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#### **VALE ROBIN WHYTE: 1942 - 2022**

Tim Erickson pays tribute to a fierce competitor, a committed worker for race walking and a cherished friend

I was saddened to hear of the passing of Australian racewalking legend **Robin Whyte** on Saturday 28<sup>th</sup> May 2022, after a long battle with cancer.

Robin, born 24<sup>th</sup> February 1942, was a well-known and highly respected Australia's racewalker, competing first for NSW, and then for the ACT, in a career that spanned some 60 years.

He was one of many young and talented walkers to come out of Sydney in the early 1960s. The first racing reference I can find is his 7<sup>th</sup> place finish (in a time of 1:47:06) in the 1964 Olympic 20km Trial, held at Centennial Park in Sydney, in July of that year.

From that point on, he was a regular finisher in the various NSW, Australian and AFORWC championships on offer each year.

In the mid 1960's, Robin moved to Canberra and immediately saw the need to develop racewalking in what was then a fledgling athletics environment. In October 1966 he, Peter Waddell, Nigel Crew and Tony Andrews, created a new specialist racewalking club, ACTAWC, and successfully applied for Federation membership.

From then on, although Robin still raced in the various NSW championships, his designation was always as an ACT walker.

By 1967, Robin's walking had improved to such an extent that he won his first medals - 2<sup>nd</sup> place in the 1967 Glover Shield 10km in Brisbane (49:52) and 3<sup>rd</sup> place in the NSW 50km Championship. 1967 also saw the inaugural Lake Burley Griffin 20 Mile walk, in which Robin came 4<sup>th</sup> (2:59:03), only losing his second place position in the final couple of miles.

A tall walker with a long raking stride, he found his niche in the longer distances. Over the next 8 years, he won either gold or silver in every NSW 50km championship and reduced his 50km PB to a very respectable 4:29:57.

#### Lake Burley Griffin ... Robin's domain

The other event that he made his own was the annual LBG 20 Mile walk in Canberra. After his fourth place in 1967, he embarked on a streak that is unlikely to be matched on the Australian walking front. He started in every LBG 20 Miler from its inception in 1967 until his final start in 2018. Of the 52 starts, he failed to finish on only 5 occasions – a DNF in 1969 and DQs in 1982, 2005, 2016 and 2018. He medaled on two occasions: bronze in 1973 (2:46:13) and silver in 1975 (a PB 2:42:12) and he was a regular top 6 finisher for many years.



June 2016 marked the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the first Lake Burley Griffin Carnival in Canberra. To mark the occasion, the camera captured three of the original 20 Mile walkers: Robin, Harry Summers (VIC) and Bob Gardiner (VIC), along with Deanna Rahill (NSW) who had competed in the inaugural women's 2 Mile walk

### On the fringe of selection

By the early 1970s, he was amongst our best walkers. He took silver in the 1972 Glover Shield 10km in Brisbane (48:36), bronze in the 1973 Alexander Cup 20km in Sydney (1:39:12) and bronze in the 1975 Alexander Cup 20km in Melbourne (1:37:35).


1973 saw him win his first Australian Championship, the 50km in Brisbane. Walking on a very tough and hilly course that was anything up to a mile over-distance, his winning time of **4:52:18** did not really reflect the quality of his walk.

He contested the Commonwealth Games and Olympic racewalking trials when they came along, and he was usually in the top 4 or 5, but never quite high enough or fast enough to earn a berth in any Australian team. A typical example was the 20 Mile walk trial for the 1974 Commonwealth Games, held in Canberra in September 1973, The first 4 places read as follows

Peter Fullager, Ian Hodgkinson and Ross Haywood were all selected for the 1974 Commonwealth Games, but it was Robin who would have been next in line.

His next opportunity would be the 1976 Olympics and he started to string some good performances together. A 5 minute PB and 2<sup>nd</sup> place finish in the 1975 LBG 20 Miler (2:42:12), a gold medal and another 5 minute PB in the 1975 NSW 50km championship (4.29.57), a big PB in the 1976 Australian 3000m Track Walk Championship (13:10.2) and a silver in the 1976 Glover Shield 10km (a PB 47:59.8) indicated that he had stepped up to a new level.

He was second to Ross Haywood in the 1976 Olympic 20km Trial, held in Melbourne in April of that year, but his finishing time of 1:38:11 was not deemed to be fast enough and Ross was our only 1976 Olympic walk rep.

#### Selection at last - Malmo 1976

There was one further chance of an international vest that year, as the IAAF was hosting its own replacement 50km world championship, in lieu of the Olympic 50km walk which had been removed. No trial would be held - selections would be at the selectors' discretion. Willi Sawall (4:12:20.6) and Tim Erickson (4:20:41.5) were well ahead of the opposition, while Robin had the next best 50km time (4:29:59.2), done in winning the NSW 50km Championship the previous year.

Finally, Robin's many years of hard work were rewarded and he was selected as part of a 3 man team, alongside Willi and me, to represent Australia at the IAAF 50km World Championship in Malmö, Sweden. There he finished a creditable 29<sup>th</sup>, his time

of 4:30:08 only a few seconds outside his PB. For each of us, it was our first international vest and was a wonderful trip that left lasting memories.

Robin continued to race nationally after this, and he medaled in further NSW 50km championships (1st in 1977 and 2nd in 1978), as well as walking in the annual LBG 20 Miler, but his time at the top had come to an end, as younger and faster walkers appeared on the scene.

#### From racer to administrator

Although he remained a regular member of ACT walking teams at the various national championships, he now turned his attention to administration, taking on the role of chief organiser for the LBG Carnival. Under his leadership, the event grew into Australia's premier racewalking carnival, with total entries around the 300 mark throughout the nineties and early 2000's. He would don the ACTRWC vest and race the 20 miler, then oversee the administration of the carnival for the rest of the day, then rush into the evening presentations clutching the results sheets and ready to oversee that final important part of the weekend's activities.

He was awarded life membership of Racewalking Australia in 2001 and, at the time of his passing, was still serving the Federation in the role of Patron.

#### The call of the 'Century'

His introduction to the world of long distance walking was in 1978 when the annual Australian Centurions qualifying event was held in Gosford in NSW. On that occasion, Robin walked the first half with John Smith (who was successful and became C16) and was well on schedule for a successful finish until he withdrew for an hour's rest in the early hours of the Sunday morning - he had completed 110.96km in 13:39:44. He did not return to the track and thus missed his window of opportunity. It would be 18 years until he tried again, this time successfully.

His next attempt was in October 1996 when the George Knott Athletics Track in Clifton Hill, Melbourne, was chosen for the annual Australian Centurions qualifying event. Robin started at a brisk pace (2:45 per lap) which he maintained until the 50 mile mark, walked in continuous rain. At 90km he took his only break for the entire race - a 5 minute rest to change into dry clothes. Then he was off again, maintaining a pace of between 3:00 and 3:30 for the remainder of the race. He was determined not to stop, remembering what had happened the previous time in Gosford. There was never any real likelihood of him retiring and it was a very pleased walker who crossed the line just after 10:30 AM on the Sunday morning. His feet were a mess, with bloodied shoes, and he had to be helped from the track - but this was a small price to pay and only a temporary inconvenience when compared with the great achievement of walking 100 miles inside 24 hours. With his walk, he became Australian Centurion number 29 in a time of 20:37:12. Just over 3 hours later, Mery Lockyer also finished to become Australian Centurion number 30.

Three years later, in September 1999, he fronted for the annual Australian Centurions qualifying walk, this time at the Coburg Athletics Track in Melbourne. This was our best ever Centurion finish with 7 qualifiers, 5 of them new. Robin was the fourth of the group to finish with a time of **21:34:48**.

#### A long stride for long distances

Four months later, in January 2000, he was back in action in the annual Coastal Classic 12 Hour Event in Gosford. Showing wonderful form, he won with a new event record of **98.12 km**. This time stood for many years as the Gosford Coastal Classic record and lasted for 11 years as the M55 Australian 12 Hour Record until finally bettered.

In September 2000, he snared his third Australian Centurion finish at the annual qualifying event at Coburg. Aged 58, he strolled through the 100 miles in a time of 22:29:32.

From then on, he restricted his endeavours to 12 Hour and 6 Hour walks. The Coastal Classic was obviously his favourite event as he competed in it every January until 2007, nearly always finishing in the first 3 and consistently walking around or above 90 km.

He made a welcome return in the 2005 Australian Centurion 24 Hour event at Coburg, taking second place in the inaugural Australian 100km championship with a time of 13:57:09.

A couple of years later, in August 2007, he entered the 12 Hour event at the Australian 48 Hour Championships carnival on the Gold Coast, Queensland. Not really expecting anything special given his current level of training, he surprised even himself with his performance, passing the 50 Mile mark in 10:53:50 and covering a final 12 Hour distance of 88:301 km to set two new M65 Australian records. His long stride was perfect for the long distances and he covered the miles quickly and seemingly without undue effort.

#### A last burst of records

Robin's appearances in the long distance events were now less frequent as his other activities took precedence, but he did make the occasional foray onto the track, usually to set some new age group record or another. His last major long distance walk was in the 2017 Australian Centurions qualifier in Melbourne, when he set three M75 records: 6 Hours (49.406km), 50 Miles (10:55:16) and 12 Hours (85.997km). They will take some beating!

He loved to compete, and he was in attendance at every ACTRWC club race. My stats indicate he toed the start line in 40 races in 2017, in 37 races in 2018 and in 33 races in 2019.

Sadly, this was to come to an end in 2019, when Robin was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer. A long and complex operation was followed by many months of chemotherapy. But Robin was never one to shirk from a challenge and he faced the uncertain prognosis with quiet strength and grace.

He finally lost his battle in the early hours of Saturday 28<sup>th</sup> May 2022, aged 80 years.

We have lost one of our most well known and highly respected walkers and walk administrators. His quiet demeanour and personal charm endeared him to us all and we will all miss him, especially come the annual LBG Carnival.

Rest easy, old mate.

\*EDITOR's NOTE: The news of Robin Whyte's death has affected people from across the Australian race walking spectrum. West Australian **Terry Jones** recalls: "My own personal friendship with Robin goes back more than 50 years, and especially the seven years I lived in Canberra, when Robin, Peter Waddell and myself trained together several times most weeks."

Dual Olympian Bob Gardiner – who raced Robin in that famous inaugural LBG 20 miles in 1967 – describes the news as "a shock and a great loss to ACT and all walking."

Peter Vysma says of Robin that he "will be sadly missed at the Canberra Carnival. I have never known the carnival without Robin. He was always at The Committee meetings and as a competitor on the day.'

A 60+ year involvement of such depth in our sport is bound to draw many such sentiments and recollections. It will not be forgotten by many that, during those rebuilding years of the early to mid-1970s, Robin Whyte stood out as one of our top national competitors. And the Lake Burley Griffin carnival alone would not have become the institution it is but for Robin's dedication over so many years. Hopefully he can be emulated. He will not be replaced.

Perfect conditions greeted the 39 walkers who fronted the starter on Saturday. Especially gratifying was the re-opening of the northern arm of the 2km course at last. While some GP structures were still in place and the road had, therefore, yet to be cleaned of mud and surface debris, a bit of broom work soon made the course usable for everyone wanting to stretch out in their search for faster times.

Taking full advantage of the absence of excessive turns was **Andrew Jamieson**, who blitzed the 10km race in **57:36** to break his own Club and Bob Gardiner's M75 AMA and VMA records ... a wonderful result from a superb athlete.

Kevin Cassidy also appreciated the longer laps to have a good 12km hit-out, while Kylie Irshad and Pramesh Prasad tested themselves out well over 10km.

In the 5km, Corey Dickson continued on his speedy way to break through for his first sub-21min time in 20:48, shaking off Marcus Wakim who settled down for his own creditable 22:22. Eden Morgan's 24:07, a 3-sec PB, won him the handicap in a competitive field.

Club treasurer **Karyn O'Neill** found the keys to the safe and dug out a handicap win for herself with **35:36**, while **Madeleine Feain** had a big PB performance to take line honours in the Women's 5km with her **25:19**.

## SPAIN: 35th Gran Premio Cantones de La Coruna, Saturday 28 May – La Coruna

Tough conditions prevailed in La Coruna, (particularly in the earlier women's race), with a notable feature being the number of DNFs in both races, as well as the comparative slowness of the times.

Best performed Aussie was **Bec Henderson** whose 12<sup>th</sup> in **1:36:47** would be her best international result to date. As an experienced triathlete, Bec has strong adaptive powers to cope with testing conditions. Close behind, **Katie Hayward's** 15<sup>th</sup> in

1:37:21 showed she could also tough it out in the heat. Clara Smith saw it through after her Muscat disappointment for a creditable 26<sup>th</sup> place. Unfortunately **Jemima Montag** had a disappointing day, stopping at 14km after being in medal contention in the first half.

A huge field of 101 started the Men's race. It was hard going for all the Aussie lads, but all eight finished, with **Declan Tingay** managing a top 30 spot in **1:23:58** for our best placing. While **Kyle Swan** would be disappointed at finishing 47<sup>th</sup>, his time was a step up from his Muscat race and is another hard hit-out under the belt with the big ones coming up. **Carl, Will Mitchell, Tyler, Dylan** and **Tim** all gained valuable experience against top competition that will stand them in good stead for the future.

## Qieyang and Martin claim race walk crowns in La Coruna

(Report by Nicola Maggio - reprinted from World Athletics website)

China's Qieyang Shenjie and Spain's Alvaro Martin captured respective 20km race walk victories at the 35th Gran Premio Cantones de La Coruña, a World Athletics Race Walking Tour Gold event, held on Saturday (28) in Spain's northwest coastal city.

While Olympic and world medallist Qieyang enjoyed an overwhelming win in 1:27:50, European champion Martin fought hard to defeat his compatriot Diego Garcia inside the closing kilometre, 1:19:58 and 1:20:00 their respective clockings.

#### Qieyang destroys all opposition

Likely due to the warm temperature at the start of the event, the women's race kicked off quite cautiously at a steady 4:28 per kilometre pace. Right from the start, six women formed a leading group: Qieyang, Australia's **Jemima Montag**, Peru's **Kimberly Garcia**, Colombia's **Sandra Arenas** and the Spanish duo of the current European champion **Maria Perez** and **Laura Garcia-Caro**.

The opening 5km was reached in 22:20 and shortly afterwards the world silver medallist Qieyang picked up her pace to cover the following two laps in 4:15, with only the Peruvian Garcia for company. Another 4:11 lap by the 31-year-old Qieyang was decisive and saw her leave Garcia well behind.

Qieyang led through half way in 43:44 and had an eight-second advantage over Garcia, herself 16 seconds ahead of Montag. Way back, local star Perez travelled 44 seconds behind the leader but 13 seconds clear of her compatriot Garcia-Caro, while Olympic silver medallist Arenas had begun to falter, already 1:25 behind Qieyang.

With the win all but secured, Qieyang eased her pace and covered the next laps in the 4:21/4:23 range, which proved to be more than enough to keep Garcia at bay. Meanwhile, Montag was a lonesome third, 41 seconds in arrears, with Perez in fourth another 20 seconds adrift. The Australian then dropped out during the 14th lap.

With 5km to go, Qieyang remained a solid leader having built a 22-second margin on Garcia. European champion Perez was a distant third, 1:16 behind the leader, while Garcia-Caro lost another full minute on her fellow Spaniard. Over the closing laps Qieyang kept on her triumphal walk, even slowing her pace to 4:28 splits but still strengthening her lead over her pursuers.

Qieyang clocked 1:27:50 at the tape to grab her second win in Cantones after her 2018 success. The Chinese athlete had a massive 48-second advantange on Garcia (1:28:38), with Perez completing the classy podium, recording a 1:29:33 performance. Arenas was never a factor and decided to drop out of the race shortly after midway.

#### Martin leads local 1-2 result

Held in much more favourable weather conditions with the temperature having dropped sharply, the men's event opened with a slow first kilometre in 4:11 but the trio of India's **Suraj Panwar**, China's **Xianghong He** and Italy's **Gianluca Picchiottino** soon began to increase their rhythm. All the favourites, such as Brazil's **Caio Bonfim** and the Spansh duo of **Martin** and **Garcia**, were in close attendance.

The 5km checkpoint was reached in a moderate 20:16, with Bonfim and Ecuador's **Brian Pintado** in the lead. The following laps didn't witness any major changes, with a large group of no less than 22 race walkers travelling together. Peru's **Cesar Rodriguez** and Bonfim were taking on most of the pacing duties, to go through half way in a moderate 40:46.

It was then that Martin and Garcia moved to the head for the first time, much to the delight of the home crowd, to walk at Bonfirm's shoulder. The 11th kilometre became the first 1000m section covered in under 4:00, which whittled down the lead group to nine: Bonfim, Rodriguez, Germany's **Christopher Linke**, the Ecuadorian trio of Pintado, **Jordy Jimenez** and David Hurtado, and the Spanish triumvirate of Martin, Garcia and Tokyo Olympics 50km fourth-place finisher **Marc Tur**. Pintado, the winner at the Rio Maior event earlier this month, seemed determined to bounce back from his recent DNF in the Madrid 10km a fortnight ago and stepped up the pace to record successive splits of 3:56 and 3:57, which proved to be too fast for Tur and Jimenez.

With the clock reading 58 minutes it was Garcia who took the lead but that was short lived and Bonfim returned to the front to go through 15km in 1:00:39. That came after a quick 3:55 lap by the leading quintet comprising the Brazilian, Hurtado, Rodriguez, Martin and Garcia.

Garcia began to push hard and it became clear that the podium would be made up by the two Spaniards and Bonfim as Hurtado and Rodriguez began to lose ground.

Following a brisk 3:52 antepenultimate lap, the closing two circuits promised to be thrilling and they really were as Martin, a fine fourth at the Tokyo Olympics, tried to break away from Garcia, but the latter didn't let his compatriot get away, the pair clocking 3:49 for the penultimate lap.

Martin led with Garcia tucked behind at the bell, but with some 700m left the 28-year-old **Martin** managed at last to get rid of Garcia to cross the finish line in **1:19:58**, a couple of seconds ahead of his rival, with Bonfim securing third place. "Major championships aside, Cantones is the best race walking event worldwide so I'm ecstatic to win here again after my 2017 victory," said Martin. "It's very nice to have two Spaniards battling for the win in front of our home crowd." Asked about his ambitions for the World Athletics Championships Oregon22, he said adamantly: "Last year at the Olympics three Spanish walkers came fourth in our respective events, so this year we'll be looking for revenge."

Martin now plans a training stint at the altitude of Sierra Nevada before travelling to Colorado three weeks prior to the World Championships to continue his build-up for Oregon, where he will be contesting the 20km event.
