains the absence of further enforced withdrawals.

The experiment, for such it must be regarded, of substituting a 20 kilometres road walk for the controversial 10 kilometres track walk proved a success, for it duly attracted the entry from the shorter distance men and was held without the disputes

regarding the judging on the method of progression which occurred in the track walks at Wembley in 1948 and Helsinki in 1952.

I question whether there would have been quite the same absence of after-race criticism had the Games been held in Europe, where walking is much more popular and where the supporters are more enthusiastic, more partisan and more vocal than it is in Australia. Unquestionably, however, the lengthening of the distance of the sprint walk and its translation to the road has saved the race from disappearing from the Olympic programme.
