WALKER OF THE WEEK

We had 3 walkers setting new VRWC club records last weekend – Margaret Beaumont (W80) in Adelaide and Gwen Steed (W75) and Darcey Roberts (Girls U11) in Melbourne. You can read about their fine performances later in the newsletter.

Now any one of them could have been my Walker of the Week, but I have decided to give the final accolate to 76 year old VRWC walker **Gwen Steed**. Walking at Middle Park on Saturday, she powered through the 10km roadwalk in **1:12:59**, to break her own VRWC W75 record. That comes in at a hefty 90.84% on the age graded tables. She is now just outside Sylvia Machin's Victorian W75 record of 1:12:54 and Lorna Thompson's Australian W75 record of 1:12:49. Next time!

Gwen has been steadily breaking all our VRWC W75 records since achieving that age milestone last year. This is her 13th record breaking walk in the last 12 months. Now that is impressive.

The VRWC Committee has asked me to draw walkers' attention to a new event on our winter season fixture, namely the VRWC Relays on Saturday 1st September. The idea is that teams of 4 walkers will race in handicap format over a total distance of 10km, with splits as follows: 3km, 1km, 2km and 4km. To allow us time to sort out teams, entries for this relay must be submitted by Saturday 25th August. We are still putting the final details together so entries will open next week.

It sounds like an exciting concept so I urge everyone to participate. I hear prizes are on offer for the winners. The timetable is shown below. Note this is also our Winter Season Presentations Day.



- There was a bit of a hiccup on the Athletics Australia entry panel for the Australian Roadwalk championships, to be held on Sunday 26th August on the Sunshine Coast in Queensland. Entries were supposed to close at 5PM on Monday 6th August but they closed in Friday evening. The panel was re-activated on Monday morning to allow any final entries and will now remain open till this Friday 10th August at 5PM. Enter at <u>https://winterwalks.eventdesq.com/</u>.
- Athletics Australia has announced two further key 2018/2019 Summer Season dates. The Australian/Oceania 20km Championship meet will be held in Adelaide at an earlier time than previously. It is now scheduled for Sunday 3rd February. I am not sure why it has been brought forward and whether any discussion was held with the walks community. Also, the Australian 10,000m track walk championships are now back with the Australian T&F Championships which will be held in Sydney at the end of March. I know a few people were concerned this year when the 10,000m walk champs were moved to Canberra in January. They can relax now that was always going to be a once off move which I completely supported.

THE EUROPEAN CHAMPIONSHIPS KICK OFF TODAY

Today sees the start of the highly anticipated **European Athletics Championships** in Berlin, which will run for 6 days, from 7^{th} to 12^{th} August (see <u>https://www.berlin2018.info/en/</u>). The walks are scheduled as follows (with the qualifying standards also shown)

The 50km walks kick proceedings off on day 1. The forecast is for 35C so it is going to be a war of attrition, with the last start. A 6AM start would have been better. It will be in the mid thirties by the time they finish in the early afternoon. But who could have guessed at the time that Europe was going to experience a summer like this one!

2020 OLYMPIC NEWS

With just on two years to go until the athletics action gets underway in the Japanese capital, the IAAF has published the qualification system for the Olympic Games Tokyo 2020. It's a new concept which was approved at the IAAF Council meeting in Buenos Aires last week and includes details of the entry numbers for each discipline and the qualification timeline. See the announcement at https://www.iaaf.org/competitions/olympic-games/news/olympic-games-tokyo-2020-qualification-system. There is a link in the article which lets you download your own copy of the document.

Athletes can qualify in one of two ways:

• By virtue of their IAAF world ranking position at the end of the qualification period (see last week's newsletter for this info) or by

• Achieving the entry standard within the qualification period (entry standards have not been released yet)

As previously announced, quotas will be in place for each event. For the walks, they are set as follows

20km Race Walk Men (60)

20km Race Walk Women (60)

50km Race Walk Men (60)

The Tokyo timetable has also been published: https://tokyo2020.org/en/games/sport/olympic-schedule/. Walks are as follows

20km Men	Friday 31 July 2020
20km Women	Friday 7 August 2020
50km Men	Saturday 8 August 2020

Sadly, the women's 50km is not yet in the mix, even though the IAAF has officially welcomed the women's 50km walk into its IAAF World Championships and into its IAAF World Race Walking Team Championships schedules. It's even in this year's European Championships, as well as gaining a foothold in most of the area championships.

Now that the announcement has finally been made, it's time to start the process of reversing this latest instance of gender discrimination. The IAAF is not exactly a role model here! The process has already kicked off with the President of the South American Athletics Federation writing to Seb Coe to express his concern. The letter follows

21ST AFRICAN SENIOR CHAMPIONSHIPS, ASABA, NIGERIA, 1-5 AUGUST

The 2018 African Senior Athletics Championships descended into chaos with countries such as Tanzania pulling out of the games over what they say was poor organization and a lack of communication from organizers. The games kicked off on Wednesday but many of the athletes were still hundreds of miles away from the venue, stranded at the Murtala Muhammad International airport in Lagos. The Kenyan team had arrived in Lagos on Monday afternoon but did not leave for Asaba, where the games are being held in southeast Nigeria, until Wednesday. Some of the athletes say they faced visa issues and others were forced to camp at the airport because there were no connecting flights.

Samuel Gathimba, the bronze medalist from the 2018 Commonwealth Games in Queensland, won the men's 20km championship, thus defending his 2016 African championship win (1:25:14). He was 11 secs clear of **Lebogang Shange** of South Africa. Third place went to Tunisian **Hassanina Sebei** in the same time as Shange – it must have been a hard fought race, with only 11 secs between the first 3.

Yanjaleye Beletewmitiku of Ethiopia won the women's walk by a big margin from Grace Wanjiru of Kenya. Wanjuri had come in as favourite and had been expected to retain her title, but finished more than 3 minutes behind the winner. Beletewmitiku won the bronze medal in the 2016 IAAF World U20 Championships 10,000m walk, held in the Polish city of Bydgoszcz, so came into the race with good credentials and produced the required big walk on the day.

The 23rd Central American and Caribbean Games have now been completed in Barranquilla, Colombia. Held every 4 years, the 2018 staging was a huge affair with almost 6000 athletes from 37 countries participating in 40 sports.

Due to the tropical conditions, the men's 50km walk opened proceedings at 6AM on Wednesday 1st August while the men's 20km started at 7AM on Thursday 2nd August. **Controversially, the women's 50km walk was not included, even though it is now proudly centre stage in most other international competitions.** In a further blow to female walkers, the 4 entries in the women's 20km was deemed to be below the minimum 5 required so that event was withdrawn. That meant that 2018 Race Walking World Teams Championship winner Maria Guadalupe González was not able to participate.

50km Walk Men, Wednesday 1 August, 6AM

32 year old Mexican Jose Leyver Ojeda won the men's 50km race walk win in very hot and humid conditions, with his wife and two daughters supporting him during the 50 lap loop course along the Malecon in Barranquilla.

20km Walk Men, Thursday 2 August, 7AM

20km world champion **Eider Arevalo** took the men's 20km gold as exoected on another very hot morning, the first Colombian to win the event for 12 years, when his countryman and 2011 World champion Luis Lopez took gold, also on home soil, in Cartagena in 2006. "This is special to compete at home with my mom and girlfriend watching. There is a special motivation to be here. To have my mom, my girlfriend and friends supporting is amazing," said Arevalo, who improved from silver in 2014. For the first time in 42 years, Mexico was out of the medals, with Andrés Olivas in fourth place (1.28.12).

OFF TO MALAGA!

Great article by Victorian Masters Assn newsletter editor Russ Dickenson in the latest issue of the VMA newsletter on three of our top Masters walker – see <u>https://vicmastersaths.org.au/wp-content/uploads/2018/07/FOOTPRINTS-AUGUST-2018.pdf</u>.

Over the last 25 years, Australia has dominated racewalking at the World Championships. We have had many World Champions and World Record holders. The names roll on...Murray Dickinson, Mark Donahoo, Ralph Bennett, Colin Heywood, Brenda Riley, Gwen Steed, Kelly Ruddick, most of them Victorians, but there are 3 Aussies who can lay claim to being the best ever Masters walkers - Lyn Ventris of WA and Victorians Andrew Jamieson and Heather Carr.

These three have owned their age groups and repeatedly set world records along the way.

Yet each of them have their own challenges coming up to this year's World Championships in Malaga, Spain.

Lyn Ventris

A most incredible walker and twice winner of the WMA Athlete of the year. In the 20km at the Sacramento Worlds in 2011, and at 54 years of age, Lyn beat the nearest female (of any age !!) home by 9 minutes and was only beaten home by 4 men !!! This is also regardless of age. More incredibly, Lyn and hubby John run a business in Bunbury and Lyn trains alone and has virtually no competitive racing.

After struggling with hamstring problems for over three years and exhausting all forms of treatment with no success, the only option for Lyn was surgery to re-attach a partially torn and much damaged hamstring tendon. The surgery in November 2013 was tough and the rehabilitation long and frustrating. It took twelve months of intense work with physios just to get back into training.

I should say that Lyn has always trained like an elite 25 year old and she is back to that now.

She missed the 2013 Worlds in Brazil but returned to win the treble of walks in Lyon in 2015. She struggled again at her home Worlds in Perth the next year but now I hear she is training hard again and hopeful of doing well in Malaga.

Heather Carr

Then there's Heather Carr, or as I like to call her, "Mrs. Unbeatable". Heather has dominated her age groups for many years, winning consecutively at Perth (2016), Lyon (2015), Porto Alegra (2013) and Sacramento (2011). and previously at San Sebastian (2005), Puerto Rico (2003), Brisbane (2001), Durban (1997). Throw in some World Indoor Championships that she has cleaned up in as well.

Immediately after the Perth Worlds, Heather had a hip replacement and it only seemed a fairly short time until she was back competing in AV Shield and walking well, and to me, didn't seem to be much slower. Malaga, however, will be a real challenge as there are some pretty impressive ladies racing against her.

Care to bet against her ?? Not me !!

• Andrew Jamieson

To my mind the best Male Masters Walker of all time is Andrew Jamieson. Few would disagree. Andrew has gone from age group to age group setting World Records and is a regular winner of World Championships.

Andrew debuted at the Durban and Gateshead Championships, winning minor medals but still not training hard due to his commitments as a Surgeon. By Brisbane 2001 he announced himself with a brilliant 20km win. He went on to win the 3 walks at each of the next 4 Championships - San Sebastian, Riccione, Lahti and Sacramento.

In Porto Alegro, he was pipped in the 5000m in a W.R. time but came back to win the 10km and 20km easily. He had problems in Lyon, winning only a silver. He bounced back in Perth with 3 Golds but has really struggled since with back, glute and hamstring issues similar to that suffered by Lyn Ventris. I've seen Andrew walk in recent weeks and he is quite handicapped and unable to stretch out at all. He is going to Malaga but may not be able to compete. Let's hope he can get over his injuries.
