FANTASTIC FOURTH FOR MONTAG AT OREGON WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Australian race walker **Jemima Montag** has achieved the fastest time by any Australian woman at a World Championships or Olympics, placing a triumphant fourth in the Women's 20km Race Walk on Day 1 of the World Athletics Championships in Oregon, USA.

The 24-year-old medicine student showed off her impressive form throughout the event, placing herself firmly in the lead pack as the starter's gun went off. While beginning her race conservatively, Montag made her presence known, moving from sixth place to fourth in the final kilometres, as she tried to keep pace with eventual gold medallist **Kimberly Garcia Leon** from Peru and China's **Shijie Qieyang**.

As Leon maintained her position throughout the 10-loop race, Polish walker **Katarzyna Zdzieblo** pushed ahead, placing Qieyang in third. Though Montag worked to close the gap between herself and Qieyang, she ultimately finished 21-seconds behind the bronze medallist in **1:28:17**.

Despite narrowly missing the podium, Montag was proud to step up from her sixth-place finish at the Tokyo Olympics to fourth, knowing that a podium finish is in sight at her next global event.

"In Little Athletics years ago, there was a saying that 'fourth sucks' and they even used to print it on t-shirts. Humans have just decided that 1-2-3 get medals and fourth is one spot away from that," Montag said.

"I think that fourth rocks, it doesn't suck.

"I've been working this year on being aggressive in the second half instead of slowly fading and I think if I had another couple of laps, I would have got that third girl but ran out of time. It feels good to slowly pick people up and grit my teeth.

"My legs were dying but when you can't walk with your legs anymore, you can walk with your heart and I had so much family on the sidelines this time which was really special after last year, with everyone missing out. They were with me every step and that made it doable."

21-year-old **Rebecca Henderson** placed 20th in the same event with a time of **1:34:38**, continuing her upward trajectory from Tokyo where she placed 38th.

In the Men's 20km Race Walk, **Declan Tingay** placed the best of an Aussie trio, consisting of himself, **Rhydian Cowley** and **Kyle Swan**, placing 17th; equal to his finish at the Tokyo Olympics last year. Although the Western Australian found himself in the lead pack until the final 5km, Tingay found himself without enough in the tank to break away from the pack, and instead fell back in the final two laps to clock 1:23:28.

(*Editor's note:* As he did in Muscat in April, Declan gave himself every chance of a podium finish, staying with the leaders until 17kms when he had to sit out 2mins in the penalty zone, ending his medal hopes. It can be an unforgiving sport, this.) Olympic 50km race walker Cowley placed 19th in the shorter distance in 1:23:37 – his best result in the event at a World

Championships, and Kyle Swan crossed the line in 1:28.43 to place 33rd

A special shout-out also for our Kiwi comrade, **Quentin Rew**. Despite his disappointment in his Oregon race, Q's better results far outweigh the poor ones in a long international career. He'll be aiming for a blinder in his last-ever race in Birmingham and we hope he gets it.

Attention now turns to the **35km**, scheduled for next Friday (women) and Sunday (men). Again, we wish **Kelly Ruddick**, **Carl Gibbons** and **Rhydian Cowley** the very best of luck and results.

Jemima Montag. Who else? For several years now Jemima has been clawing her way up the international standings, placing consistently inside or near the top 10 with ever faster times. In Eugene on Friday it was time for her to deliver competitively and – as in Sapporo last year – she did not disappoint: 4^{th} in 1:28:17, her second fastest ever.

This was easily Jemima's best result in an international championship, but to anyone who recalls her 10^{th} in the scorching desert night in Doha, followed by her 6^{th} in the Olympics 12 months ago, it will have come as no surprise. It was obvious at the Gold Coast GC in 2018 that Jemima was destined for the world stage, and we all await the day when she finally gains the major championship medal she's working so hard for. She came to within one place of it in Eugene. Budapest in 2023 – or the Paris Olympics the year after – may see her take that final step.

Congratulations, Jemima ... and good luck with your CG title defence in Birmingham.

VRWC RWA Postal Challenge, Saturday 16 July – Middle Park

Icy, gale-force winds (though, thankfully, no rain) greeted the 33 walkers who arrived at Middle Park for the Victorian edition of the RWA Postal Challenge. The conditions possibly had an effect on numbers as several who'd entered did not attend. Nevertheless, some pleasing results eventuated as those toughies who raced strove for Challenge points for the Club.

Fields were spread thinly over the age and gender groups, yet some good contests were seen. **Char Hay** took line honours in the 10km with a hard-fought **56:40**. **Pramesh Prasad** had a hearty tussle with **Madeleine Feain**, the two crossing with a bare second between them, **57:32** to **57:33**. **Grace Louey** showed she has gained strength through regular racing this year, scoring a good PB on a day not cut out for them.

Making easy work of the wind was **Geromi Tucker** who produced the biggest PB of the day, breaking through the 25min barrier for **24:49**. **Emily Smith** was another to strike out for PB territory, achieving this in the 8km with **46:35**. Geelong walker **Eva Reid** showed they breed them tough in Cat country, taking 22secs from her 5km best with **30:47**.

Damian Baldy and **Daniel Pashutin** had a good race over 3km with Damian prevailing by 8secs. **Jaida Robertson** and **Zoe Bowkett** continued on their improvement curves, while newcomer **Erlyn Singh** was a welcome addition to our field with a creditable first-up **10:27** for 1.5km.

Finally, it was a pleasant surprise to welcome back **Anand Thillaisundarem** for his first race with us for several years. It was back in 2009 that Anand first joined us and put in a full road season – his first and only – then disappeared, spirited away by his medical career. Hopefully we'll more of him in the second half of this season.

Today saw the staging of the ANSW State Teams & Individual Road Walk Championship, held at Ourimbah University, Central Coast NSW. Weather was chilly 4° at 7.30am. Max was 16° but not until after the walks were over.

The course was a 1km lap on the main Boulevard, a wide roadway which was closed to all traffic. It was received favourably by both athletes and officials.

Garcia Leon wins first medal ever for Peru

Kimberly Garcia Leon has become the first Peruvian athlete to win a medal at the World Championships by taking the win in the women's 20 km race walk with a national record of **1:26:58**. Garcia ended the dominance of Chinese athletes at these Championships which had lasted for more than ten years.

Kararzyna Zdzieblo won the silver medal setting the Polish record of 1:27:31. Shije Qieyang from China took the bronze medal in 1:27:56 ahead of Jemima Montag from Australia (1:28:17).

Four-time world champion Liu Hong from China crossed the finish-line in 1:29:00 in her first competition of the year.

Garcia broke away from the rest of the field alongside 2012 Olympic silver Qieyang Shije before the 3 km and held on to the lead until the end. Garcia and Qieyang walked side by side and went through the 10 km in 43:31. They reached 14 km just inside 1:01:00. Garcia broke away from Qieyang and built up a 18-second lead at 17 km.

The South American walker pulled away during the next lap. Zdzieblo overtook Qieyang to take the second place. Garcia clocked 4:13 in the final lap to cross the finish-line in 1:26.58, breaking the national record by 1 minute and 40 seconds.

Garcia finished third at the World Athletics Race Walking Team Championships in Muscat last March. Later this year she finished second to Qieyang in La Coruna in a national record of 1:28:38.

Kimberly Garcia: "I am very happy and proud of myself. At the 15 km, my coach instructed me to up the pace. In the last km, I gave it all to break my national record. I have dreamed of this medal since I was little. I want to dedicate it to all Peruvians. I have worked hard, hoping to achieve a good placing. It's not been easy but I am a fighter. I stayed focused on my goal to achieve a medal. I thought of that during the entire race and things worked out".

Men's 20 km walking race:

Last year's Olympic bronze medallist **Toshikazu Yamanishi** from Japan became the third walker in the history of the World Championships to successfully defend the 20 km walking race title after Italy's Maurizio Damilano (1987 and 1991) and Ecuador's Jefferson Perez (2003, 2005 and 2007).

Yamanishi clocked an impressive 3:40 split in the final km on the last of 20 circuits of the Martin Luther King Jnr Boulevard to hold off his teammate **Koki Ikeda**.

Yamanishi crossed the finish-line in 1:19:07 to repeat the world title won three years ago in Doha 2019. Ikeda, who finished second to Massimo Stano at the Olympic Games in Sapporo, won the silver medal in 1:19:14.

Toshikazu Yamanishi: "I am very gratified. It took tremendous skill and I am happy to be strong enough. Today was my day. I am happy to be the first Japanese to repeat the world title in race walking".

Koki Ikeda: "I was happy with my silver today, but I wanted more. I will come back for gold".

Perseus Karlstrom from Sweden clocked 3:41 in the last lap to win the world bronze medal in **1:19:18**, repeating the same result he achieved in the previous edition in Doha.

Samuel Gathimba, who was chasing the first medal for Kenya in the walking race in the history of the World Championships, finished fourth in 1.19:25. Pan American Games champion **Brian Pintado** took fifth place in 1:19:34 ahead of Brazil's Caio Bonfim (1:19:51).
