WALKER OF THE WEEK

My Walkers of the Week are **Jemima Montag** and 28 year old **Rhydian Cowley**. Both were comfortable winners in the Open 10,000m Track Walk at the 2019 Oceania Championships in Townsville today.

- 21 year old Melbourne based Jemima walked superbly. While Katie Hayward has had her measure in recent races, Jemima reversed the trend today with a comfortable win, recording a 1 sec PB of 43:50.84 and finishing nearly 2 minutes clear of the field. Her time also set new Victorian and VRWC Open and U23 records (bettering her own PB of 43:51.47 done Sydney 2 months ago). Jemima has hardly put a foot wrong since winning the 2018 Commonwealth Games gold medal.
- 28 year old Rhydian also won comfortably, with a time of **41:57.57**. He has had a wonderful year, with PBs galore, along with 2 Olympic qualification 20km walks.

Special congrats also to their Melbourne based coach Brent Vallance who continues to produce the goods, year in and year out.

Both Jemima and Rhydian are already selected for this year's IAAF World Championships in Doha and have already put qualification times on the board for the 2020 Olympics. They won the Victorian 20km roadwalk championships in Melbourne two days ago and then fronted for Townsville and produced the goods. Alas, no photos from Townsville so here are a couple of photos from their winning 20km walks in Melbourne on Sunday.

2019 OCEANIA CHAMPIONSHIPS, TOWNSVILLE, JUNE 25-28, 2019

The **2019 Oceania Championships** (https://athletics-oceania.com) kicked off in Townsville, Queensland, yesterday with the official Opening Ceremony. Competition started today (Tuesday) and will continue until Thursday and sees teams from Australia, New Zealand and the other Pacific region countries going head to head in Open, U20 and U18 competitions.

The Open and U20 10,000m walks were on today (women at 1:40PM and men at 3:55PM) so I have been holding off on the newsletter 'send' button to see how everyone went. The Open 10,000m walks were part of the 2019 IAAF Race Walking Challenge Series so Series points were on offer.

The Open and U20 women were up first, at 1:40PM. With an occasionally cloudy day and a temperature around 24C, conditions were cooler than might be expected but it was still humid, with a blustery wind making for interesting conditions. We had most of our top Open women in attendance, but no walkers from any other countries. **Katie Hayward** has had **Jemima Montag**'s measure in recent races, but Jemima reversed the trend today with a comfortable win, recording a 1 sec PB of 43:50.84, nearly 2 minutes ahead of Katie. Her time also set new Victorian and VRWC Open and U23 records (bettering her own PB of 43:51.47 done Sydney 2 months ago). Third place went to **Claire Woods** and fourth went to **Beki Smith**, while the third official Australian representative, **Rachel Tallent**, was a DNF. Of the U20 women, **Anna Blackwell** was the only finisheer, with 56:46.40.

2019 MANX TELECOM PARISH WALK, ISLE OF MAN, 22-23 JUNE

I finish the results section of the newsletter with some news for our long distance walk enthusiasts. First to the Isle of Man....

The Manx Telecom Parish Walk is a walking race that takes place on the Isle of Man each year, usually on the weekend nearest to the Northern Summer solstice. The biggest walking event in the Isle of Man, it is so called because the walk passes through every parish on the Isle of Man, a total distance of 85 miles (137 km). Originally, walkers had to touch the door of each of the seventeen parish churches but nowadays electronic timing chips are worn. A time limit of 24 hours is enforced, and there are cut-off times for reaching each stage. Only a small number of walkers complete the full distance each year. Walkers may drop out at any of the stages, which correspond to each parish. You can read much more about it at https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Parish Walk.

This year, nearly 1400 walkers set off from the Isle of Man National Sports Centre in Douglas at 8AM on Saturday and an amazing 158 finished the full 85 very hilly but picturesque miles within the 24 hour cutoff. The first 8 attained the Gold standard (under 18 hours), the next 36 attained the Silver status (under 21 hours) and the remaining 112 finishers attained the Bronze standard, all beating the 24 Hour cutoff. Ramsey electrician **Liam Parker** won the gruelling Parish Walk challenge for the second time in three years late on Saturday evening when completing the 85 miles in a time of 15 hours 44 minutes and six seconds. Having been fifth on his debut 12 months ago, colourful Frenchman **David Vandercoilden** was second across the finish line at the War Memorial on Douglas Promenade some 23 minutes behind in 16:07.08. **Robbie Callister** racked up his 17th Parish Walk finish in third place in a time of 16:38.20, ahead of the vastly improved **Paul Sayle** in 16:53.19. Castletown centurion **Andrew Titley** was fifth in 17:10.05 and and **Terry Moffat** sixth in 17:30.58. Five-time winner **Richard Gerrard** stopped at Andreas after less than 10 hours of walking, he was one of several leading names to succumb to the hot and sunny conditions.

Emma Shilling was thoroughly exhausted when she crossed the finish line to win the women's race in seventh place overall with a time of 17:47.09. The Douglas woman's time of gave her a winning margin of almost 28 minutes over **Karen Lawrie** (18:15.14) in joint 11th place. Early leader **Jayne Farquhar** retired at Kirk Michael, shortly before half-distance and 2018 winner **Bernie Johnson** slowed significantly in the final 15 miles to finish third (18:32.22) in 14th place overall.

Owen Dudley took the men's under-21 title (6:42:14), while **Danielle Barton** crossed the line first in the women's under-21 field (6:58:33), in a race which finishes in Peel, 32.5 miles (52km) from the start.

FROM THE VAULTS – THE AUSTRALASIAN 7 MILE CHAMPIONSHIPS, 1923-1937

I have previously written about the very first Australasian Roadwalking Championship, held in 1923 at the Malvern Cricket Ground in Melbourne (see http://www.vrwc.org.au/documents/1923%20Australasian%207%20Mile%20Championship.pdf).

I had a bit of time last week so decided it was time to complete the story and discuss the complete suite of all 9 such championships, held betweem 1923 and 1937. Here are the stories of the next two, contested in 1924 and 1925.

1924 Australasian 7 Mile Championship, Sydney, 8th November 1924

The good form of 1923 Australasian 7 Mile title holder Ernie Austen continued into 1924. In February he easily won the Australian Track championship walks in Hobart – the One Mile Walk in 6:45 and the Three Mile Walk in 22:33. A correspondent commented that "his wins reminded one of W. Murray in his prime". Then in March, he won the NSW track walks in similar style. He was now the unchallenged champion on both road and track.

The veteran walker's efforts were rewarded with Olympic selection and Austen, now in his thirties, proudly made the trip to Paris for the 10,000m track walk. Amazingly and controversially, he was warned in the first lap by the French judge who thought his gait doubtful. In the second lap the American judge ordered him off when he was lying third and was doing well.

Disillusioned, he returned to Australia and retired from racewalking. This sad fact coincided with the return to competition of the 1920 Olympic silver medallist **George Parker**¹ who set to work with a will, got his weight back to normal and, in quick succession, turned in a series of very high quality performances that rewrote the record books.

First in early November 1924 he won the NSW 7 Mile championship in pouring rain. On this occasion he broke the Australasian records for 4 miles (29:58), 5 miles (37:40), 6 miles (45:19.5) and 7 miles (53:02.2).

A week later he fronted for the second Australasian 7 Mile Walk Championship which was held at the Sydney Sports Ground on 8 th November 1924.

Unchallenged, he won the the championship by over 2 minutes, creating new State records for all distances from 2 to 7 miles and setting new Australasian records for 4 miles (29:42), 5 miles (37:28), 6 miles (45:17) and 7 miles (53:07). A strong field of 25 walkers contested the race, with NSW taking the first 3 places.

The annual report of the VAWC for that year commented as follows

Despite the fact of the senior teams defeat, the tour proved successful in as much as lasting friendship was established between the States and considerable progress was made towards the establishment of an Australasian Walking Union. The expenses incurred were heavy but the whole amount, with the exception of £3.14.4, was collected by a social Committee under the control of F. J. O'Rourke and C. Prichard, ably assisted by the Victorian Ladies Walking Club and was not a direct charge upon the Club funds.

George Parker exuded power as a walker. At 6 feet in height and weighing in at 12 stone 10 lbs when fully fit, he physically intimidated his rivals and could have excelled at most sports.

1925 Australasian 7 Mile Championship, Adelaide, Saturday 15th August 1925

1925 saw 1924 winner George Parker expand his repertoire in winning the NSW 20 Mile walk title, one of a series of good walks in what was a strong winter. Yet, he chose to bypass the third Australasian 7 Mile Championship which to be held at the Adelaide Cricket Ground as a curtain raiser to the Australian Rules football final on Saturday 15th August 1925.

His absence, along with the retirement of Ernie Austen, opened the door up for a new champion, and it was young Victorian **Herbert** ("Bert") Gardiner² who took up the challenge. Walking in front of a crowd of 60,000 spectators, the largest crowd to watch an Australian athletic championship, Bert scored a 6 second victory over fellow Victorian **Joe Mulcahy**, with William Pitt of NSW in third place. Overall, Victoria dominated, winning both the Senior and Junior Shields. Once again, the championship saw walkers from Victoria, NSW and SA only.

It was uncertain for a while as to whether Victoria would be in a position to send a team. The VAWC had been in turmoil during that year, with much dissension amongst club members. In fact, it looked likely to disband at one stage. Luckily the issues were resolved, a new Hon. Secretary-Treasurer was appointed in the person of Rex Merrick and a full team travelled to Adelaide.

As a matter of record, on 21 November 1925, George Parker went on another record breaking spree in winning the NSW 7 Mile championship, continuing on for the full hour on a specially prepared track (5 laps to the mile). In winning, he broke six NSW and Australasian records. These included 4 miles (29:31.8), 5 miles (37:09.8), 6 miles (44:50.4), 10000m (46:32), 7 miles (52:45.2) and 1 hour (7 miles 1649 yards 1 foot 9 inches). His 10000m time was over a minute faster than the winning time of Frigerio in the 1924 Olympics and does really raise the question – could anyone have beaten Parker if he had chosen to train for a second Olympics?
