WALKER OF THE WEEK

My Walker of the Week this time around goes to 18 year old Melbourne walker Adam Garganis who scored an inaugural win in the Victorian 30km roadwalk championship last Sunday morning. His time of **2:23:39** was a very impressive 15 minute PB and confirms Adam's wonderful potential over the longer distances. It is only just over a minute outside Michael Harvey's U20 club record and Adam still has a year to go in the U20 ranks.

- And talking of Australian Champs, the Australian Masters 20km Roadwalk Championships will be held in Adelaide on Sunday 28 August. Note that these championships were originally gazetted for 20th August and are now a week further back.

It's not long now until the walks are on in Rio. Dates for the walks are as follows (with Melbourne times shown as well)

Bad luck for Jared Tallent who has had to withdraw from the men's 20km with a slight hamstring niggle. Jared is playing it safe and keeping his powder dry now for the 50km. Chris Erickson had the chance to take up the vacant 20km spot but has opted to just keep with the one walk (the 50km), rather than change his game plan at such late notice.

The walkers have been doing their final preparations at an Athletics Australia holding camp in Florida and are flying out to Rio in 2 batches. The 20km men have already flown out (as they compete first) and the 20km women and 50km men are flying into Rio later this week. They all got together on the Opening Ceremony day and showed off their formal uniforms. Very nice!

Last Sunday saw the Victorian Roadwalk Championships at Middle Park, along with a series of VRWC club championships. It was another big day with 59 walkers in action. As mentioned at the start of the newsletter, **Adam Garganis** dominated the men's 30km Victorian Championship, winning in a huge PB of 2:23:39. Ballarat walker **Sarah Brennan** was also in fine form, winning the women's 30km championship in her first ever 30km walk, her time an impressive 2:58:36.

- Final entry lists for Rio at https://www.iaaf.org/competitions/olympic-games/the-xxxi-olympic-games-5771/athletes. There will be record sized fields for the marathons with 159 entrants for the men's race and 160 entrants for the women's race. Previously the biggest fields assembled for the Olympic marathons were 124 for the men in Atlanta and 118 for the women in London. The walks fields are as follows: 20km Men (77 starters), 20km women (76) and 50km men (81).
- The Tokyo Organizing Committee of the Olympic and Paralympic Games released an estimate on July 25 that the costs for setting up temporary venues at the 2020 Games will be around 280 billion yen, about four times the estimate at the time of Tokyo's Olympic bid. At a meeting of the committee's executive board, Committee President Yoshiro Mori criticized the sloppiness of the earlier estimate, saying, "There are so many problems with the Olympic bid portfolio that if you brought up all the finer points there'd be no limit." The estimated cost of the 2020 Olympics in the bid portfolio was 734 billion yen, but due to factors such as higher materials prices, there are estimates that the cost could nearly reach 2 trillion yen. - Colombian Luis Fernando Lopez won bronze in the World Athletics 20km walk in Daegue, Korea, in 2011 with a time of 1:20:38, finishing behind the Russians Valery Borchin and Vladimir Kanaykin. Following retests done in March this year, the IAAF officially announced the disqualification of two Russian athletes, thus giving Colombia's first World Championship gold to him. He finally received his gold in Colombia on Tuesday 26th July in an official presentation. The 37 year old walker will compete in Rio and I am sure he will now have an extra spring in his stride. Tuesday 26 July

- Russian whistleblowers Yuliya and Vilalt Stepanovs were interviewed by the BBC just a day after criticising the IOC for banning Yuliya, 30, from Rio. Good interview. "Russian drug cheats will be competing at next month's Olympic Games despite efforts to eradicate them." See http://www.bbc.com/sport/olympics/36898590.
- Lord Moynihan, former chairman of the British Olympic Association, has called for the WADA to be totally reformed, blaming the lame-duck institution for the shambles that has brought Rio 2016 into disrepute. 'WADA has failed in its duty to clean athletes,' he said. 'The Russian whistleblowers, Stepanova and her husband sent WADA some 200 emails dating back to 2010. But WADA did not respond. It was only because of journalists in Britain and on German TV that they finally, belatedly, started to take the issue seriously. Now we are in the situation where international federations have just days to tackle the validity of their athletes. It puts them in an impossible situation. Why has it taken six years to get to this stage? This must have deep and far-reaching consequences for WADA. See http://www.iol.co.za/sport/athletics/lame-duck-wada-must-be-overhauled-2049521.

Wednesday 27 July

- 28-year-old Indian shot put champion Inderjeet Singh has tested positive for a banned substance just days before heading to the Olympic Games in Rio. Singh is the second Rio-bound Indian athlete to fail a doping test after wrestler Narsingh Yadav, 26, last week tested positive for a banned steroid. See http://www.bbc.com/sport/olympics/36896421.
- A remarkable online petition got underway a couple of weeks ago to ask the IOC to reinstate Russian whistleblower Julia Stepanowa who is banned from Rio even though she sacrificed all to lay open the dreadful Russian doping regime. See <u>https://www.change.org/p/do-not-punish-the-whistleblower-julia-stepanowa-for-rio</u>. Sadly, even though the signature count currently stands at just on 270,000, the IOC has not responded. What crap!
- Eleven weightlifters, including six medallists, produced positive samples in the second wave of doping retests from the 2012 London Olympics, the International Weightlifting Federation said on Wednesday. Russia's five-times European champion Nataliya Zabolotnaya was among three silver medallists from the London Games to fail tests along with compatriots Alexandr Ivanov and Svetlana Tzarukaeva. Other London medallists to fail tests included Iryna Kulesha of Belarus, Armenia's Hripsime Khurshudyan and Moldova's Cristina Iovu. The IWF said the 11 athletes have all been provisionally suspended. All the athletes who tested positive were found to have used the banned anabolic steroid Dehydrochlormethyltestosterone. In this month's IAAF ban list, the name of the Chinese 20km walk world record holder Liu Hong stands out. The race walker who won the 2016 World Teams Championship gold in Rome in May has been given a 1 month ban, to be served from 13th June to 13th July. Apparently, she tested positive in Rome to Higenamine, also known as Norcoclaurine HLC, which is legal for use within food supplements in the UK, USA and Canada, but banned inother places. Sunday 7 August

Russia has been banned from the Rio 2016 Paralympic Games after the International Paralympic Committee (IPC) confirmed it has suspended the membership of the Russian Paralympic Committee. The IPC announced its decision at a media conference overnight in Rio, two weeks after opening suspension proceedings in response to what the McLaren Report alleged was "an unimaginable scale of institutionalised doping in Russian sport that was orchestrated at the highest level." IPC President Sir Philip Craven said the decision was the only appropriate response after the Russian Paralympic Committee failed to provide evidence which disproved the damning findings of the McLaren Report released on July 18. Subject: Doping Allegations In The Sunday Times of August 7th 2016

On Sunday 7th August, 2016 the Sunday Times featured allegations against Major Michael Rotich who is the Team Manager for Athletics to the 2016 Rio Olympic Games. Following this, Major Rotich has been removed from the Games Village in Rio and sent back to Kenya.

The Anti-Doping Agency of Kenya (ADAK) has been empowered by the 2016 Anti-Doping Act and has in place Kenya Anti-Doping Rules that govern anti-doping efforts in Kenya. We would like to assure our athletes and Kenyans that these allegations are indeed grave and we will spare no effort in ensuring that any individual(s) associated with doping face justice. Consequently the following are the courses of action that will take place to address this issue:

 The Directorate of Criminal Investigation to follow the necessary due process to establish whether or not the individual has committed a crime as per the Kenyan Criminal Law (Anti-Doping Act) and prosecute the matter in the courts accordingly.

 ADAK to immediately begin investigations into the allegations for a possible Anti-Doping Rule Violation. If found within violation of the rules he will be subject to sanctions and any other disciplinary measures in line with the antidoping rules.

We will keep you appraised on further developments in this case. ADAK's key responsibility is to protect the clean athletes of Kenya and we shall not rest in our mandate.

Tuesday 9 August

- The problems are stacking up for Kenya at the Olympics the new doping scandal(see above), ineligible athletes, missing
 plane tickets, and now bad blood between the track and field federation and the national Olympic committee. And their top

- The International Judo Federation said on Monday that Kosovo's judo gold medallist Majlinda Kelmendi had refused to
