** WALKER OF THE WEEK **

On a Victorian championship day on which State and national records fell, 13 new PBs were set, and four walkers broke the 20min barrier for 5000m, it was going to take something out of the box to win this week's WOTW ... something like a World record.

Enter **Kelly Ruddick**. Having already sundered Lyn Ventris's W45 World 5000m record four weeks ago (a performance that won her that week's WOTW), Kelly set out to reinforce the point and did so by an astonishing 27secs, for a new World mark of **22:47.17**.

Kelly has had few opportunities in recent times to race against elite competition, so on Saturday she made the most of her chances – as indeed she did in Adelaide to record a creditable 1:36.58 for 20km. Coming off that performance, she was perfectly set up for her second World record result in a month.

Congratulations, Kelly. We expect we'll see your candidacy for further WOTWs as the year progresses!

Honourable mentions:

- **Declan Tingay** breaking any of the 'Birdman's' National records will put anyone in the mix
- **Jemima Montag** a new Vic record and edging closer to that 20min barrier.
- Mark Blackwood a new National Masters record for M45.
- **Isaac Beacroft** (NSW) aged 15, smashing his 3000m PB with **12:40.77**, his first time under 13mins, in the NSW championships.

** PRAMESH WELCOMED AS OUR LATEST CENTURION ... FINALLY!

It took far longer than it should have, thanks to (what else?) COVID-19, but on Sunday 27 February, the Australian Centurions were able to formally welcome their newest member, **Pramesh Prasad**, into the fold as member C81.

At a celebratory luncheon – coinciding with the club's AGM – at the Glasshouse restaurant, Caulfield Racecourse, Pramesh was presented with his certificate of membership, having already received his Centurion badge last year.

As most will know, to qualify as a Centurion, a walker must complete 100 miles (160.934km) in less than 24 hours. Pramesh achieved this feat at the Harold Stevens Athletics Track in Coburg last April, with an excellent time of 20h 43m 42s.

Tim Erickson, event manager of both the Centurion qualifying walk and the Coburg 24-hour Run that accompanies it, provided this report on Pramesh's performance in *Centurion Footnotes – April 2021*:

"Pramesh had been keen on testing himself out over the longer walking distances for some years now and was always on my radar as a potential centurion candidate. In September 2018, he won the Victorian 50km racewalking championship in a time of 4:56:55. The following year, in April 2019, he entered the 6 Hour Walk at our Coburg 24 Hour Carnival, winning with an impressive 56.512km. 2020 came and went with no further races, given the covid-19 pandemic, but come this year, he was ready for the next step and entered the 24 Hour Walk at our 2021 Coburg 24 Hour Carnival.

"His walk in the 2021 Coburg Carnival 24 Hour walk was an impressive performance. He headed out fast, using the full racewalking technique, and powered through 52.693 km in the first 6 hours. Then he switched to an efficient strolling action that continued to eat up the miles. He passed the 100 km mark in 11:49:11 and reached the 100 mile mark in 20:43:42. From then he strolled a few laps to a total distance of 162.559km, his goal achieved. He had earned Centurion badge 81 for his efforts."

A cheery, popular VRWC and Masters walker who has recently joined the VRWC Club committee, Pramesh's story is truly fascinating. A native of Fiji, whom he has represented internationally in walking events, Pramesh was instrumental in seeing the first-ever participation of Fiji in the IAAF World Race walking Cup in 1995. World Masters mark for Kelly Ruddick

As with last week, ideal conditions met the starters in this year's Open 5000m championships. With an elite field toeing the line (QLD's Katie Hayward being the only Tokyo Olympian not present) and departure for Muscat imminent for some, the prospects for this race's outcome had spectators licking their lips – justifiably, as it turned out.



It took less that a lap for the Men's race outcome to be settled. **Declan Tingay** (WA, left) shot straight into a lead that grew and grew, never to be challenged. Behind him, the fight was on for the Victorian title between **Kyle Swan**, **Rhydian Cowley** and **Will Thompson**, with **Quentin Rew** (NZL) in amongst them and looking for a fast one.

In the Women's section, **Jemima Montag** (right) quickly established her usual dominance. A keen battle for the minor placings between **Bec Henderson** and **Clara Smith** (QLD) was developing, while the evergreen **Kelly Ruddick** was on yet another Masters record hunt.

Declan crossed the line in first place for a new National and Victorian All-comers record of **18:24.50**, eclipsing Dane Bird-Smith's previous mark by 14.47secs – he'll be boarding the plane to Oman in the form of his life. Rhydian, regaining his old speed race by race, took the Vic title with **19:12.20**, just 3secs shy of his PB.



Jemima added a new State record of **20:17.35** to her National 20km time from Adelaide. We also saw a new World W45 record set by Kelly Ruddick with a ripping **22:47.17**, which of course is also a new State and National mark. Will and Kyle made the most of their final races before Muscat with good PBs, ahead of **Mark Blackwood** who joined Declan and Kelly as a National record setter with his **22:10.75** (M45).


(As I write, the Australian walkers have just touched down in Doha, en route to Muscat. We will be watching their fortunes eagerly this weekend, and we wish them every success.)

While it was a little disappointing to see only 9 starters across the three age groups in the Junior 3000m, five PB performances (including two by over a minute) was encouraging.

Standout of the day was **Damian Baldy** who smashed his best by 1:39 with **15:49.41**. **Madeleine McGregor**, who'd never walked under 18mins before, was another big improver with her **16:53.72**, showing the benefit of AVSL racing over the summer. **Riley Coughlan** was easily the fastest winner on the day in **13:26.22**, and we were pleased to see Tasmania's **Oliver Morgan** in action for his own big PB effort of **14:13.71**.

** OLIVIA SANDERY: FIRST STOP OMAN

For **Olivia Sandery**, race walking is an art. Where some see an unglamorous athletic pursuit, she sees a war of attrition characterised by silent suffering and pin-point precision – a sport that demands patience, rhythm, and economy.

Conceding that her start the sport was defined by sore shins and minor success, the 19-year-old South Australian has blossomed into one of the Australia's most exciting young prospects - selected for next weekend's World Athletics Race Walking Team Championships to be held in Oman.

"I'm super excited, especially after everything that has been going on in the world over the past couple of years. It's amazing to be able to travel overseas for my first international competition," she said.

Set to compete in the Junior Women's 10km event alongside Alanna Peart and Allanah Pitcher, Sandery is remaining grounded ahead of her international debut – despite her scintillating form being enough to suggest she is a major contender.

"It would be nice to be near the front but I'm just going to do my best and see where I land. I've never had this kind of race experience, so I'm just going to give it my all," she said.

Coached by Bob Cruise since 2016 and crediting him as the reason she is still in the sport, the rising star has bolstered her corner with the recent addition of Australia's most decorated male track and field athlete – Olympic champion Jared Tallent.

"Bob and Jared are different in ways, so it's nice to have them both there to help me with different things. Bob has been in the sport for a long time and definitely knows his stuff" she said.

"Jared is so experienced. He's been to all the major championships and has won medals, he just knows so much. Ahead of Oman it's been great having him there to tell me what it's going to be like."



Clocking personal bests of 45:21.4 over 10,000m and 21:49.41 in the 5000m already in 2022, Sandery is on a rapid rise that has her touted as a top prospect globally for this year's World Athletics Under 20 Championships in Colombia: "I was selected but missed out on world juniors last year because we couldn't go due to COVID-19, so I'm hoping to make the team again and I think that will be a really good race for me and my progression."

Beginning to take training seriously in 2020, Sandery made significant inroads to place herself on the map nationally – cementing herself as an integral member of the Australian race walking unit moving forwards.

"I've been on a few training camps and have learned so much from other Australian race walkers, being in that environment and training with the group really helps. I'm doing around 80-90km per week now and I'm sure that will get bumped up again when I transition to the 20km next year," she said.

With just over one week until she dons the green and gold alongside Olympians Rhydian Cowley, Declan Tingay and Kyle Swan - Australia's latest sensation is relishing the opportunity to kick-start her career on the international scene.

"Most of my teammates are used to it. They've done a lot of trips and races overseas, but also just to have them around – we're all really good friends," she said.

Studying in nutrition and dietetics, Sandery says her degree ties in well with her athletic pursuits:

"It aligns quite well. The January camp we were on, we had three dieticians on board, so it's good to talk to them and learn a bit more and to make those connections."

The World Athletics Race Walking Team Championships will be held in Muscat, Oman on March 4-5.

The ANSW State Junior T&F Champs were held at SOP Homebush in wet, windy and very unpleasant racing conditions.

Friday Night at 8.12pm saw the U/20, U/18, U/17 5000m Walk for Men & Women in a combined event, with a good overall field of 25 walkers.

The race started with rain continuing throughout the event. The pace was fast with **Riley Whatman** taking the field through for the first km in sub 4m20s pace. As the laps progressed the leading girls closed the gap and then it was a race with **Milly Boughton**, **Emma Blanch**, **Elizabeth McMillan**, **Hannah Bolton** and **Allanah Pitcher** with **Sam McCure**, visiting from Queensland, in hot pursuit. Around the 3km mark Elizabeth set out and established a good lead. Sam picked up his pace catching Elizabeth and set sail for the finish.

The race was on to fill the minor placings across the line in the girls race, with Allanah walking a fast last km to finish within 10 seconds of Elizabeth with Emma 3rd, Hannah 4th, and Milly 5th girl across the line.

FRANCE: French Indoor championships, 27 February – Miramas

Thanks to Emmanuel Tardi for this report on the French Senior championships:


I was appointed as judge this Sunday in Miramas, 700km to the south of Paris , for our national indoor championship. Races were scheduled at 1pm and 1:30pm.

Some of our best walkers were not on the ground because there is the Team world championship in Oman next week. In women's 3000m, **Emilie Menuet** started the faster with **Camille Moutard**. But she had problems in her thigh. She stopped 3 times trying to recover and finished 3rd. Victory went to Moutard.

In Men 5000m, **David Kuster** was the leader for 3k but he was disqualified. Later, there was a big battle with two guys and a very big sprint. Unfortunately, officials rang the bell too early, and the first three walkers walked only 4.8km.

Thanks to Mark Wall for this report from the 2022 Commonwealth Games host city:

There were two separate races on the day, and absentees in both races. It was good to see relatively young fields (ages in brackets) Of those contesting the events, only Bethan will be competing next week in Oman.

In the women's race there was a real scramble for the minor medals in the final straight (remember indoor tracks are only 200m) with at least two competitors risking the prospect of the chief judge acting unilaterally as per the 'final 100m rule'. (All World Athletics rules are in force in UK National titles ... no penalty zone indoors, however).

Erika competed on the Gold Coast in 2018 for the Isle of Man. Tom is the son of Steve and Cal Partington, both of whom competed in the Commonwealth Games for the IOM. Steve did this on multiple occasions, as recently as Melbourne in 2006

Chris is on extended leave from the Met Police, now studying and training in Leeds. He is the son of Scottish Commonwealth Games representative Verity (nee Larby).
