RWA POSTAL CHALLENGE WALKS - VRWC, MIDDLE PARK, SATURDAY 13 JULY

VRWC contested its leg of the annual Racewalking Australia Postal Challenge on Saturday as did some of the interstate RWA clubs. Each club contests the same program and the results are then collated and an overall winner declared. We saw another great turnout at Middle Park with 70 walkers in attendance and perfect racing weather - cool and still with just a hint of drizzle. It was also our **annual fundraiser for the International Brain Tumour Association** (IBTA - see www.theibta.org) and I am pleased to announce that we raised \$539 with race takings, canteen takings and donations.

The highlight of the day was the 10km time of **Kelly Ruddick**. In May, she recorded a 10km time of 46:27 in Ballarat to better the current World Masters W40 record but it was not accepted as the course was not certified. She was out for a second attempt on Saturday on our newly AIMS certified VRWC 2km course and she made no mistakes, her official time of 46:35 bettering the record by some 27 secs. It was great to see 25 walkers contesting the 10km distance - others to excel included **Michelle Laufer** (PB of 51:42), **Sarah Brennan** (PB of 53:05), **James Christmass** (PB of 51.31), **Emily Hamilton** (PB of 57:57) and **Jesse Osborne** (fastest time of the day with 44:01).

WA Little Athletics has its own winter cross country running and roadwalking season which alternates CC and walks week by week. On Saturday 6 July, it was the walks week with walks held at the Herb Graham Rec. Centre, Balga WA Little Athletics, Kingsway (see https://sitedesq.imgstg.com/customdata/index.cfm?fuseaction=display_main&ItemID=57148&OrgID=3670&count=1).

The standard was impressively high with Simeon Leatherland 8:13 and Mikayla Johns 9:01 leading the way over 2km. Simeon (born Nov 1998 - now aged 14) came second to Tyler Jones in the AA U16 3000m in Perth in March (14:20.57) so he already has the credentials on the board. THE 27TH SUMMER UNIVERSIADE, KAZAN, RUSSIA, 6-17 JULY 2013

The World University Games has been underway for a week now in Kazan, Russia, with high quality fields assembled in most events. The 20km walkers were held last week and I report on them as follows.

Men's 20km Walk, Tuesday 9th July, 8AM

Andrey Krivov (RUS) won the 20 km. road walk at 27th Summer Universide in Kazan, finishing in a Games record of 1:20:47 (beating Sergey Bakulin record time of 1:20:52). Second place went to the Ukranian Ruslan Dmytrienko with 1:20:54 while third

place went to Russian Denis Strelkov with 1:21:32. But this did not look a likely result early on as Russian walker Andrey Ruzavin shot out at the start, to be over 1 minute ahead at the half way mark, reached in 39:43. However, he could not maintain such a testing pace, slowing drastically in the second half and eventually fading to fourth place with 1:22:12, finishing just ahead of Canadian Iñaki Gomez who was fifth with 1:22:29. In the associated teams event, Russia prevailed with a total time of 4:04:31, followed by Ukraine (4:08:09), Canada (4:20:35) and China.

Women's 20km Walk, Wed 10th July, 8AM

The women;s 20km race saw a Russian trifecta with victory going to Anisya Kirdyapkina (1:29:30), silver to Irina Yumanova (1:30:41) and bronze to Lina Bikulova (1:32:30). Kirdyapkina was in a class of her own, walking with the lead group for the first 10km (46:30) before storming home with a second 10km split of 43:00, to easily break the Games record. The best of the non-Russians was Hanna Drabenya of Belarus who finished fourth with 1:33:15. It could have been an even better result for Russia if Vera Sokolova had not been disqualified just before the 18km mark, while in second place. It was a disappointing day for the two Australian representatives with **Stephanie Stigwood** finishing 16th with 1:45:05 and **Rachel Tallent** retiring at the 10km mark (reached in 48:49).

Men's 10,000m Walk, Sat 13th July, 10:30AM

Toshikazu Yamanishi claimed Japan's first 10,000m racewalk victory in the 14-year history of the IAAF World Youth Championships in a dramatic last lap, which saw Guatemala's Jose Alejandro Barrondo, cousin of London 2012 Olympic Games 20km Walk silver medallist Erick Barrondo, disqualified only 80 metres from the line while in the silver medal position. Clocking the second-fastest time of the year with 41:53.80, Yamanishi was followed home by Russia's Maksim Krasnov and Spain's Diego Garcia, with the former winning a thrilling 'sprint' finish for the silver medal in a 42:03.10, with Garcia third in 42:03.32. All three medallists set personal bests.

The early pace had been set by Australia's **Nathan Brill** who took Yamanishi through the first kilometre in 4:14.12, with Krasnov and Garcia 30 metres further back. Nathan increased the tempo with a second km of 4:05.78 and a third km of 4:09.29. The early pace came at a personal cost as, with 13 laps remaining, Krasnov and Garcia caught the leading duo and Nathan conceded the lead just after the halfway point, reached in 20:53.73.

With eight laps remaining, a group of five were packed tightly together as Garcia, Yamanishi and Barrondo moved into the medal positions, although the pace had relented slightly with the sixth kilometre taking 4:19.02 and the seventh kilometres split being 4:20.62. At 8000m, Krasnov moved to the front and increased the tempo again as Nathan now dropped off the group.

Barrondo moved back to the front with two laps to go as Garcia looked to have lost his chance of a medal, losing touch with Yamanishi and Krasnov who were closely shadowing the Guatemalan. Yamanishi, 17, then decided to kick for home from 600m out and Barrondo was left 10 metres adrift, with 17-year-old Krasnov another 10 metres back. As the Japanese athlete sped to victory, with a 3:52.50 final kilometre, Barrondo suffered his dramatic disqualification with only 80 metres remaining and, with the surprise opportunity for a medal upgrade, Krasnov and Garcia battled right to the line. Japan's Yuga Yamashita finished fourth with 42:07.94 personal best while Nathan held on well to finish fifth with 42:54.70.

Not until the race walks did its fortunes turn around with Momoko Mizota taking silver in the women's event with a PB time of 22:42.77 and Toshikazu Yamanishi turning in Japan's only gold medal of the championships with a PB 41:53.80 in the men's 10000m walk.

9TH EUROPEAN U23 CHAMPIONSHIPS, TAMPERE, FINLAND, 11-14 JULY 2013

The European Under-23 T&F Championships (see http://www.tampere2013.fi/) kicked off last Wednesday in Tampere, Finland, with the 20 km walks and it was once again a case of Russian domination.

The first gold medal of the championships went to Russia's Svetlana Vasilyeva as she clocked 1:30:06 to finish half a minute clear of the rest of the field and win the women's race. Having created an 18 second lead with 4km to go, none of Vasilyeva's competition could really challenge. Ukraine's Lyudmyla Olyanovska took silver with 1:30:37 ahead of Italy's Antonella Palmisano whose 1:30:59 PB was more than enough for bronze.

The men's race followed and there was further victory for Russia as Pyotr Bogatyrev and Alexander Ivanov made it a Russian one-two. Only three seconds separated the gold and silver pair, with Bogatyrev crossing in 1:21:31 for the win ahead of his compatriot who clocked a 1:21:34 PB. Germany's Hagen Pohle took bronze with 1:25:04.

SAINSBURY'S BRITISH & ENGLISH T&F CHAMPIONSHIPS, BIRMINGHAM, 12-14 JULY

5000m track walks were held on day three (Sunday 14 July) of the Sainsbury's British Championships & England Championships at the Alexander Stadium in Birmingham.

The men's 5000m walk saw a new UK record to Belgrave Harrier Alex Wright who slowly increased the pace throughout the race to pull away from Tonbridge's Tom Bosworth, crossing the line in 19:27.39. Bosworth was not far behind with 19:38.62 while bronze went to Jamie Higgins with 20:57.15. Alex said: "I was really happy coming over the line to a big cheer from the crowd. It was my plan from the start to go for the National Record, but the first 1km was a bit slow, but I think that actually helped for later on in the race. It was a Welsh duo in the women's 5000m track walk as Bethan Davies secured her first British title with a new personal best of 23.21.09 ahead of Heather Lewis with 23:50.59. Third place (and the English title) went to Leeds City's Ellie Dooley who knocked more than two minutes off her PB with 24:04.21.

FRENCH T&F CHAMPIONSHIPS, CHARLETY STADIUM, PARIS, 12-14 JULY 2013

The French T&F Championships, held last weekend in the Charlety Stadium in Paris, were superb with lots of PBs and world standard performances (Vicault 9.95 in 100m, Tamgho 17.49 and Rapinier 17.45 in TJ and Billaud 12.59 in 100m Hurdles). The 10,000m track walks, held on the second day, followed the trend and spectators witnessed some fantastic walking by the men as you can see below.

Emmanuel Tardi was there officiating (he is everywhere!) and he tells me that the weather was perfect for the two races - absolutely no wind and cool conditions. In the men's race, Kevin Campion and Bertrand Moulinet led for 8 laps before Campion sped up, breaking free and going on to win with a PB 38:37.02. Yohann Diniz, preparing for the World Championships 50km, showed impressive speed himself, catching Moulinet just after the half way mark and going on to take second place with 39:27.63. Moulinet faded to fourth but still finished with a PB time of 39:50.03, one spot behind Hédi Taraaoui whose time of 39:37.96 was also a PB. Of the 18 starters, 12 recorded personal best times!

In the women's race, the three best French walkers weren't on the track because they was in Tampere competing in the European U23 Championships, but the race was still a good one with Anne Gaelle Retout and Violaine Averous locked in battle at the front. Alas, Retout was disqualified with only 3 laps to go, allowing Averous the win with 48:16.97. Marine Quennehen walked a conservative race, being back in 7th place at the 3000m mark, but she came through to eventually finish second with 49:10.72 ahead of Amandine Marcou with 49:49.36. Of the 13 finishes, 7 recorded personal best times.

VALE NIGEL CREW: 2 AUGUST 1940 - 10 JULY 2013

Canberra, and in particular the local athletics community, lost one of its real personalities last week with the passing of 73 year old Nigel Crew. Nigel had worked in the Government Printing Office for 30 years before retiring but he had been in poor health for some time and had spent his last couple of years in a nursing home.

His daughter Francine gave the eulogy at his funeral on Monday to a large gathering of family and friends. There was mention of his racewalking connections and Francine mentioned about Nigel's attempt to start a new fashion in racing shorts - rather than letting them trail on the ground he hoisted them up way too high!

Nigel became interested in athletics in the early to mid 1960's, at which time he joined the North Canberra Athletics Club. His long time passion from that point became race walking. As a competitor, while he could not achieve representative honours, he hardly missed a competition whether it was local or interstate and in his early years was a much required "driver" to many out of town competitions.

He was one of the competitors in the inaugural Lake Burley Griffin 20 Mile walk in Canberra - the year was 1967 and he is captured for posterity on the far right of the photo below.



He was a founding member of the ACT Race Walking Club formed in March 1965, primarily to provide race walking competitions in the winter months but then also providing additional weekly races in the summer. He was also a founding member of the ACT Veterans Athletics Club.

He served on the committee of many clubs and at various times performed the duties of secretary, treasurer and race secretary of the ACT Race Walking Club. He was a Life Member of North Canberra Gungahlin Athletics Club, the ACT Race & Fitness Walking Club and a recipient of a 25 year Merit Award for services to Racewalking Australia.

Denis Strangman reminded me this morning in an email how Nigel, Peter Waddell and Robin Whyte were continually ribbing each other. If Peter was too sharp Nigel would reply in kind. He remembered one occasion where Peter, who always used to submit Saturday's results to the Canberra Times, mischievously recorded Nigel's race result as "still coming" - meaning to say he had not yet finished - and the journalist, in all innocence, reprinted it in the paper!

Apart from being a committed participant in race walking events Nigel also undertook coaching of young athletes. His most successful walker was Daniel Andrikis who he took from being red carded by all judges in an interstate carnival to being an Australian Representative at the World Junior Championships.

Nigel will be remembered by many Canberra residents for his persistence in claiming his place on the road when out training despite the introduction of shared paths! He will also be remembered by me for his distinctive apparel - regardless of the cold weather at the LBG carnival (and it was often below 0° C), he was always to be seen in his short sleeved shirt and shorts.

Nigel, we will all miss you.

ENTRIES NOW OPEN FOR THE 2013 AUSTRALIAN ROADWALK CHAMPIONSHIPS

Entries are now open for the Australian Roadwalking Championships, to be contested in Symmons Plains, Tasmania, on 1st Sept. See https://sitedesq.imgstg.com/meetsregform/index.cfm?fuseaction=display_event_registration_step1&MeetID=1047&OrgID=887.

Note that entries close at midnight on 9th August - a little under 4 weeks time.

Remember to select your racewalking club (eg RWV, NSWRWC, QRWC, etc) as well as your State (eg VIC, NSW, QLD) to make it easier for us to see which of our RWA clubs you will be representing.

Just a few comments to clarify how this combined RWA/AA carnival works

- Individual medallists will be presented with Athletics Australia medals. Team medallists will be presented with RWA medals.
- Open Women can enter either the AA 20 km championship or the RWA 10 km championship, but not both. All women in the AA 20 km event and the RWA 10 km event are eligible to score points in the RWA 10 km Teams Championship, provided they are members of one of the RWA clubs. For 20 km walkers, the 10 km split times will be used for this purpose (provided the walker finishes the 20km event).
- Masters Men and Women do not need to enter Masters and Open categories separately. Walkers over age 35 who enter the

20 km Open Men or the 10 km Open Women will automatically be entered into the RWA Masters category for that event.

- It is not possible to enter concurrent events like the U20 Men and U18 Men 10,000m. You must enter one or the other.
- Age for all AA and RWA events is age as at 31 December 2013.
- There are no U10 1km events this year. These events are not in integral part of the championships but can be included as additional non-championship events. The local organising committee has decided not to add them this year.


TRACK WALKS RETURN TO THE AUSTRALIAN T&F CHAMPIONSHIPS IN 2014

Some big news - Brian Roe has just confirmed to me that Athletics Australia has agreed to add track walks back into the official program at the Australian Track and Field Championships. The distance will be 10,000m and championships will be held for Open Men and Open Women. Entry standards have been agreed and will be announced when entries open for the championships.

Track walk championships (5000m) were last held at the Track Nationals in 1998 so it has been a long wait for us but we are now finally back into the fold.

The 2014 Australian T&F Championships will be held in Melbourne on 3-6 April 2014 so pencil it in!





The above photo shows Australian representatives **Andrew Jachno** and **Simon Baker** after completing the 1988 Olympic 50km walk in Seoul, South Korea. And here is the story of those Olympic 20km and 50km walks. It makes for interesting reading indeed.

1988 SOEUL

Finally an Olympics without boycotts! This time the Olympic walks could be regarded as a genuine World championship and the Eastern Bloc countries were expected to dominate. They did not disappoint.

Men 20km Walk

After missing the 1984 Olympics due to the Eastern Block boycott, Czech walker Jozef Pribilinec was out for revenge. Mexican Ernesto Canto's World Record of 1:18:40 still stood and Canto had now been joined by a new generation of Mexican walkers.


Italian 1980 Gold Medallist Maurizio Damilano and Pribilinec were seen, along with Canto and fellow Mexican Carlos Mercenario, as the favourites. Damilano had shown considerable improvement since his unlikely victory in Moscow. He was second in the 1985


World Cup (1:21:43), second in the 1986 European Championship (1:21:17) and had won the 1987 IAAF World Championship (1:20:45). Pribilinec had won the 1986 European Championship (1:21:17) and come second in the 1987 World Championship (1:21:07). The dark horse was Mexican Mercenario who had beaten them both to win the 1987 World Cup with 1:19:24.

A young East German walker by the name of Ronald Weigel (who went on to become the Australian National Coach from 1997 to 2002) had shown outstanding promise over the 50 km distance. After winning the 1983 World Championship 50 km in 3:43:08, he had been denied his first Olympic opportunity by the 1984 boycott. This was followed by a couple of lean years with an inauspicious DNF in the 1985 World Cup 50 km and a DQ in the 1986 European Championship 50 km. In 1987 he finally broke through again with silver (3:41:30) in the World Championship 50 km and gold in the World Cup 50 km in 3:42:26. He entered the Seoul village as 50 km World Record holder and was the hot favourite for the 50 km event. What people had not reck oned on was his superb 20 km form.

With only weeks to go before the Olympics, after overseeing his final preparations in the GDR training camp in Bulgaria, his coach added him to the 20 km walk list. Weigel argued that he wanted to concentrate on the 50 km distance and did not want to additionally contest the shorter distance but his objections were overruled. The coach's judgement proved correct.

By the 15 km mark, Pribilinec, Weigel and Canto had broken clear of the field. With Canto eventually disqualified, Pribilinec and Weigel entered the stadium less than 10 metres apart. In one of the most exciting Olympic finishes ever seen, Pribilinec had to draw on all his reserves to hold out Weigel for gold. After the line, he collapsed on the track. Weigel knelt over him and tried to extend his contratulations. But the Slovak winner was so exhausted that he was unable to respond. Silently, Weigel kissed him and walked away.

The times were sizzling and there were only 3 disqualifications out of the record field of 53 starters (the disqualifications included the Mexicans Canto and Sanchez). Damilano set the seal on his greatness as a walker with a third Olympic medal while Mercenario was competitive in seventh place but never seriously challenged.

Men 50km Walk

With Mexican Raul Gonzalez retired, the way was open for a new Olympic champion and Hartwig Gauder, the 1980 champion, was back after the 1984 boycott. He had won the 1985 World Cup in 3:47:31, had won the 1986 European Championship in 3:40:55, had won the 1987 IAAF World Championship in 3:40:53 and had been second in the 1987 World Cup in 3:42:50. Such excellence over an extended period had seldom been seen in walking and he was expected to fight out the gold with fellow East German Weigel (see comments above).

The only threat seemed the Soviet walker Vyacheslav Ivanenko who had finished second to Gauder in the 1986 European Championship in 3:41:54 and was third in the 1987 World Championships in 3:44:02. Ivanenko's story made for interesting reading. As a 22 year old mechanic repairman at a textile factory, he had watched a television program that said that walking was good

therapy for a bad back. The 5-foot 4½-inch Ivanenko began walking the two and a half miles to work. Because he lived in Siberia, he walked fast. One day he was noticed by a coach who began training him in earnest.

In the fastest Olympic 50 km event ever walked, it was Ivanenko who prevailed over Weigel and Gauder, all 3 breaking the 3:40 barrier. They had been together until the 40 km mark when Ivanenko made his decisive break, dropping first Gauder and then Weigel, who resigned himself to second place after receiving two warnings for lifting. It was Weigel's second silver medal of the Games for Gauder it was a bronze to add to his 1980 gold.

The two Australian representatives were **Simon Baker** and **Andrew Jachno** who had also repped at the 1984 Olympics. Both were now resident at the AIS in Canberra and training partners.

Simon had become an overnight Australian celebrity when he walked an unforgettable race in dreadful Edinburgh conditions to win the 1986 Commonwealth Games 30 km with a PB time of 2:07:47. The event was broadcast live on Australian television. Simon took the lead at the 14.5 km mark and powered home through the driving rain to win by over a minute. He celebrated his win with a victory leap past the finishing line and a victory lap – you would rarely see a more excited winner.

He followed this up with a fine 11th in the Racewalking World Cup placing in New York and a PB of 1:21:57. Again another international race and another PB – and the fastest time recorded by an Australian at the Lugano Cup. But like 1983, his tough regime of racing and training took its toll and his subsequent performance in the 20 km at the IAAF World Champs in the heat of Rome was a slightly lower but still good 24th in 1:27:32.

Up till now, Simon had always looked upon himself as a 20 km walker but his coach Craig Hilliard felt it was time to move up to the 50 km distance so October 1987 saw him attempt his first 50 km in Germany. His time of 4:04:30 was a very good first up attempt and broke the Australian Olympic qualifying standard.

His tough task – to walk both the 20km and 50 km event in Seoul – was not easy but the way in which he executed it left no doubt about his real walking capabilities. His 11th place in the 20 km event in 1:21:47 was outstanding but this was overshadowed by his 6th place in the 50 km walk. Journalist Len Johnson described his finish in the 50 km event as "the excited extrovert who spent the 10 minutes after crossing the line falling around like a puppet dangling on tangled strings, joyously celebrating his own performance with every other walker in sight". The time of 3:44:07 was a PB and a new Commonwealth best.

This performance showed the two sides of Simon – the hard working athlete who had assiduously trained to achieve his high ranking and the eccentric extrovert. But it worked and he was able to get a lot of good publicity for racewalking.

Coming back form his Olympic success, he fronted for the VRWC 2 hour walk at the Collingwood track on August 20 and set a new National 1 hour record of 14.475km.

Although **Andrew Jachno**'s Olympic performances were overshadowed by Simon's, full credit also goes to him for what was a wonderful period of racing. 1987 had been his best year so far with a host of international berths which included the World Indoor 5000m in Indianapolis (15th in 20:19), the World Student Games in Zagreb (4th in 1:27:39), the Racewalking World Cup in New York (37th in 1:25:58) and the IAAF World Championships in Rome (12th in 1:25:50).

In 1988, he was finally awarded an AIS scholarship and moved to Canberra. There he was able to team up with Simon, a training combination that helped them both in their final preparations for Seoul. His 28^{th} place in Seoul in the 20 km walk in 1:24:50 was followed by an even better performance in the 50 km -19^{th} in 3:53:33. It was a PB by some 8 minutes and placed him third in the Australian all time 50 km rankings.

The great Olympic performances by Andrew and Simon Baker gained them invitations to walk the New York marathon. History shows that on that occasion, Andrew finished in 3 hrs 24 mins, one minute ahead of Simon.
