WALKER OF THE WEEK

My Walker of the Week this time around is 24 year old Melbourne walker **Regan Lamble** who clocked up yet another Olympic 20km qualifier last weekend in La Coruna in Spain. Her 8th place time of **1:30:58** is her 6th qualifier and she leads the chase for the remaining two women's spots behind Rachel Tallent who was selected in February.



As the 20km qualifying period finished on Sunday, the Australian selectors are meeting this week to select the remaining two women's 20km spots and the remaining two men's 20km spots. Regan is one of 5 women in the running, with qualifying performances shown below. It is a shame that only two of our three sub-1:30 qualifiers can be selected.

AV AND VRWC CHAMPIONSHIPS, MIDDLE PARK, SATURDAY 28 MAY

A total of 72 walkers braved cold, wet and wintery conditions last Saturday afternoon at Middle Park for a variety of racewalking championships that included the Victorian Open 10km roadwalk, the Victorian Country roadwalk championships and a variety of VRWC and RWV underage championships.

The 10km events were the first to get underway, with Chris Erickson and Quentin Rew immediately going to the front. Chris was the one to make the pace early but it was Quentin who came home the faster in the last few kms, taking fastest time of 40:55 ahead of Chris with 41:03. Further back, Alana Barber and Isamu Fujisawa walked together early before Isamu cleared away for a final time of 46:49, ahead of Alana 47:01. With Chris (AUS), Quentin (NZL) and Isamu (JAP) already selected for Rio and with Alana (NZL) soon to be announced, it was great to have a quartet of top internationals leading the way. The Victorian 10km titles went to Chris Erickson and Simone McInnes (50:32) with the minor medals going to Adam Garganis (44:48), Jason Kozica (47:02), Megan Szirom (50:45) and Sarah Brennan (54:22). Simone was one of 3 walkers to do a PB – other PBs went to Jason (47:02) and Pramesh Prasad (52:34). The country titles went to Terry O'Neill and Sarah Brennan.

SUPPORTING KIM MOTTROM

Readers will know that I have been a vocal supporter of local Adelaide walker Kim Mottrom who was found to have taken the naturally occuring substance dextran (the only person ever to have failed a drugs test for this substance) in December 2013 and who subsequently served a ban of 2 years and 3 months. Kim tried to clear his name by going to the Court of Arbitration in Sport (CAS), a process that has cost him some \$20,000 in legal fees and such like. The latest bill from CAS, for an additional \$3000, has finally tipped Kim over the cliff and he was forced to post this on social media.

My court case has finished and I've missed the 2 years etc but I've just literally been given a bill for court costs for over \$3000 payable within 30 days. Keep in mind this has already cost me over \$17.5k which a lot of it is still owed. I literally have \$90 to my name and over \$31,500 of debt. This is beyond my reach. I welcome all productive thoughts. Bankruptcy? Grants? Does anyone have any thoughts on how I can tackle this? I'm already drowning financially and will not be able to borrow any money.

Kim has responded to suggestions from a number of people and has setup a 'gofundme' campaign. I will say up front that I have already contributed to it and urge others to help Kim out. The link https://www.gofundme.com/26rpg65w takes you directly to the site and will allow you to read Kim's own explanation of what has happened to him. Keep the chin up, Kim - we are there for you.

30TH GRAN PREMIO CANTONES, LA CORUÑA, SPAIN, SATURDAY 28 MAY

I have borrowed Emeterio Valiente's report for the IAAF (see http://www.iaaf.org/news/report/la-coruna-liu-wang1).

For the second consecutive year, Chinese walkers Liu Hong and Wang Zhen took line honours at the XXX Gran Premio Cantones de La Coruna 2016, the Spanish leg of this year's IAAF Race Walking Challenge. In doing so, the current world record holder Liu managed her fourth overall victory in La Coruña and the third in a row.

Men 20km Race Walk

The men's event started quite conservatively, with a huge leading group ticking off the early laps close to 4:05. The first real surge was made by the eventual winner Wang shortly after the 5km point. The defending champion built a slight gap on the main group but he was reeled in 2km later. Brazil's Caio Bonfim then moved to the front and was to the fore when 8km was reached in 32:32 and Sweden's Perseus Karlstrom also helped with the pace so that halfway was reached in 40:39. To the joy of the local crowd the 2015 world champion Miguel Angel Lopez stayed with the leaders although he never took command of the race.

The real fireworks began around 5km from home when Mexico's Pedro Daniel Gomez stepped up the rhythm, setting a frantic pace which only Wang, Lopez and Italy's Alex Schwazer could match. A penultimate loop of 3:52 by Zhen dropped Gomez and López but the Italian managed to remain at the Chinese walker's shoulder until the closing 600m when the defending La Coruna champion and IAAF World Championships Beijing 2015 silver medallist finally shook him off.

Wang clocked 3:48 for his final 1km to win in 1:20:17 while Lopez finished third in 1:20:34 with Gomez another five seconds further back. Spain's 2015 world champion was more than satisfied with his performance after his injury problems over the winter and a

below-par outing in Rome earlier this month. "Today's is an enormous confidence booster. I've clocked 1:20 which was my goal. I now plan two training camps in the altitude of Sierra Nevada in June and Font Romeu in July to get ready for Rio," said Lopez.

Australian Jared Tallent was forced to retire at around the half way mark, obviously still tired from this 50km walk of 3 weeks ago.

Women 20km Race Walk

Held on a wet and slippery circuit by the Atlantic coast, due to the rain that fell in the hours prior to the early evening event, the women's race started at a relatively modest pace set by the Chinese pair of Liu and Qieyang Shenjie, first and second at the IAAF World Race Walking Team Championships in Rome three weeks ago. It became clear from the early splits that the world record of 1:24:38 set by Liu on the same circuit 12 months ago was not in jeopardy on this occasion.

Liu broke away from her compatriot 2km into the race but Qieyang caught her just before the 7km mark and they stayed together well ahead the rest of the field until just after the midway point, which was reached in 44:20. Shortly afterwards, Liu injected a brisker pace and gradually opened up a sizeable margin on Shenjie. Liu's rhythm over the second half of the race proved to be significantly faster than the opening 10km and she even overtook a lot of male walkers – the women and men's races started with 20 minutes' difference but on the same 1km circuit – on her way to an overwhelming win. At the tape, Liu was timed at 1:27:43 to continue her unbeaten year and take her fourth straight victory, finishing 47 seconds ahead of Qieyang.

"I felt OK today but the weather conditions were not as favourable as last year, my legs were not very fluent so I couldn't go for a faster time; but I'm delighted with my hat-trick of consecutive wins and I now look forward to competing at the Rio Olympics," said Liu.

Behind the top two, there was a fine fight for the last place on the podium between the Italian duo of Eleonora Giorgi and Elisa Rigaudo, Portugal's Ines Henriques and Guatemala's Mirna Ortiz. Giorgi, eventually prevailed in 1:29:23 with 2013 La Coruna winner Henriques fourth just five seconds further back. Ortiz took fifth in 1:29:30 with Riguado sixth in 1:29:40.

Of the two Australians, **Regan Lamble** finished a fine 8th with 1:30:58 while **Claire Tallent** finished 23rd in 1:35:36, down on her Naumburg walk of the previous weekend but still another Olympic qualifier.

RUSSIANS STAND OUT AS MAIN OFFENDERS IN 2008 OLYMPIC DRUGS RE-TEST FAILURES

A bombshell was dropped several weeks ago with the announcement that 31 athletes had failed drugs related retests from the 2008 Olympics. Last week, a further bombshell emerged with the news that 14 of the 31 effected athletes were Russian (the other 17 were spread across 11 countries). While the Russian Olympic Committee (ROC) has said it will not give the names of the athletes until their B samples are tested and until official disciplinary proceedings are started, Russian media has reported the names which are believed to be

Yes, that's right. Yet another Russian walker bites the dust with the naming of Denis Nizhegorodov. I am so disappointed as I had thought that he might be the one good apple in the rotten bag. It now turns out that the whole bag looks rotten.

And it may not end there. The IOC has just announced the results of re-tests of the London 2012 Games this week and there are 8 more Russian names on that list. Russia must now be starting to really sweat. Their athletics federation announced last Tuesday that it would not allow athletes who had been caught doping in previous years into the Russian team for the Rio Games. Perhaps they are hoping this concession might be sufficient to get a Rio berth. They are truly clutching at straws here but when you are desperate, you will obviously promise anything.

The IAAF will decide on June 17 whether Moscow has done enough to clean up its act and be readmitted to competition and this year's Olympics in Rio but I have my doubts if it will be a YES. As more and more nails are hammered into their coffin, the lid mist be closing ever more firmly. Calls for a blanket ban of the entire Russian team have grown louder with every twist of this scandal that has rocked world sport.

So let's look at the races in which Nizhegorodov featured from 2008 onwards. In May 2008, he broke Nathan Deakes' 50km World Record with a time of 3:34:14 when winning the World Cup in Cheboksary. Obviously if he failed a drugs test at the Olympics, he may well have been 'hot' 3 months before, but alas he gets to keep that one. No joy for Nathan as yet. Note that Kanyakin and Schwazer in second and third place are also convicted drugs cheats. So we have the dreadful case there all 3 medallists in the event are known drugs cheats.

Come the Olympics, Jared Tallent came second to convicted drugs cheat Schwazer and Nizhegorodov was third. If Nizhegorodov now goes, Jesus Garcia will be awarded the bronze, his first ever Olympic Medal out of 6 attempts and now aged 46.

Come 2011, winner Bakulin was retrospectively banned in 2015 and Nizhegorodov currently has the gold. Alas, Jared is far from guaranteed to be crowned 2011 world champion. Unless it is proved that Nizhegorodov has doped on another occasion, protocol dictates his results will only be annulled for the two-year period from the date of the 2008 Beijing Olympic race: spanning 2009 and 2010. In that case, Nizhegorodov's win in the 50km at the 2011 world champions in Daegu would stand and Jared would therefore remain silver medallist. If further re-tested samples from Nizhegorodov return positive however, he would face a life ban which would get Jared another retrospective win. Two positive tests typically trigger life bans in sport.

Yes, it's a dirty world with * against the names of just about all the medallists listed above. No wonder they medalled so consistently.

In the absence of a further positive being discovered, Tallent will again fall on the wrong side of a rival's doping ban. He has built an unenviable reputation as one of the most hard-done by athletes on the planet with an extraordinary record of competing against proven cheats.

SCHWAZER UNDER THE DRUGS SPOTLIGHT AGAIN

Roger Pielke, Jr., a professor at the University of Colorado at Boulder, maintains a very comprehensive sports blog which honed in on Alex Schwazer last Tuesday. It is well worth a read – http://leastthing.blogspot.de/2016/05/revisiting-doping-cover-up-guest-post.html. Here are a few bits from that blob

In June 2013, the New York Times reported on an alleged cover-up by anti-doping officials involving Schwazer. The paper reported that prior to the 2012 London Olympics, Italian T&F officials and the IAAF had evidence that Schwazer, who won gold at the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing, used performance-enhancing drugs but that these organizations made no effort to prevent him from competing in the London games. Luckily Schwazer was ultimately caught by WADA shortly before the 2012 London Olympics. The NYT reported "neither the Italian federation nor the IAAF moved to stop Schwazer from competing in the Olympics." An Italian prosecutor explained, "this circumstance can only be explained by the desire to 'preserve' a national track and field star for the 2012 London Olympic Games, in the expectation that he would perform well for Italy both in the 20 and the 50 km walk race." On May 8 of this year, the German TV channel ZDF had a special investigative report about Schwazer that adds further details to the possibility of a cover-up by sports officials. After about 4 minutes into the ZDF report they reveal a table showing Schwazer's blood values for the time period 2010-2012. His blood values from May 21st 2010 are remarkable; they are in fact extreme and need an explanation, since they clearly suggest some type of blood manipulation or EPO doping. His values from the spring of 2012 are also a bit suspicious, but completely "innocent" compared to the values from May 21, 2010. Nevertheless, it seems that the values from 2012 were the ones that triggered WADA's doping investigation against Schwazer (he was caught the last part of July 2012) and which motivated the charges against Italian and IAAF officials that they were aware that that Schwazer used EPO, but did not report it.

It is pretty incriminating stuff and does make a convincing case. Yet while the Russian Federation has come out to say that, if readmitted to Rio, it will not select any athletes with previous drugs failures, the Italian Federation is doing all in its power to fast track their own beloved convicted drugs cheat. They should be ashamed of themselves. Schwazer should not be in the 2016 Olympics – he should be out for a full Olympic cycle.

Tuesday 24 May

- The IOC has informed the Russian Olympic Committee (ROC) that 14 Russian athletes are suspected of using doping at the 2008 Summer Olympic Games in Beijing, a source in the ROC told TASS on Tuesday. Suspicions emerged against the Russians after their doping samples were re-examined at the initiative of the IOC. "The ROC has received the respective documents," a member of the national Olympic Committee said. The names of suspects have not been revealed but reports say that the majority of them are track and field athletes. See http://tass.ru/en/sport/877679.
- Russia's 2012 Olympic champion in high jumps Anna Chicherova is suspected of doping abuse at the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing where she won a bronze medal, Chicherova's personal coach Yevgeny Zagorulko said on Tuesday.

Tuwei said he also fears the group of athletes will try and disrupt the Kenyan national championships, which start Thursday and will act as trials for the African championships next month. Athletes linked to the Professional Athletes Association of Kenya occupied the federation building for two days in November in protest at alleged corruption by officials and their failure to deal with the country's doping problems. The 23 London athletes are in addition to the 31 who tested positive in retesting from the Beijing Olympics. The IOC said Friday that another sample from Beijing has since shown "abnormal parameters," and the case was being followed up. Including the new retest results, the total number of doping cases for the past two Summer Olympics has soared to 32 for London and 57 for Beijing. - The International Canoe Federation (ICF) is investigating after mass doping failures by Romania and Belarus canoe sprinters, many of whom were to compete in Rio. They were each reportedly caught following a surprise visit during a training camp by testers led by former cyclist Christophe Bassons. According to Le Monde, other doping equipment was reportedly seized during the raid, although full details remain hazy. It's a mixed bag with meldonium and Human Growth Hormone (HGH) quoted.
