2018 NSW STATE RELAY CHAMPIONSHIPS, SOPAC, SYDNEY, 24-24 NOVEMBER

The NSW State Relay Championships have, for many years now, included 4x1500m track walk relays, and this year saw 13 walk teams (that means 52 walkers) in action. The fastest time of the day was recorded by the Central Coast Open Men – a swift 23:27.37. Note that this was still nearly one minute outside the 1997 record of 22:44.21, set by Bankstown (I seem to remember Brent Vallance was part of that outstanding team). It's disappointing that the results do not include individual splits or names.

REGIONAL RACEWALK MEET, ERFURT, GERMANY, SATURDAY 17 NOVEMBER

Thanks to Udo Schaeffer for passing on the results of what was a very big indoor meet a week ago in Erfurt, Germany. The meet featured around 300 athletes from 54 athletics clubs. Included in the mix were 64 racewalkers from 25 clubs, covering a wide number of agegroups and competing in 1000m. 200m, 3000m and 1 Mile walks. Udo has ranked the performances on his points system with the top performances scoring over 100 points and anything over 80 points being regarded favourably. For the 3000m, 2000m and 1000m walks, his top performers were as shown below, with W15 waker **Mathilde Frenzl** leading the way with 13:36.80.

LES 8 HEURES D' ETAMPES-SUR-MARNE, ETAMPES-SUR-MARNE , FRANCE, 25 NOVEMBER

Emmanuel Tardi was in Etampes sur Marne, 100km east of Paris, last for their annual 8 hours race last Sunday. As always, it was well supported, with about 60 walkers who had come to compete in the streets of this small village of 1200 people. The lap was 2.5km long and included a very hard hill of 400m length, (32m height rise). The start was at 8AM, under a small by very cold rain, conditions which stayed for the full day.

Florian Letourneau led from start to finish in the men's 8 Hour race, winning with 75.0km, ahead of **Fabian Deparday** and **Mathieu Olivares**, both on 70km. **Christine Lepage** led the women's 8 Hour race early, before **Emilie Bizard** caught her, going on to win with 65.0km. Lepage held on for second place with 62.5km. The ancilliary 10km race was won by **David Stefannely**.

After the disappointment of the Corcieux race on October 28th, when he was stopped after 44km in his attempt to beat the M80 50km world best, Alexis Jordana was here for another attempt. He had special authorization and don't need to finish the race to have his 50km time ratified. He walked very evenly, beating the world best by more than 13 minutes with a time of 6:28:38. Alexis's 50m splits were 36'59, 37'52, 38'23, 38'26, 39'10, 39'46, 38'43, 39'11, 39'07 and 40'51.

Alexis was born on 10th Feb 1937 and began racewalking in 1954 as a junior. He finished 10th in the 1959 20km French Championship and 12th in 1961 (1:54:14). His first 50km was, as far as Emmanuel knows, was on 7th July 1963 in Cherbourg, when he finished with a time of 5:11:22. In Masters events, he has won 19 medals (including 5 golds) at World Championship level, starting with Melbourne in 1987 when he was 3rd in the M50 5000m (23:48), and 20 medals (2 golds) at European Championship level, starting with 1982.

OUT AND ABOUT

- It's not just in racewalking that Japan shows incredible depth. Consider the Ageo City Half Marathon, the world's greatest half marathon, where the top 55 broke 64 minutes, the top 114 broke 65 and 249th place was 66:59. - Almost two months after the last race in China, IAAF has revised the results of the 2019 IAAF Race Walking Challenge. The mistake was that no points were awarded at the European Championships in Berlin. On the women's side, this did not affect the top placings but on the men's side it resulted in a new winner. Before adjusting, Andres Chocho had won with 25 points, ahead of Eider Arevalo on 24, Lebogang Shange on 22 and Diego Garcia on 22. With his 20km second place in Berlin, Garcia now earns a further 5 points and wins the Challenge with a grand total of 27 points. - Doping has long been rife in Kazakhstan and we all know the huge issues being faced with doping in winter Olympic sports. Therefore, it should perhaps come as no surprise that 9 biathletes from Kazakhstan, including the country's entire women's Olympic team, were suspended last Thursday on suspicion of doping. The International Biathlon Union said the cases "are based on criminal investigations in Austria and Italy.". - Boxing is another sport in the firing line and may well miss out on the 2020 Olympics as the IOC is moving toward

- Russia continues to be as dirty as ever. RUSADA said last Wednesday that seven athletes in athletics and weightlifting have been given four-year bans for violating the country's anti-doping rules, with another being suspended for two years. - And in yet another example of Russia flouting its international reinstatement requirements, Alexander Zubkov, the double Olympic bobsled champion from Sochi 2014 who was stripped of his gold medals for doping, has had his medals reinstated by a Moscow court, which has overruled the decisions of the IOC and CAS. 30TH SUMMER UNIVERSIADE, NAPLES, ITALY, 3-14 JULY 2019

The Athletics Australia selection policy for the 2019 World University Games was published on 21 st Nov 2018. See http://athletics.com.au/Portals/56/High%20Performance/Documents/WUG/2019/World%20University%20Games%20Selection%20Policy%202019%20-%20v1.2a.pdf. Salient points are as follows

- Each country can be represented by up to 3 athletes in each walk event, all of whom must have achieved the FISU entry standard for the event.
- The Games are open to athletes born between 1st January 1994 and 31st December 2001 and either: enrolled and currently studying a diploma or higher courses at a university or TAFE* (*conditions apply) or other tertiary institution (please note deferred students are not eligible for selection) or have graduated from a university in the year immediately prior to the event (ie: graduated after 3 July 2018).
- Athletics Australia have gone with the published FISU standards which are more generous than in 2017.

 Women 20 Km Walk
 1:26:30
 1:40:33

• The qualifying period extends from 1 January 2018 to 1 May 2019.

The first placed eligible male and female walker from the Australian 20km Roadwalk Championship in Adelaide (10th Feb 2019) will be an Automatic Selection in the 2019 World University Games Team provided he/she has attained the Athletics Australia qualification standard. Other selections will be selected, subject to the AA Selectors' discretion.

FROM THE VAULTS - 1983 IN FOCUS

Late last week, I was sent a photo of the start in the 1983 Australian 50km Championship by Terry Jones, my regular Western Australian correspondent. The first thing I had to do was rummage out the results and then use them to identify all the walkers on the start line. With help from Terry and from Mark Wall, we got that all sorted out.

The next step was to decide what to write up around the photo. Interestingly, this was the third time in 5 stagings (in 1975, 1979 and 1983) that Western Australia had hosted the Australian 50km championship. In those days, the 50km was contested every second year until 1983 when it changed to an annual event).

Even though it was in Western Australia (a long and expensive trip for the many east coast walkers) and even though the August date meant it clashed with the 1983 Lugano Cup and the 1983 IAAF World Championships, there were still 15 starters. So I started to think about how many 50km walkers we had in those days. With that in mind, I rummaged through my archives to document the various 50km walks on offer that year. Here is what I found.

50km Races contested in 1983

With international 50km championships to be contested in August (the 1983 IAAF World Championships) and in September (the 1983 Lugano Cup), there were a number of local Australian 50km races scheduled in 1983. The following list is not definitive, but does capture the major meets.

The first 50km race that I can find is an invitational 50km, held in conjunction with the VAWC 35km Club Championship at Albert Park on Sunday 24th April. A large field of 19 walkers contested the 35km, with Victorian Mark Wall continuing on to complete the 50km.

VAWC Invitation 50km, Albert Park, Sunday 24th April

The Victorian 50km championship, controversially held in Melbourne a week before the 1983 LBG Carnival, saw 5 finishers and 9 non-finishers. A number of walkers chose to race over partial distances and then call it a day, given the 20 Miler to be contested in Canberra a week later. It was scheduled as a lead in to the Lugano Cup 50km trial, to be contested in NSW 5 weeks later.

The 1983 Lugano Cup 50km trial was held at the Holdsworth Army Base, Holdsworth, NSW, on Sunday 9th July. The course chosen was a tough hilly one and performances were effected. Michael Harvey started slowly but came through to pass Tim Erickson and take the win. The first 4 finishers, all Victorians, were duly selected in the Australian Lugano Cup 50km team.

The 1983 Australian Roadwalk Championships, which were held in Canning Vale, WA, on 27-28 August, included the Australian 50km Championship. This was seen as a fairly open event as it was scheduled only a couple of weeks after the IAAF World Championships and a month before the 1983 Lugano Cup, to which we were sending a large team. Consequently, many of the top Australian walkers were missing from Perth. This, of course, created an opportunity for the remaining walkers. Terry Jones has forwarded to me a great shot of the 50km start:

The Lugano Cup 50km in Bergen, Norway, saw Michael Harvey head out hard, matching it with the top walkers for the first half of the race. He paid mightily for his early efforts, fading badly and eventually suffering a disqualification. Bill Dyer, whose career had been one of continuous progression up till that point, also suffered a DQ. Tim Erickson and Duncan Knox both finished. Overall, there were 39 finishers, 6 DQs and 1 DNF.

In summary, 20 Australian walkers successfully completed 50km walks during 1983, with an additional number starting but failing to complete the challenge. There may well have been even more walkers involved, since my records do not extend to all the State titles. I have only listed the finishers in the Victorian 50km Championship. There may well have been further finishers in the NSW, SA, ACT, QLD and TAS titles. Anyway, the 1983 ranking list looks like this:

The following year saw the bar raised significantly, with Simon Baker and Andrew Jachno joining the 50km club, and with Willi Sawall returning from the 20km to his preferred 50km distance. From then on the standard quickly improved in quality, but not necessarily in quantity. 1983 was a very good year from a 50km depth perspective and probably remains one of our best ever.

The Australian challenge now is to regenerate that 1983 level of interest and depth in the 50km event. Other countries successfully showcase the 50km – the 2018 50km international ranking lists show the following numbers of walkers (male and female) from the leading countries:

China 54 (39, 15), Japan 53 (3, 10), Ukraine 18 (12, 6), Spain 17 (11, 6), USA 15 (8, 7), Russia 15 (8, 7), France 15 (13, 12), India 15 (15, 0), Poland 14 (10, 4) and Ecuador 12 (7, 5).
