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WALKERS OF THEWEEK

There were lots of outstanding performances at Fawkner Park last Sunday morning. Some that spring to mind include

- 28 year old VRWC walker **Rhydian Cowley** who won the Australian Men's 50km Championship in a superb 3:52:58. It was his first ever attempt at this distance and he nailed it! He is already known as one of our best ever 20km walkers, with a PB of 1:20:19. He can now call himself a top 50km walker!
- 42 year old VRWC walker **Tracy Feiner** who won the Australian Women's 50km Championship. Like Rhydian, it was her first attempt at the distance. Her 30km split of 2:49:44 was only 32 seconds outside her 30km PB, set earlier this year in Melbourne. From then on, her finish was never in doubt, just the time. She did slow before rallying in the final 2km lap to record 4:59:32, a new **W40 50km Australian Masters Record**. It was not as fast as she had perhaps hoped but it was still a great walk for a first timer over that distance.
- 19 year old NSW walker **Dylan Richardson** who took silver in the Australian Men's 50km Championship. Walking the race of his life, he passed through 30km in a PB 2:29:20 before slowing in the final 20km to cross the finish line with 4:22:44. He had passed 2016 Rio Olympian Brendon Reading soon after the 30km mark and was never threatened from then on. It is only rarely that we see someone so young attack the 50km so confidently.
- 65 year old NT walker Colin Heywood who also completed his first ever 50km, his time of 5:05:34 beating the World Masters M65 50km Record of 5:11:22, set by USA walker Leon Jasionowski in 2010.
- 20 year old VRWC walker **Kyle Swan** who came second in the Men's Invitational 20km walk with a time of 1:23:53. He chased top English international Tom Bosworth the whole way and was rewarded with a PB that bettered his previous best by nearly 8 minutes!
- 17 year old ACT walker **Gwyllym Young** won the U20 Men's 10km race with 43:25, beating his previous PB by 2 mins and 32 sec. With the first 5 walkers all under 44:30 and all walking PBs, it was the most exciting race of the day.
- 17 year old VRWC walker **Will Thompson** who won the U18 Boys 5km with a huge PB of 21:58. After having the winter away from walking, he returned after only a month's training and amazed us all.
- 12 year old VRWC walker Darcey Roberts who won the U18 Girls 5km with 24:58, another huge PB and a time that is amazing for one so young.

And going back to last Wednesday, we had more wonderful walks in our VRWC track meet in Keilor

- 70 year old VRWC member Heather Carr who set a new World Masteres W70 5000m Walk Record with 17:58.
- 8 year old VRWC walker Ela Uzun who broke the VRWC U9 and U10 club records with her time of 8:11.

I think this must be the most high quality performances I have had to review in a single week. How do I ever choose my Walker of the Week? Ok, time to take the plunge. **My Walkers of the Week are Rhydian Cowley and Kyle Swan.** Both recorded world class times (Rhydian over 50km and Kyle over 20km) and both wrote their names into my Australian All-Time ranking lists, Kyle rising to 15th in the 20km list and Rhydian coming in at 9th in the 50km list.

53RD AUSTRALIAN 50KM CHAMPIONSHIPS, FAWKNER PARK, MELBOURNE, SUNDAY 1 DECEMBER 2019

Conditions were picture perfect for the 53rd Australian 50km Championships in Melbourne on the morning of Sunday 1st December 2019. The Australian 50km was first contested in 1952 with Victorian Len Chadwick winning with a time of 5:10:58. A lot of water has flown under the bridge since then.

The fast 2km loop in Fawkner Park, South Yarra, has been used since 2008, so this was the 12th occasion on which our 50km walkers have raced in this inner city venue. It was a cool and overcast 12°C when the gun sounded for the 7AM start and, apart from a few windy gusts, conditions stayed good throuhout the race, with a weak sun forcing its way through to clouds in the late morning.

It was a huge meet, with invitational 20km, U20 10km and U18 5km events also on offer. But more about them later.

I am indebted to USA Attorney at Law Paul DeMeester for this report on the 50km walk. We were very pleased to see Paul, who has spearheaded the international push to save the 50km, attending our event. Over to Paul..

NEWCOMERS DOMINATE 2019 AUSTRALIAN 50K CHAMPIONSHIPS

First-time 50K finishers dominated this year's Australian National Championships held on Sunday 1 December 2019 at Melbourne's Fawkner Park. The weather cooperated, with an overcast sky throughout the race, a temperature in the low teens and a humidity level of about 67%.

The main dish on this day's race walk menu was the 50K, although the 20K open invitational race attracted top talent of its own, with Tom Bosworth, Quentin Rew, Beki Smith, Jemima Montag and Rachel Tallent all taking part.

Ten 50K walkers took the start at 7 a.m., nine men and one woman. **Perseus Karlström** took the lead right away on this 2K circuit that consisted of a 1K straight line path completely shaded by trees and with manageable turns at both ends. Bosworth, the world record holder for the 1 Mile labelled it a 'fast circuit.' Fast was the word for Karlström, who bested the Swedish National Record here two years ago, only to miss out on seeing it ratified due to a technicality related to the number of starters in that race. Repeating the 3:44:35 performance would have brought a nice finish to a year of top performances for the Swede, who earned a World Championship 20K bronze at Doha and won the IAAF Race Walking Challenge. But hip soreness slowed him with less than 12K to go, increasing his lap time from sub-9 minutes to a 9:24 between the 38 and 40K marks; and led to his exit on the next lap.

Rhydian Cowley inherited the lead. A veteran 20K Australian international with three World Championships and one Olympic Games under his belt, Cowley settled into second behind Karlström for the first part of the race. His advantage over third-place Christopher Linke would rise to about a minute until the 20K mark, after which the German reeled in Cowley. Before the half-way point, Cowley and Linke switched places, putting Linke in a familiar position, as Linke had finished 19 seconds behind Karlström at the Doha Worlds. But Linke only intended to walk a 30K and stopped after covering that distance in 2:16:53, allowing Cowley back into second and young Dylan Richardson into a podium spot. By 42K, the 19-year old Richardson improved to second after Karlström exited the race, which departure gave Cowley the lead. This development also brought 2016 50K Olympian Brendon Reading into podium contention after a long absence from long-distance race walking. Reading had battled early on for position with fellow Rio Olympian Jared Tallent. The 2012 Olympic Champion, however, was not feeling his best and would bring a temporary halt to his race past 8K, then halt his race altogether some 4K further down the road after first yielding a position to Richardson.

The exits of three superstars made the early battle behind Tallent one that decided who would finish fourth. **Carl Gibbons** built a steady lead over local walker **Jason Kozica**, a lead that got as large as 5:14 after 32K. But the old adage that a 50K does not start until 35K held true for Kozica, who steadily chipped away at Gibbons' lead over him. By the 42 nd km, the gap between these two had narrowed to a mere 20 seconds. Two laps later, Kozica had passed Gibbons for fourth, a place Kozica would solidify by the end of the race.

Behind this duelling duo, **Tracy Feiner** kept a steady pace. For the first 5K, Feiner walked with Kozica, then by herself for the remainder of the race. Her pace slowed twice, first around the 34K mark, then again between 40 and 45K. But then Feiner rallied, chopping half a minute from her penultimate lap time compared to the lap before that. Further acceleration on her last lap gave her a 28-second margin to finish below the five-hour mark to net her the 50K National Women's Championship title.

The next competitor would come close to that five-hour mark. Sixty-five year old **Colin Heywood** kept up a 10km/hr-plus pace through 30K, having passed through 10K in 57:05, 20K in 1:55:04 and 30K in 2:54:50. The masters walker passed through 40K in 3:59:01. Even though he may have slowed some in the last 20K of the race, it never showed in his form. Moreover, Heywood consistently increased speed to finish his last five laps in respectively 13:31-13:28-13:10-13:06. A great close to a great race!

Six of the seven finishers, all except Reading, finished their first 50K; a true tribute to the resilience of the 50K.

And now to talk about the other events.

Tom Bosworth (GBR) and **Kyle Swan** (VIC) staged a great battle early on in the men's 20km, before Tom surged clear in the second half to win with 1:22:50. 20 year old Kyle was rewarded with a huge PB of 1:23:53 (41:57 followed by 41:56), nearly 8 minutes under his previous best, while third placed **Tyler Jones** (NSW) also PB'd with 1:25:42. Australian internationals **Beki Smith** (1:37:07), **Jemima Montag** (1:37:22) and **Rachel Tallent** (1:37:44) ensured an exciting women's 20km race, all at the early stages of fitness, but all showing glimpes of their true worth.

The U20 10km races were won by **Rebecca Henderson** (VIC) and **Gwyllym Young** (ACT). There were lots of PBs, with the first 6 men under the 2019 World Racewalking Team Championship qualifying standard of 46:30 and the first 2 girls under the qualifying standard of 50:00. Note that the official Athletics Australia results show Gwyllym Young and Tristan Camilleri dead heating in the 10km. This is incorrect – I think Gwyllym should have been 43:25, winning by around 3 secs.

VRWC TRACK WALKS, KEILOR ATHLETICS TRACK, KEILOR, WEDNESDAY 27 NOVEMBER 2019

And now for our usual roundup from around Australia.

Out latest VRWC summer season walks were held on Wednesday evening at the Keilor athletics track in NW Melbourne. The location meant that not too many could make the trip but those who did come along were rewarded with excellent conditions and some fine times.

The 3000m walk was won by 13 year old **Marcus Wakim** (PB 15:05), after a great battle with M60 **Kevin Cassidy** (15:15). Well done also to 12 year old **Maddison Nash** for her PB time of 17:24. But the standout 3000m walk was by W70 **Heather Carr** whose time of 17:58 set new a VRWC W70 Record (and for the record, she also broke her World and Australian record time of 18:01 by 3 secs).

Finally to the 1500m where 8 year olds **Ela Uzun** and **Havana Ali** walked wonderfully as usual. Well done to Ela who set new U19 and U10 VRWC Club Records with her time of 8:11.

- Russian Olympic springboard diving champion Ilya Zakharov has been suspended for 18 months for skipping three out-of-competition doping tests within a year. The 28-year-old won gold at the 2012 London Olympic Games in the 3 metre springboard. He also took gold as recently as 2017, at the World Aquatics Championships in Budapest, Hungary, alongside Evgeny Kuznetsov in the 3m synchronised springboard. - The Court of Arbitration for Sport (CAS) has confirmed bans for Russian athletes Yuliya Gushchina and Anna Nazarova following retests of their samples from the 2012 Olympic Games in London. The two athletes were sanctioned by the IOC as part of their London 2012 Olympic Games retests back in November 2017. - Yet another Russian related issue has come to light. It is now confirmed that last year Russia fabricated evidence to discredit whistleblower Grigory Rodchenkov, long on their hit list for his exposes. Last year, Russia officials planted fabricated messages that they later claimed were written by Rodchenkov in a database that they had agreed to turn over to WADA investigators. Their attempt to frame Rodchenkov as the ringleader in a scheme to extort athletes and coaches by threatening to manipulate doping samples was also done in the hope of providing cover for their own manipulations of test results within the data set, and to help Russia avoid serious penalties from global anti-doping regulators. The push to extend the ban on Russia only grows each time something like this happens. They have not changed one iota!
