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THE 2020 OLYMPIC 50KM FOR WOMEN GOES TO CAS

I reported in my newsletter of 1st April (see http://www.vrwc.org.au/newsletters/heelandtoe-2019-num27.pdf) on the likelihood of legal action concerning the omission of the women's 50km racewalk from the 2020 Olympic Games. In that issue, I reproduced a press release by USA Attorney At Law **Paul F. DeMeester**, forshadowing a suit to be filed in the Court of Arbitration in Sport to address this outstanding issue of gender inequality. Paul indicated in that press release that he would act on behalf of appellants Inês Henriques, Claire Woods, Paola Pérez, Johana Ordóñez, Magaly Bonilla, Ainhoa Pinedo, Erin Taylor-Talcott and Quentin Rew.

CAS has now posted the official dates for a formal hearing. Two days have been set aside (29-30 July 2019) and the court will address two different but related legal cases which have been raised. See https://www.tas-cas.org/en/general-information/news-detail/article/list-of-cas-hearings-1.html. I cut and paste as follows from the CAS website

Once the 2 day hearing is concluded, it is possible the arbitrators may need additional time before rendering a final decision. Hopefully the issue can be resolved well before the 2019 IAAF World Championships in Doha. I expect some media attention as the hearing dates get closer. 2019 OCEANIA CHAMPIONSHIPS, TOWNSVILLE, JUNE 25-28, 2019

The **2019 Oceania Championships** (https://athletics-oceania.com) are now done and dusted. Last week, I reported on the Open and U20 10,000m track walks.

To complete the report, it remains to discuss the U18 5000m walks which were held last Wednesday, with a number of our talented young guns in action. New Zealander **Daniel du Toit** cleared away in the final stages to win the boys' race by 3 secs from **Gwyllym Young**, 22:14.09 to 1:17.26, while **Caitlin Hannigan** won the girls' race with 24:50.40. Well done to our VRWC walkers **Corey Dickson** (22:39.94) and **Charlotte Hay** (26:06.34).

USATF 40KM CHAMPIONSHIPS, OWEGO, NY, USA, SUNDAY 30 JUNE

The USATF 40km Championship meet, which was held last Sunday in Owego, upstate New York, saw a good turnout of walkers to contest the main race, along with 50km, 30km, 20km, 10km and 5km options. A number of overseas walkers joined their American counterparts, to add some additional flavour to the event. Thanks to race organiser Dave Talcott for his extensive meet reported

Just an update on the USATF 40km Championships from yesterday. For the first time ever Shore AC swept places 1-4. In fact the ShoreAC team were the only finishers. The race was bitter sweet. 2012 Olympic 50km Champion **Jared Tallent** traveled over to race. Australia had extended their World Champs qualifying period until Midnight on June 30th just so Jared could take a shot at the 4:00 mark at our race. At the pre-race party Jared was relaxed. We presented him with a Shore AC Shirt and made him an honorary member of the club (by Elliott's grace and request). We had **A.J. Gruttadauro** shooting for the same 4 hour mark as well as **David Tokodi** from Hungary who walked a 4:02 in Dudinsk this spring I believe. For the women the ageless **Teresa Vaill** and **Erin Taylor-Talcott**. On the junior 20km side, only one entry — **Taylor Ewert**!

The race began at 5:30am to beat the heat. It was about 62 degrees with a light fog. Jared went right to the lead with AJ and David walking together and Taylor fairly close behind along with 10k entrant **Joel Pfahler**. The top 3 men would stay fairly consistent through 10km. Jared would continue to extend his lead and lap the second 2 competitors on the 1.0 km loop course. AJ suffered from some indigestional issues and also an upset stomach for the duration of the 40km race. This caused him to fall back a bit and then pick it back up – numerous times. Shortly after 22km Jared stopped briefly and beat on his left hamstring (he has had hamstring issues over the past year). That kilometer took him nearly 6 minutes while all previous ones were in the 4:40's. With no relief in sight, Jared hung up his walking shoes for the day. It was sad for everyone as it means that Jared won't be there to race at the World Championships this year. Meanwhile Taylor continued to walk strongly, passing 10km in just over 49 minutes en route to an **American U20 15km Record** of 1:13:50 and an **American U20 20km Record** finish time of 1:38:55, breaking Meaghan Podlaski's mark of 1:47 and in the process qualifying for the 2020 US Olympic Trials at 20km.

The 40km women: Teresa (can she really be 56?) had a long flight from Florida – visited the family in Pine Plains, NY and then drove to Owego (3 hour trip) for the race. Probably way too much flying and as Teresa said – she hadn't started her distance build-up yet since she was expecting the 40km in September. She would have tight/strained groin muscles and her body made her stop at 15km. Meanwhile Erin Taylor-Talcott was enjoying the early going – walking with some of the athletes she coaches at the shorter distances. She worked with fellow Shore AC teammate **Chelsea Conway** pushing her the last couple of laps in the 20km where she finished in a fine 1:53:28. Then she got down to business. She walked the second half quite a bit faster than the first and cruised to a second place overall, first master, first woman finish in 4:08:20. Ooh, what about AJ? He would struggle with his ailments but still posted a 3:30:05 for the Men's Title. The Hungarian would be the only finisher in the 50km as he would not quit. His time was 5:06:29.

The Italian Stallion **Michael Mannozzi** meandered down from Canada – actually what should have been 5 hours ended up being 10 hours as traffic was snarled on the QEW with accidents and slow traffic. Michael would also miss an alarm for the early start. 47 minutes into the race he arrived and asked permission to start the race. Permission granted, Michael would begin spot the field 52 minutes and would still wind up third walking a sub 4 hour performance which ended up 4:47:42 on the clock. **Barry Blake** was trying to give a go at his first ever 50km but with going past the 40km mark at 5:01:18 he decided not to hold everyone up by continuing. He was impressive throughout maintaining a consistent pace which garnered him the Men's Masters title. Some other fine performances were had.

BRITISH GRAND PRIX OF RACE WALKING, ROUNDHAY PARK, LEEDS, SUNDAY 30 JUNE

Thanks to Mark Wall for the results from the British Grand Prix of Race Walking in Leeds. He reports:

This meet incorporated a raft of titles as well as the trial for the World titles in Doha. The titles on the line were British Athletics, England athletics, Welsh Athletics, Athletics Ireland, RWA, Southern RWA and the Grand Prix (first three home), In the men, Callum Wilkinson, Tom Bosworth and Cameron Corbishley took all the domestic titles. In the women, the GP and British medals went to Heather Lewis, Bethan Davies and Erika Kelly, the Welsh to Heather and Bethan, England and RWA to Erika, Jasmine Nicholls and Hannah Hunter. The Isle of Man comes under England for domestic competition (the North). You may note there more Irish than British competitors. It was a warm day.

Callum walked a fast time to roll Tom for the win, both met selection criteria for Doha (top 2 placing and qualifying, so will join Cameron (selected already at 50km). There was a big battle for third with Italian **Teodorico Caporaso** prevailing. He, like Cameron and **Brendan Boyce**, are to meet again over 50km in Doha (all having been selected by their Federations). Teodorico looked strong and walked a controlled race. Callum's time was the fastest record by a Briton on home soil.

Heather walked a determined race and is having a good year as UK number 1 in 2019. Bethan walked a good controlled effort. It remains to be seen what British Athletics decides, Bethan has a time inside the window (Lugano March 11 2018), Heather may be inside the top 60.

The event unfortunately clashed with the US event and the Universiade so this reduced possible entries.

GREEK U20 T&F CHAMPIONSHIPS, KATERINI, GREECE, 22-23 JUNE

Thanks to Zoe Gkini for report, results and photos from the Greek U20 National Track Walk Championships on Saturday 22 June. She reports

The Greek U20 T&F Championships were held on the weekend of 22-23 June in Katerini, 450km north of Athens, under the shadow of Mt Olympus, the holy mountan of ancient Greece. The 10,000m track walks were held early on the Saturday morning, with 12 men and 8 women on the start line. The weather was very hot and humid, but this didn't stop the athletes from producing some quite good times.

The star of the competition was Buenos Aires medalist **Olga Fiaska**, who won the women's 10000m with a PB of 46.39.06, only a few seconds from the national record of 49.29.20, which belongs to Olympic medallist Athanasia Tzoumeleka. Olga, who is preparing for the European championships in Boras in July, actually bettered the time of the male winner **Alexandros Mortzakis** (46.42.39). Mortzakis, who belongs to the U18 category (he is only 16 years) won the gold medal after an exciting competition with Olga Fiaska & **Anastasio Stamo**. The 3 of them were together from the start until 9,200m when Olga broke clear. Alexandros will try to take the double with a further win in the U18 championship which will take place in Trikala on 4th July.

Mr Savvas Nikolaidis, a Greek Federation member and Mr George Dimitriadis, the president of the local athletic union, had the honor of presenting the medals to the winners.


It is a very popular event where competitors can walk however many laps they want. That ensured a big field - there was 139 walkers at the 11AM start line on Saturday! The temperature was very hot, stifling in fact, with the temperature around 40°C. Add to that a very tough course, with the 2,176km lap including a very steep hill to climb and to go down (the height difference is 55m+). The lead changed numberous time: **Dominique Delange** led for the first 3 hours before **Daniel Duboscq** took over. He led until 6PM when he surrendered the lead to **Gérard Durand**. Towards the end of Saturday night, **Gilles Letessier** took over at the front, going on to win with 162.4km. In the women's event **Mireille Aubergé** led initially but it soon turned into a three way battle with **Sandra Elmon** and **Brigitte Courraud**. Eventually, there was only 5' between Courraud and Aubergé at the finish, after an exciting last lap.

2019 SWEDISH FOTRALLY, SWEDEN, FROM FRIDAY 28 JUNE FOR AS LONG AS IT TAKES!

The Long Walk is a novel by Stephen King, published under the pseudonym Richard Bachman in 1979. It was collected in 1985 in the hardcover omnibus The Bachman Books, and has seen several reprints since. Set in a dystopian present, the plot revolves around the contestants of a gruelling walking contest, held annually by a totalitarian version of the United States of America. In 2000, the

American Library Association listed *The Long Walk* as one of the 100 best books for teenage readers published between 1966 and 2000. According to Stephen King, it is the first novel he wrote, begun eight years before his novel *Carrie* was published in 1974, when he was a freshman at the University of Maine in 1966–1967. It's a ripper yarn that I first read many years ago. Of course, in the book, once you dropped behind, you were shot. Luckily that does not happen with Fotrally – you are simply out of the race but live to fight again another day!

So, just how far can a person go before he/she can go no further? Well, in 2009, Pontus Kylberg decided to put the concept to the test and organised what is perhaps the ultimate ultra challenge. The walkers walk day and night, without rest until there is only one left standing. Over 200 people start each year but only a few get beyond the 24 hour mark. From then on, it's a brutal war of attrition as, one by one, they fall by the wayside. All contestants walk together as a group at a speed of 5km/h. In the front there is a leading vehicle which the contestants may not pass and in the back there is a portable toilet which the contestants may not be passed by. Each contestant gets 25 minutes per 24 hours for toilet breaks (all the contestants are timed). You must carry what you need, with support zones only once every 6 hours where you can supplement drinking water and food stocks. But the race itself never stops, even for such refreshment points. You must get going before the rear vehicle passes. There is also a national team competition with Swedish and Norwegian walkers normally putting teams in.

Wow! What a concept, Just consider the last few years. The 2014 event was fought out between Swedish walkers Silvio Cannavá and Lena Jensen. Lena eventually had to call it quits after 55 hours of walking, leaving Silvio as the last man standing. In fact, Swedish walkers filled the first 25 places that year. The 2015 staging really upped the ante on what was possible with winner Fredrik Forsström walking for an amazing 87 hours and 45 minutes, just over 32 hours above the previous record. Jonas Davidsson took second place in the same time (but obviously could no longer continue) while Silvio Cannavá, Pia Rosvall, PerOla Axelsson and Niklas Grebäck also shattered the 2014 record of 55 hours. For 44 year old Forsström, it was his 4th Fotrally - his previous placings had been 20th (2012 24:20), 3rd (2013 33:26) and 5th (2014 48:18). 5km/hr for some 88 hours comes out at around 440km of continuous walking. In 2016, it came down to another two person duel, with **PerOla Axelman** eventually winning with 72 hours 12 minutes, after Robert Jonsson had to stop, total distance 361km! Obviously Axelsson could have gone on but he called it quits at that stage, content with being the last person standing. It was his sixth attempt and the win gave him his first victory after 5th, 4th, 3rd and 2nd placings in previous years. A similar two person duel happened in 2017, when Richard Andersson outlasted Ange Truss by walking for 81 hours (405km). 2018 saw a duel between the same two walkers. After 87 hours and 48 minutes, the win was finally decided when officials forced Agne Truss to retire, worried that her condition had deteriorated too much to continue. That left Richard Andersson as the final walker, repeating his 2017 win. They had both bettered the previous record of 87 hours and 45 minutes and had each walked a total distance of 439km! Richard chose to stop then as well. I suppose when you have won and set a new record, you can be excused for resting on your laurels!

The improvement in the event can be traced with the winning times from the 10 annual stagings held up till and including last year.

And what do you get for your efforts – the Fotrally medal – bronze for more than 12 hours, silver for more than 24 hours and gold for more than 48 hours of walking.



So the big question was – how far could they go this year? The 2019 race saw 202 entrants starting in the Stockholm suburb of Gärdet at 9PM last Friday evening, all hoping to complete the huge lap around Lake Mälaren, taking in as many cities as possible before returning to the starting point at the end of 3 days, ready to go into a second lap if required. Check out the huge field size at the start - https://www.facebook.com/tv100sverige/videos/1785258144910156/. It is just so big!!

With defending champion Richard Andersson a non starter this year, runner up Agne Truss went in as the favourite.

The attrition rate was fierce, with only 52 walkers lasting to the 24 hour mark. After 48 hours (2 days), the field had been reduced to 7 walkers. The carnage continued, walker by walker. Finally, at the 55 hour mark, we were down to the final 4 who would fight out the finish - **Agne Truss** (2, PB 87:48), **Jonatan Nordebo** (135, first timer), **Niklas Yjord** (182, PB 48:20) and **Roman Matus** (226, first timer). Jonatan eventually stopped at 74hr 14 min and Roman stopped just 6 minutes later at 74 hr 20 min, leaving the final 2.

Looking at the facebook videos at https://www.facebook.com/fotrally.ik, I think you should put your money on Agne. Time will tell!

Here are the placings and distances of places 3-52, who reached the 24 hour mark (as per http://www.fotrally.se/resultat) but have since retired. A special shout out to Swedish racewalker and statistician **Birger Fält** who withdrew in 44th place after 24:04.

The basic technique does not really change from era to era. We might chip around the edges to develop extra speed at the elite level but walking remains walking, regardless of the era. Thanks Alan.

- Russian race walker Maria Ponomareva has been handed a four-year suspension for doping, the Athletics Integrity Unit (AIU) said in a statement last Tuesday. The AIU, which oversees integrity issues in athletics, including doping, posted documents from the Court Arbitration for Sport (CAS) that said the ban was based on the fact Ponomareva had abnormalities in her biological passport. The CAS documents said Ponomareva had used doping for "a period of more than two years." Her four-year suspension comes into force as of March 8, 2018, and her results between July 2015 and March 2018 are voided. - More disgrace for Kenya as a another long-distance runner Salome Jerono Biwott has been suspended for doping for the second time. Biwott, 36, has provisionally been suspended by Athletics Integrity Unit (AIU) having tested positive to prohibited Norandrosterone. Biwott, who was first hit with a two-year ban in 2013 when she failed a drugs test after winning the 2012 Standard Chartered Nairobi Marathon, is fresh from finishing second at Sao Paulo International Marathon in 2:37:33 on 7 April 7 this year. - No wonder the Russians tried so hard not to give up their samples! More than 100 "strong cases" of suspected Russian doping are being prepared using data retrieved from the Moscow testing laboratory. WADA president Craig Reedie said lasat Wednesday it is "packaging evidence" for sports governing bodies to prosecute the highest priority cases. Only data for "suspicious cases" is being provided, Reedie said, adding he expects more than 100 files in the "first wave of strong cases against those we suspect of cheating.' - The Paris prosecutor's office has spent four years investigating the athletics scandals surrounding former president of the world governing body of athletics, **Lamine Diack**, and his son **Papa Massata**. The ARD doping editorial team has now acquired the 90-page bill of indictment. It documents the shocking actions of unscrupulous officials that will occupy world sports for a long time to come. And it is not necessarily all in the past for the IAAF who may have an upcoming problem of their own making. The 2022 Summer Youth Olympics were awarded to Dakar, of all places, the Diacks' home town, even though Senegal persistently refuses to extradite Diack junior. This can't be allowed to stand! - ARD also lifts the lid on the timing of the 12 months suspension given to Sweden's Eritrean-born Meraf Bahta. She took bronze in the 2018 European Championship 10,000m Run but had missed 3 doping tests that season by not properly disclosing her location for testing on various occasions. Bahta was retrospectively given a 1 year ban by the supreme sports council in Sweden last week, but the timing of the sanction looks very dubious the start date is set for 1 September 1 2018, immediately after the European Championship final in Berlin. So she will not only be able to keep her European Championship bronze medal, she could also start at the World Championships in Doha this year. Sounds very smelly to me!
