My Walker of the Week this time around is 17 year old Melbourne walker **Kyle Swan** who won the U18 5000m championship walk at last weekend's Australian All-Schools T&F Championships in Melbourne in a meet record time of **20:59.59**. It was a 10 sec PB and broke Tyler Jones' championship record by some 5 seconds. Kyle was one of our IAAF World Youth reps this year and looks set to challenge strongly for a place in our 2016 IAAF World Junior Championships team.

Mark O'Mahony summed it up all well in a Facebook post on Saturday

Coaching at its best Frances Attard identifying and nurturing a young walker through the early stages of his walk career. Encouraging and supporting him to develop a love for the sport bringing him through the various development stages. To recognize that Kyle had the drive and ability to benefit. From the vigorous training schedules set out by Simon Baker and to Simon for keeping him going to achieve the best results on track and road. The whole time Kyle receiving the right amount of love, encouragement and support from his family to keep interested to strive to do his best. In short congratulations to you all!

Well put Mark. Behind every successful athlete is a strong coaching group and supportive family and friends. In Kyle's case, it is a big team, so well led by Fran and Simon and his dad Terry and his mum Darlene. Well done everyone.

WHAT'S COMING UP

Then fast forward to Sunday when the **2015 Australian 50km Roadwalk** Championship will be held at Fawkner Park (rated by Jared Tallent as his favourite course) on **Sunday 13 December.** This is a chance for walkers to get a qualifying time on the board for the 2016 World Race Walking Teams Championships or 2016 World Junior Championships and it looks like quite a few have entered. The timetable for the day reads as follows

7.00am	Australian 50km Road Walking Championships	Cut-off: 5 hours
8.00am	20km non-championship Walk: Men and Women	Cut-off: Men 2 hours, Women 2 hours 15 mins
9:00am	10km non-championship Walk: U20 Men and Women	Cut-off: Men 56 mins, Women 60 mins
10:00am	5km non-championship Walk: U18 Men and Women	Cut-off: Men 28 mins, Women 30 mins

The field for the Australian 50km looks like being a strong one with entries as shown below. Chris Erickson and Evan Dunfee are expected to fight out the major placings like last year but you can't discount Canadians Inaki Gomez and Ben Thorne who are both contesting their inaugural 50km. Coming off a month's hard training at the AIS in Canberra and with superb 20km PBs, anything is possible with these two world class walkers. Olympic and World Cup spots are up for grabs so expect some great racing.

2015 AUSTRALIAN ALL SCHOOLS CHAMPIONSHIPS, LAKESIDE STADIUM, MELBOURNE, 4-6 DECEMBER

I'll start first with a potted history of the Australian All-School Championships. The first championship meet was held in Adelaide on 13-14 December 1978 and included 3 age groups only - U15, U17 and U19. It stayed that way for 20 years until 1998 when the age groups were changed from U15/U17/U19 to U14, U15, U16, U17, U18 and U20 and the meet immediately grew in size and prestige. The Under 20 Division was discontinued after 2005 but was recommissioned as a once-off in 2008 for the Pacific Schools Games. The biggest ever All-Schools meet was held in 2009 in Hobart, with over 1400 young athletes in attendance and over 130 walkers contesting the racewalk events. That was also the last of the really big championship meets. The very next year the format was changed to U14, U16 and U18 and saw restricted participation with fields limited to 2 athletes per State. That has been changed a little since, with States now able to enter more than 2 but it is still a lot smaller than it used to be. This year saw 78 walkers in total in the 6 walk events, a good number but very small compared to 6 years ago. Personally, I preferred the old format with each age group catered for. I also think there is a strong argument for an U19 age group as many Y12 students turn 18 towards the end of their final school year and become ineligible to compete even though they are still school students. Anyway, it is as it is. Onto this year's meet.

The U18 5000m walks were held together (with a split start) at 8:15PM last Friday evening. After a hot and sunny Melbourne day, conditions were good with the dusk scheduling making for great racing conditions. 16 year olds **Kyle Swan** and **Declan Tingay**, along with 17 year old **Emmet Brasier**, went straight to the start and it was obvious that the winner was going to come from that grouping. Emmet eventually tailed off but Kyle and Declan showed no signs of tiredness as they went shoulder to shoulder for lap after lap. It was Kyle who increased the temp at the 3000m mark and he eventually broke away with 3 laps to go, going on to win in a PB time of 20:59.9, breaking Tyler Jones' meet record by some 5 secs. Declan was also on PB pace with his second place time of 21:08.81 while Emmet held on pretty well for thirds with 22:57.73. **Luke and Jamie McCutcheon** followed next, also breaking 24 mins. Lot of PBs overall.

Jemima Montag was an easy winner in the women's race with an excellent time of 23:13.04. 15 year old **Rhiannon Lovegrove** upstaged her older rivals, taking second in a PB 24:57.48, with 16 year old **Anna Cross** taking third with 25:15.39.

The U14 3000m walks were held in the middle of Saturday afternoon but luckily the expected 30C+ forecast had not yet been reached (or so it seemed from the sidelines). 13 year olds **Corey Dickson** and **Joe Cross**, along with 12 year old **Nikola Mandic**, were soon on their own out front, with nothing separating them for most of the race. It was eventually Corey who put the hammer down with 700m to go, forging a slight lead which he then held to the end, winning in a PB 14:04.21. Nikola was next over the line but had accumulated a number of reds and was eventually announced as a DQ, meaning that Joe took silver with his PB time of 14:08.91. **Nelson McCutcheon** followed on from his older brothers in Friday evening, taking third with a PB 14:54.30.

The girls race was a very different affair, with Caitlin Hannigan walking strongly and safely to build up a big lead, only to incur a red from the chief judge in the final 100m as she surged towards the line, some 150m ahead of the second placed girl and on target for a new meet record of around 14:20. Now I have issues with the way this rule is currently administered. It was brought in after a couple of very blatant runs to the line in either World or Olympic finals and the rule was meant to stop people running to the line and passing others in the final few strides. It obviously should not apply to a walker who is a mile in front and just surging for the line. In that case, any red card should only count for ONE, not THREE. I would like to see some sort of clarification here on what is currently a bad rule. Anyway, her demise opened the door for Emma Blanch who walked the race of her life, taking gold with a huge PB of 14:56.77, ahead of Victorians Alanna Peart 15:45.07 and Georgia Clarke 15:56.82.

I chatted with Caitlin's coach Robyn Wales after the race and Robyn subsequently emailed me as follows

Could you please mention in the newsletter that I wish to thank and congratulate Emma Blanch from NSW (who was awarded the gold medal) for the kind and gracious manner in which she accepted this win and how she took the time to comfort Caitlin and even apologize to her? I do not know who Emma's coach is or I would thank them personally so this is the only way I know how to do this. It was encouraging to hear of this sportsmanship from such a young athlete. I hope to meet up with her in Perth and thank her myself.

The U16 3000m rounded off the walks on Sunday morning and, once again, the weather was kind with overcast conditions keeping the temperature down. With 33 walkers on the track together, it was a cramped field but everyone seemed to manage ok and the race progressed without issue. It was exciting with the first 4 of Connor Frew, Samantha Brown, Gabby Hunt and Eliza Clarke together for the entire race and it took a final frantic finish to eventually split them, with less than one second covering all four at the finish. For the girls, it decided the eventual medals with Samantha 13:49.31, Gabby 13:49.92 and Eliza 13:50.00 finishing in that order. For the boys, it was an easy win for Connor with 13:49.14, ahead of ACT team mater Mitchell Baker 13:56.31 and Jamison Stovin 14:18.85. The good conditions ensured PBs across the board.

Article http://www.ocregister.com/articles/beamon-694449-brown-usatf.html notes that USA T&F president Stephanie Hightower recently appointed Robin Brown-Beamon to serve on USATF's influential Law & Legislation Committee fewer than seven months after Brown-Beamon was suspended indefinitely by the Amateur Athletic Union for a series of financial improprieties and rules violations, according to documents obtained by The Orange County Register.
 - Brown-Beamon, the Amateur Athletic Union national athletics chair and former wife of Olympic long jump champion Bob Beamon, was suspended from the AAU for what the organization's national board of review found a "consistent,"

intentional, knowing, self-serving of code violations" that included extravagant expenditures for herself and her friends such as Hightower, according to AAU board of review documents, and AAU and USATF memos, reports, letters and emails obtained by the Register.

An AAU investigation found that Brown-Beamon arranged for Hightower to receive a \$3,000 appearance fee for an AAU event in Hawaii called "Track Divas," according to a confidential AAU report.

The article also notes that USATF membership voted 392-70 at last year's national convention in Anaheim to renominate Bob Hersh for a position on the IAAF council. Hersh was a long-time vice president with the IAAF, the sport's global governing body. But the vote was overturned by the board, which voted 11-1 to nominate Hightower instead. Hightower was later elected to the IAAF council.

Wow...jobs, money, overrules, intrigue, IAAF - it has all the elements of a true soap opera.

WORLD RACE WALKING TEAM CHAMPIONSHIPS BID PROCESS REOPENED ON FRIDAY 4 DECEMBER

An accelerated bidding process was opened last Friday (seehttp://www.iaaf.org/news/press-release/bid-process-reallocation-2016-iaaf-events) for the reallocation of two 2016 IAAF World Athletics Series competitions, with the decisions due on 7 January 2016. The announcement reads

Following confirmation last week of the full suspension of the Russian IAAF Member Federation ARAF, the process is now underway to reallocate the 2016 IAAF World Race Walking Team Championships (Cheboksary, RUS) and 2016 IAAF World U20 (Junior) Championships (Kazan, RUS) which were originally awarded to ARAF.

IAAF Member Federations have been formally invited to submit applications to host these two events, it being understood that this will be an accelerated process to ensure maximum time available for the successful hosts to organise these two championships.

The IAAF Council will vote on 7th January to select the new Host Venues, after which the successful candidate cities will be announced.

AA SELECTION POLICY FOR THE 2016 IAAF WORLD RACE WALK TEAM CHAMPIONSHIPS

The IAAF World Race Walking Teams Championships will be held on 7-8 May 2016, in a city yet to be announced. Athletics Australia belatedly released their Selection Criteria on Friday 4 December 2015 after a fair bit of badgering by various people. It is identical to the 2015 Selection Criteria so one can only wonder why it was not released many months ago. See http://www.athletics.com.au/High-Performance/Able-Bodied/Team-Information/World-Race-Walk-Cup for the full details. Salient points are as follows

- AA will select up to 5 walkers for each of the 50km men, 20km women and up to 3 walkers for each of the 10km Junior men and 10km Junior women.
- AA recommends that junior walkers do either the World Junior championships or the World Racewalking Cup but not both.
 A special exemption is required from AA to do both events.

- Any athlete who finishes in the top 24 at the 2015 IAAF World Championships will be automatically selected subject to compliance with clause 4 and the athlete having nominated for that event. This means Jared Tallent (50km), Chris Erickson (50km) and Dane Bird-Smith (20km).
- The first two eligible athletes (excluding any athlete selected by clause 3.2.1) in each 20km selection trial will be automatically selected in the team provided that the athlete has nominated for selection and in the case of the 20km events,

the athlete has achieved the performance standard. Further selections may be made at the discretion of the selectors. This discretion is absolute and it need not be exercised.

- The first two eligible athletes in each 10km Junior selection trial will be automatically selected in the team provided that the athlete has nominated for selection and has achieved the performance standard. If positions remain in the event after the operation of clause 3.3.1, further selections may be made at the discretion of the selectors. This discretion is absolute and it need not be exercised.
- Performances must be achieved during an official competition organised in conformity with IAAF Rules. Performances achieved in Australia must be achieved in a competition sanctioned by Athletics Australia as an Athletics Australia "National Permit Meeting". Athletics Australia operates a sanctioning process across all meets that involves the issuing of a permit "National Permit" or "Recreational (State) Permit". A current list of all "National Permit" meetings will be available on the Athletics Australia website.
 - Effectively, this means that you must ensure that you must make AA aware of any qualification attempts and ensure that your race has the proper count of officials, judges and that it is on a certified course.
- Athletics Australia may not provide financial support for the 2016 World Race Walking Cup and therefore participating athletes, selected according to the terms of this policy, may be required to cover costs in addition to any assistance provided by the IAAF and the local organising committee. The allocation of any financial assistance offered by the IAAF or the local organising committee will be by the Director of High Performance, whose decision shall be final. Junior athletes in particular should anticipate a levy to offset some of the costs of the trip will be imposed.

THE INTERESTING CASE OF HIAGO GARCIA

Hiago Garcia (https://twitter.com/garciahiago) is an U23 Brazilian racewalker who has been training in Russia for the past couple of years. On 6 November 2015, the Russian antidoping agency RUSADA published a statement in its news section indicating that he was being banned for 4 years for doping violations (see http://www.rusada.ru/en/press/news/russian-athlete-athletics-recognized-ineligible-14).

"Russian anti-doping Agency "RUSADA" rendered a decision that made Pereira Garcia Giago (athletics) ineligible for 4 years for the anti-doping rule violation, the period commencing on July 16, 2015"

Garcia had been racing in the interim period between 16 July and 6 Nov and had done a 20km PB in Cheboksary on 6 Sept (1:28:33) - see http://omarchador.blogspot.com.es/2015/09/taca-da-russia-de-marcha-em-cheboksary.html. Presumably that will now be disallowed.

But much more disturbingly, he seems to have competed in a Brazilian race in November 28th, 3 weeks after his ban announcement (see http://omarchador.blogspot.com.es/2015/12/a-marcha-atletica-no-trofeu-norte.html). He failed to finish the race but that is inconsequential. What was he doing racing in the first place? If banned, he should not be racing!

Another sad case of drugs and racewalking with its all-to-common Russian connection? Further investigation is warranted.


I was reading the *Melbourne Age* newspaper on Saturday morning, perusing an article on the current exhibition of the works of artist Tom Roberts at the National Gallery in Canberra (see http://nga.gov.au/Exhibition/Roberts/) when I saw a name which I instantly recognised. Here is the quote from the article

His deification came posthumously, commencing especially with R. H. Croll's Tom Roberts: Father of Australian Landscape Painting (1935), a eulogising account commissioned by his widow.

Yes, the quote concerned Robert Henderson (Bob) Croll, one of the founders of the Victorian Amateur Walkers' Club and its first president from 1923-1925. A prominent figure in the Australian literary scene and a towering figure in the world of bushwalking and amateur sport, I have a comprehensive biography of him at http://www.vrwc.org.au/tim-archive/articles/wv-rh-croll.pdf.

As for Tom Roberts, what Australian is not familiar with his most famous "Big Picture" Opening of the first parliament of the Commonwealth of Australia, 9 May 1901 (1903).

The pace continues unabated!

• The Italian Olympic Committee has requested two-year doping bans for 26 track and field athletes " several of whom are slated to compete at next year's Rio de Janeiro Games. The list includes Fabrizio Donato, the bronze medalist in triple jump at the 2012 London Olympics; Andrew Howe, the silver medalist in long jump at the 2007 world championships; and Alex Schwazer, the gold medalist in 50-kilometer race walk at the 2008 Beijing Olympics who has already been banned for doping. All 26 are accused of evading doping tests but maintain there was an administrative error. They will face trials at CONI's anti-doping court, with decisions expected sometime next year. Five of the 26 had already qualified for Rio while about 10 have retired, including pole vaulter Giuseppe Gibilisco. But it may not be as simple as that and it could all end up being a storm in a teacup. The 20 active athletes facing possible doping suspensions should continue training for next year's Olympics, the president of the Italian Athletics Federation said last Thursday. All 26 maintain there was an administrative error in WADA's Whereabouts system which requires athletes to

provide their anti-doping organization with details of where they can be found for one hour every day. "The Federation stands behind its athletes," FIDAL president Alfio Giomi said. "The system wasn't working. I don't support that the athletes have become the victims of what happened."

- The bad press continues for new IAAF President Seb Coe who was grilled by a British Parliament Select Committee last Wednesday. He remained defiant as they peppered him with questions but the response of journalists has not been kind.
- Some of the points include
 - As IAAF VP from 2007 to 2015, he had been aware of the escalating drugs issue in T&F but much of his time as vice-president had been spent delivering the London 2012 Olympics.
 - He refused to apologise for describing allegations last August of blood doping in his embattled sport as a "declaration of war", even though a WADA independent commission subsequently published evidence of state-supported doping by Russian athletes and a second Wada report is looking into allegations the IAAF covered up positive tests.
 - Despite the gravity of the crisis, Coe says he won't speak to the husband-and-wife team of whistleblowers who blew the Russian doping scandal wide open until after all inquiries are over.

Coincidentally, respected Irish sports journalist David Walsh had just finished interviewing the Russian whistleblowers (you can read the first bit of his article at http://www.thesundaytimes.co.uk/sto/sport/athletics/article1495780.ece) and he is scathing of Coe's response re not wanting to speak with them.

The failure of Seb Coe and the IAAF to show any support for Vitaly and Yuliya Stepanov tells so much. The whistleblowers they never wanted.

• Keeping with the British Parliament marathon 3 hour Select Committee hearing into corruption in athletics, one of the many interesting moments for Coe was when he suggested there were no firm plans to investigate Doha's bids for both the 2017 and 2019 World Athletics Championships even though some of the allegations levelled at Papa Diack may involve the Qataris. Papa Diack is alleged to have requested £3.5million from Doha ahead of a 2017 bid that was won by London, and it is also alleged that Kenyan officials now under police investigation in their home country were given cars in exchange for supporting the 2019 bid, which Doha won. Asked specifically if he thought the Doha bids were clean, Coe said: 'Well, I don't know.'

- At the same time, Coe has been elected as Chairman of the Board of the Diamond League AG, the company which owns and operates the IAAF Diamond League. The Board is composed of six persons, three members who represent the meetings and three who represent the IAAF. It continues a long running trend for Coe to get his finger into as many pies as possible. Did you know that prior to becoming IAAF vice-president in 2007, Coe was appointed as the first ethics commission chairman for world football's governing body FIFA, an organisation currently mired in corruption allegations of its own. He therefore has links to two of the biggest scandals in modern sport. And he has just been forced to stand down from his ambassadorial role for Nike, another role that many questioned. I don't know about you but I believe in doing one job and doing it well.
- Last Wednesday was Judgement Day. It was the day **Jared Tallent** had been waiting for to start the formal process to claim the Olympic gold medal denied him by a drug cheat. It was the day when the CAS hearing would review the process which allowed five Russian race walkers to receive selective bans which allowed them to either keep medals or compete in major meets. Hopefully the end process of this will award Jared his 2012 Olympic 50km gold medal. - Finally, the IAAF says it has banned Russian runner Tatyana Andrianova for doping in a case that is more than 10 years old. Andrianova tested positive for the banned steroid stanozolol while competing in the 800 meters at the 2005 world championships in Finland, where she won bronze. That medal is likely to pass to fourth-place finisher Maria Mutola of Mozambique. In August, the IAAF said it identified 28 athletes suspected of doping at the 2005 and 2007 worlds after retesting their samples using new technology. The 28 have not been named, and it is not clear whether Andrianova is among them, or is a separate case.
