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WHAT'S COMING UP

- Next Sunday 10th September, we wind up proceedings with our long distance walks day. Entries for the Victorian 50km championship must be made with Athletics Victoria via their online portal at http://athsvic.org.au/event/av-50km-walks-championships/. The RWA women's 50km, the VRWC 35km and the VRWC 6 Hours Walk also require pre-entry via our VRWC online portal at http://yrwc.org.au/wp1/. Entries for the 20km and 10km can be made on the day but we still prefer that walkers use our VRWC online entry portal if they can. It makes it easier to plan the day. A couple of clarifications
 - All VRWC entrants in the 50km and 6 Hour events are automatically entered in the VRWC 35km club championship. It is also possible to enter this event as a standalone event.
 - The AV 50km and VRWC 35km are Open events, meaning they are open to men and women.

MANX 20KM & BRITISH 50KM ROADWALK CHAMPIONSHIPS, ISLE OF MAN, SUNDAY 3 SEPTEMBER

Conditions were pretty horrendous on Sunday at Douglas for the Isle of Man 20km and British 50km championships, but you can't keep a keen bunch of walkers away just because of some unseasonal weather. And **Paul deMeester** was there and has sent me a report and photos. Thanks Paul!

BRITISH WOMEN WALKERS PROVIDED THEIR 50KM NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP ON THE ISLE OF MAN

The Isle of Man, an island in the Irish Sea between Ireland and northern England has a strong long-distance race walk tradition, even though it has but 85,000 inhabitants. The legendary Parish Walk, an 85-mile race, traces its roots to 1852 and had over 1,100 participants in its most recent edition last June. The annual End to End 40-mile race is held in less than two weeks.

With that history, a 50km race may well be classified locally as a sprint race. One of the local athletics clubs, the Manx Harriers, were able to organize the 50km British Nationals on short notice. Given the recent ascendancy of women 50km walkers onto the world stage, the race also served as the inaugural British Women's 50km national championship.

Even though the weather disappointed – rendering the race more suitable for the Winter League Series – the race did not. Shortly after the joint start, a trio consisting of **Dale Farquhar**, **Adam Cowin** and **Richard Gerrard** formed the lead pack in the men's race, followed closely by **Matt Haddock**. Among the women, Dale's better half **Jayne Farquhar** took an early lead, never to look back, in the process passing her ailing hubby Dale further into the race.

Cowin eventually assumed the lead in solo fashion. Haddock, nursing a nagging foot injury, stepped aside after 8km. Gerrard faced the red paddle shortly thereafter. Before the race was half-way, Cowin had slowed markedly and eventually

stepped off course. From then on, the race belonged to **Dave Walker**. Adrian Edwards was close by, but with about 12km to go, he had to yield second to **James Quirk**. Early leader Dale Farquhar was the first to miss out on an individual medal.

On the women's side, Jayne Farquhar built up her lead to exactly a lap (1km) over second placed **Louise Hollings.** The two of them walked together until near the end of the race, when Hollings unlapped herself and stayed a bit in front of the eventual race winner. What was amazing about the women's race was that all four starters finished, with 20-year old **Rebecca Greatbatch** signaling future promise and **Sharon Cain** persisting despite severe muscle issues, addressed during two race breaks with leg massages. Sharon hung in there, though, and completed her race.

Among the spectators was Hannah Hunter, who walked a 1:47:29 over 20km last June. She is eager to tackle the 50km, as she likes endurance racing. Expect her in the mix soon. Don't be surprised if she dons British team colors now that women 50K-ers are finally getting opportunities at the longer distance.

Also spectating were two of the 50km event's top performers, Poland's **Damian Blocki** (3:51:12 PB) and Britain's **Dominic King** (3:55:48 PB). Both had a unique perspective, being on the same course at the same time as the 50K racers while contesting the 20km event. Dom King won that race but Blocki was purposefully slower than his recent PB of 1:21:29 set last month during the World Championships at the London Mall.

Blocki was pacing New Zealand's **Alana Barber**, who was aiming to post a 1:32:00 result to impress her nation's qualifying powers for a spot on her national Commonwealth Games Team. New Zealand is one of those countries in which meeting the Olympic, Worlds or Commonwealth entry standards is virtually meaningless as the national federations impose much more stringent entry standards of their own. It was a shame to see Alana on the sidelines of the 2017 World Championships 20km race when she should have been in it, having comfortably met the IAAF qualifying standard with minutes to spare. If she were a U.S. citizen, she would not have to worry. U.S. athletes who beat the IAAF entry standard during the qualifying period and finish in the top three (or five for the World Team Championships) at the Trials race, are selected for the national team for the Olympics or Worlds. If New Zealand, Sweden and South Africa, among others, would adopt the U.S. non-subjective approach, our sport would be much encouraged as more walkers would have something to aim for.

The rain and wind on the back portion of the course probably prevented Barber from achieving her aim, falling 3:50 short of her goal. But she was impressive, nevertheless, and did not seek any excuses. Equally impressive was **Erika Kelly**, clocking her second sub-1:42 performance this year. The 25-year old has improved by twenty minutes over 20km since her April 2016 performance at Hillingdon. Tackling the distance for the first time was 20-year **Tom Partington**, who posted a 1:41:27 benchmark that he will be probably beat soon.

Speaking of youth, it was a delight to watch teenagers **Alice Bellando** and **Abbie Edwards** as well as sisters **Grayse and Lillie Fletcher**, respectively seven and five years young, put on a collective technique clinic in the support races. The little ones stole hearts with their upbeat attitude and race craft. Too bad no IAAF headquarters officials were on hand to see these four youngsters. Watching the future of our sport in action would have turned the powers that be into instant supporters of women's race walking.

13TH CHINESE NATIONAL GAMES, HENAN, CHINA, 2-7 SEPTEMBER

The 13th Chinese National Games are currently underway in Tianjin and Luoyang, Henan in September 2017. It is a huge event, with a total of 341 events in 31 sports will be held at the games, over 10,000m athletes in total, representing 38 delegations, including a People's Liberation Army. 20km Walk Women, Sunday 3 September

World champion **Yang Jiayu** proved her victory in London three weeks ago was not just a flash in the pan, as she withstood challenges from **Qieyang Shijie** in the last kilometre to win the 20km race walk at the Chinese National Games in Tianjin on Sunday. The 21-year-old clocked 1:28:29 to win the gold medal, four seconds ahead of Qieyang, the 2012 Olympic silver medallist. Li Leilei from Tianjin clocked 1:34:37 to grab the bronze medal in front of a jubilant local crowd.

"Winning at the World Championships was a big boost of confidence for me and these two titles will encourage me to train even harder in the future," said Yang, who trimmed 17 seconds off her personal best to claim the world title in London in 1:26:18. "But once I stepped off the podium, it was a brand new start for me," she added. "My next goals will be the 2019 World Championships as well as the Olympic Games in Tokyo."

In spite of the absence of world record-holder and Olympic champion Liu Hong, who is currently pregnant, the women's 20km race walk was still a high-quality race. A fast lead group, including Yang, Qieyang, 2015 world silver medallist Lyu Xiuzhi, and Wang Na, who finished eighth at the World Championships last month, paced the race in the early stages.

Wang was disqualified before halfway. Defending champion Lyu, who was disqualified last month in London in the home straight with a chance of podium finish at her fingertips, was once again sent out by the referee with five kilometres to go. Yang and Qieyang then led side by side until the last kilometre before the in-from Yang pulled away in style for the win.

20km Walk Men, Sunday 3 September

In the men's 20km race walk, world leader **Wang Kaihua** clocked 1:20:52 to take the victory. **Bian Tongda** finished second in 1:21:01 and the bronze medal went to **Chen Rui** who hit home with a 1:21:59 clocking. **Chen Ding**, the 2012 Olympic champion, settled for fifth place in a season's best of 1:23:02, while Olympic silver medallist **Cai Zelin** was disqualified after 18 kilometres. Olympic champion **Wang Zhen** chose to skip the competition.

"I just want to prove myself with this gold medal," said the seventh-place finisher from the World Championships in London, who was in flying form earlier this year and set a PB of 1:17:54 in March to sit on top of the 2017 world list. "Four years ago I missed the National Games due to injuries," said the 23-year-old. "This time I have given it all out."

ATHLETICS NZ ROADWALK CHAMPIONSHIPS, CHRISTCHURCH, SATURDAY 2 SEPTEMBER

David Lonsdale reports on the NZ Roadwalk Championhips which we held last Sunday in Christchurch

I must be getting old. I thought a few of our walkers were very brave racing with no thermal tops in the coldest part of the day last Saturday. At 6C with a southerly wind and showers, walking fast and finishing as quick as possible was a good idea which a few tried to do. Unfortunately the judges were out there for the duration. But despite the weather it was a good set of races.

With five and ten kilometre races combined, Jamie Shaw set a fast pace early but was caught and passed by Jonathon Lord Laura Langley closed on Jonathon for a while. FINNKAMPEN 2017, OLYMPIC STADIUM, STOCKHOLM, 2-3 SEPTEMBER

Finnkampen, is a yearly athletics international competition held since 1925 between Finland and Sweden. This year it was held on the weekend of 2-3 September in Stockholm, with the 2 walks being held together on Saturday. Finland took the honours in the walks with 25 points to Sweden's 19 (its sixth win in a row) but Sweden ultimately dominated both senior team competitions, winning the men's contest with 216 points to Finland's 188, and the women's contest with 232.5 points to Finland's 177.5.

In the men's race, **Perseus Karlström** was the favorite to win his fifth straight victory in the men's 10,000m walk and he was soon in front and on record pace. With splits of 19:32 and 19:25, he stopped the clock in a new Swedish record of 38:57.45, beating Stefan Johansson's 1995 time of 39.02.1. **Jarkko Kinnunen** took second in his tenth Finnkamp (40.43.56) and **Anders Hansson** came through to finish third with 42.47.86.

Elisa Neuvonen, who was second last year, won the women's 5000m with a PB 22:51.75 ahead of **Tiia Kuikka** (PB 23.21.83) and Monica Svensson (15th Finnkampen 23.40.71) **Siw Karlström** came fifth, beating Heather Carr's W60 World Record with her time of 25.56.35. Siw, who is now 60 years old and the mother of Perseus, was the 1986 European 10km race walk bronze medallist so has pretty good credentials!

MORE ON DRUGS IN SPORTS

Western Australian walker Daniel Lowe responds to last week's article on sporting supplements, and adds further information. Thanks Daniel!

I read with interest your article regarding the risks associated with taking supplements.

I've been meaning to write to you in the hope that you could also issue a warning on the dangers of social media advertising in relation to SARMs (Selective Androgen Receptor Modulators). Lately I've been seeing advertisements in my Facebook news feed promoting SARMs. I didn't know what they were until I did a bit of my own research online. It didn't take long for me to become alarmed by what I learned.

SARMs are promoted as having the benefits of steroids or prohormones without the side effects (which is untrue). One of the products being sold under the SARMs banner that caught my attention is the "fat burner" known as GW501516 or "Cardarine". It's also known as Endurobol. If that rings alarm bells, it's probably because it's the same substance that Russian, Elena Lashmanova, tested positive to and was subsequently banned for taking. Or it could be because WADA took the rare and unprecedented step in 2013 of warning cheats about the dangers associated with using GW501516. You can read WADA's alert here.

From what I can gather, GlaxoSmithKline abandoned research into GW501516 as a developmental drug during pre-clinical trials in 2007 when it was found to cause cancer to develop rapidly in several organs in rodents. Those promoting these products would have you believe that the rodents were administered outrageously high doses, well above what is recommended for humans but this is misleading. One of the reasons rodents are used in medical testing is because their genetic, biological and behaviour characteristics closely resemble those of humans, and many symptoms of human conditions

can be replicated in mice and rats. However, rodents eliminate drugs from their bodies much faster than humans, so they have to receive higher doses to see the same effects. Frankly, if a pharmaceutical giant like GSK abandoned research into the drug, that should say something as far as I'm concerned.

Other SARMs are targeted towards bodybuilders and the like. From what little research has been done on SARMs, they are known to suppress natural testosterone production, adversely affect the endocrine system and, like GW501516, there's evidence they can increase the risk of cancer too.

If you can believe it, there are Australian suppliers of these so-called "supplements". Despite the advertising and marketing obviously targeting athletes or anyone with an interest in health and fitness, you will find disclaimers on their websites stating that the products are for research purposes only and not for human use. My posts on one supplier's Facebook page warning athletes about the fact their products are banned by WADA were promptly deleted, showing how little they care about the welfare of the people who might buy their products.

If a weekend masters warrior like me can be targeted by social media advertising in this manner, I'm sure others are likely being targeted by these ads on social media too.

I would just like to reinforce the message you have already delivered. Take supplements at your own risk and do your homework before you consider taking anything!
