** WALKER OF THE WEEK **

What a week! Two back-to-back international athletics championships (the U20s in Cali, Colombia, and the Commonwealth Games in Birmingham, UK) – following on from the World titles in Eugene only a week previously – have given Australia a chance it has rarely had to showcase its best race walking talent. You can't do better than to reach an international podium, this being achieved in Birmingham by **Jemima Montag** and **Declan Tingay** who are this week's WsOTW.

Jemima had the measure of her opposition from the outset, settling in around 4th place for 4.5km before launching an attack that none came close to answering, winning with a PB of **42:34.30**. In a vivid demonstration of how an efficient, economical technique is the key to the best results in this sport, Jemima put on a clinic – for the crowd,

for the media, for her rivals, for walking newcomers and old hands alike. If those watching Jemima, particularly women and girls, responded with something like "Wow! I want to give that a go" and followed it up, that would put as much of a smile on Jemima's face as the one you see here.

If Jemima's display on Friday was an exhibition, **Declan Tingay's** turned out to be one of self-vindication against fierce opposition. Pushing aside the 'penalty zone' demons that had ruined his medal hopes in Muscat and Eugene, Dec put all his cards on the table just before the 5km mark and opened a big lead in an effort to take control of the race. It worked against everyone except **Evan Dunfee** (CAN). When the rangy Canadian pounced at the bell, Dec did everything he could to continue the contest, falling short by 6 decs to claim silver with a 19 sec PB of **38:42:33**. As in Jemima's case, one hopes that

there are boys and men out there who, having witnessed this duel, feel enough itch in their feet to want to try it themselves ... or, if they're already walkers, to do it better.

Congratulations, Jemima and Declan ... you're both a credit to us, and to the sport. Time for a good rest!

*Honourable mentions

• Olivia Sandery (SA) and Alanna Peart (VIC) – clear top-10 finishers in the WA U20 championships in Cali. Against stiff Japanese and Latin American competition, the girls stood up and gave of their very best. Alanna broke through the 48-min barrier at last for 7th in 47:47.55, while Olivia would have had a bronze medal but for the fateful 3rd red card and 1min penalty after finishing, clocking an adjusted 47:37.85 for 4th. It doesn't detract one iota from her status as one of the brightest rising stars on the athletic scene in Australia. Throw the

- likes of Allanah Pitcher (NSW), Alexandra Griffin (WA), Zoe Woods (NSW) and other up-and-comers into the mix, and the future of women's race walking in this country is bright indeed.
- Bec Henderson (VIC), Katie Hayward (QLD), Kyle Swan and Rhydian Cowley (VIC) again, for achieving national selection and presenting the sport to a worldwide audience in the green-and-gold. A special pat on the back for Rhydian, flattened by COVID on arrival in Birmingham and just making it to the track for Sunday's race. Takes more than a microscopic sea urchin to keep a Glenhuntly man down!
- Sam McCure (QLD, age 15) walked sub-50mins for the first time over 10km on Sunday in the QLD Athletics road walk championships, recording 49:34. A big future beckons.
- Will Bottle (TAS) in another fine solo effort, smashed his PB over 10km by a whopping 2:44 to record 46:48 in the Athletics Tasmania Road walking championships.

VRWC Club points races, 6 August – Middle Park

Between Friday's and Saturday night's showers, 26 walkers were treated to a window of clear, fine weather, with no wind. Just a bit of water baling needed beforehand.

With Yarra Trams carrying out work on the Light rail underpass and motor traffic having to cross our racing course to access the car park, it seemed we would be forced to use the twisty northern 1km arm for safety. This, fortunately, was not the case, and we are grateful to **888 Traffic** for their assistance in guaranteeing our walkers safe passage during their races.

Fields may have been slightly down, but the quality of the racing was up there. For the first time in several seasons, more entrants turned up for the 12km than the 10, with **Marcus Wakim** taking line honours with a strong first-up **57:22** going through the 10k in 47:32. Backing up from his WOTW effort last week, **Alejandro Stephens** was 2nd in **1:03:22**, breaking the 10k PB he set last Sunday in the process for a big handicap win. **Kylie Irshad** was another to clock her first 12km time, overcoming the last hard 3km for a good **1:15.55**.

Donna-Marie Elms and **Geromi Tucker** opted for the 10km, with **Donna-Marie** having her most satisfying result for some time with 1:05:40.

Geoff Barrow made a welcome return to the winner's circle, taking the 5km handicap with 37:26, while Mark Blackwood is on the path back to form after injury, easily taking fastest time honours for the 2½ laps with 23:54.

When the handicapper's away the mice will play, and so it was in the 3km, with all but two of the eligible starters finishing faster than their predicted times. **Amelia Vernal** had probably her best result since joining us this year, ripping 39 secs from her PB to win with **18:57**. Not to be outdone was **Havana Ali** with her own big PB (32 secs) in **16:22**. On this occasion, Havana turned the tables on **Mya McClure**, who has had the edge over her in their recent battles and only narrowly missed continuing the streak, clocking **16:24**. **Beau McKinnon**, **17:51**, was the only boy to start, but any rival who'd turned up would have been hard pressed to do better than Beau's 1:00 handicap margin. Fastest home was **Ela Uzun** with a quick **14:39**.

Levi Robertson was the sole PB setter in the 1.5km, improving by 16 secs for fastest overall with his 8:11. Sister Jaida was the quickest girl with 9:16, while Lily Bowkett took the girls' handicap in 10:04.

RULES, RULES, RULES ...

'I've been disqualified. Can I keep walking?'

Yes ... but only if:

- You've removed or covered your bib number and uniform.
- You're on a shared road or pathway, as a member of the public. (In a closed racing circuit or track, you would not be permitted to remain on the course.)
- You do not pace, obstruct or interact with competitors still in the race.
- In the opinion of the Meet director or Referee, your presence on the course is not causing interference with the efficient conduct of the event. (It's their call ... not yours.)

ENGLAND: Commonwealth Games 10,000m Race walks, 6/7 August - Birmingham

Golden day for Montag in Birmingham

Jemima Montag became a Commonwealth Games champion once more, this time surrounded by a roaring crowd for the Women's 10,000m race walk. One of Australia's strongest medal changes going into this campaign, Montag took victory with ease, as she lapped almost every competitor in the field.

An early pack of three athletes formed in the 25-lap race, with Montag on the shoulder of India's **Priyanka** and Kenya's **Emily Ngi.** But it was with 12 laps to go that Montag made her move. Creating a huge lead which only continued to grow, the gold medal became hers when she clocked 42:34.30 - a Games record and a new personal best for the 24-year-old Melbournian.

"At the last Commonwealth Games, having Nathan Deakes, one of our best, put the gold medal around my neck was a real life changing moment. It almost felt like the baton was being handed over for me to carry on the legacy," Montag said.

"Today was a different beast. I did enjoy it a lot today, mostly the crowd, and it's an extra challenge going that extra ten seconds per kilometre. I really enjoyed the opportunity to perform in front of 20,000 people today, it was incredible". Montag soaked up the atmosphere in her final lap, acknowledging the track and field fans as well as her family and friends in the grandstand. She also wore a bracelet made from a cut-down piece of a necklace once worn by grandmother, a Holocaust survivor, to remind her of her sacrifice and the perseverance of her family.

"In some of her journal entries, she wrote about trying to make it through the next hour, the next day, hoping to meet her dad at the gate with a piece of bread. (What) I think I take from that in a race, is that it is one kilometre at a time, one step at a time, not thinking about the finish line..."

"This is fun and this is something I choose to do, and yes, it's hard but someone just two generations ago had that level of strength, I know that's with me now."

Fellow Australians **Rebecca Henderson** and **Katie Hayward** took their marks at Alexander Stadium in the same event, with Henderson placing a fantastic fourth in **44:44.58** - just four seconds shy of her personal best, while Hayward clocked **46:09.51** to place seventh, after receiving a one minute penalty for losing contact with the ground on three occasions

Dunfee's last lap a knockout blow

Canada's **Evan Dunfee** left a tiny but classy field in his wake with a breathtaking last 400m surge, snuffing out the brave challenges of **Declan Tingay** (AUS) to win the Men's 10,000m race walk title at Alexander Stadium. While most Australian walking fans are familiar with Dunfee's endurance and competitiveness over 50km, we've had little chance to assess him for sheer speed up to now. On Saturday he rectified that in no uncertain terms.

Kumar and Kenya's **Samuel Gathimba** shared a cracking early pace, with Dunfee and **Amit Amit** (IND) covering them by turns and Tingay nestled in 4th place near the kerb for the first 4km. The rest of the field were soon strung out as the pace quickened, only **Callum Wilkinson** (ENG) managing to stay in touch.

In almost a carbon copy of Jemima Montag's strategy the day before, Tingay surged away at the 5km mark to open a gap of around 40m, looking strong and stylish yet unable to extend his lead further. Dunfee, Gathimba and Kumar began the job of reeling the Aussie back in, which didn't happen until 1km to go when Dunfee, who'd dropped Kumar and the Kenyan, settled at Tingay's heels and waited.

With 300m left, the long-legged Canadian struck. Launching a long, devastating sprint that set the crowd – most of whom would never have seen elite walking at all, let alone at close quarters – roaring with appreciation, Dunfee was away, the gold medal around his neck well before the home straight. His finish time of **38:36.37** set new Commonwealth and Canadian records. Tingay, for whom this would not have been unexpected, called on his remaining reserves to hold the deficit to 6 seconds for the silver, smashing his own PB in **38:42.43**. Kumar, playing his part in what has been an astonishingly successful Games for India, came home strongly to take the bronze with an Indian record time of **38:49.21**.

Next to cross was Wilkinson, saluting his home crowd after finishing a second outside his PB in 4th place. Gathimba could not go with Dunfee's chasing pace and fell back to 5th, nevertheless clocking a PB of **39:23.14**.

Kyle Swan (AUS) was unfortunate to lose a minute inside the cone castle before being released to finish 6th, ahead of **Tom Bosworth** (ENG) who has not fully recovered his form after illness this year and did well to be there. **Rhydian Cowley** was another to fall victim to sickness – COVID in his case – and an 8th place in sub 41:30 was a reasonable return under the circumstances.

Commiserations must go to New Zealand's **Quentin Rew**, who was dropped early and came under the lone walker's nightmare – unshielded judges' scrutiny. It was an unfortunate way to end an estimable career in the Black and Silver.

'Q', along with Dunfee and others, has been a vocal and consistent advocate for the retention of the 50km's international status, and endurance walkers owe him their gratitude, regardless of the outcome.

Serrano and Demir win 10,000m race walk titles on fifth morning in Cali

Mexico's **Karla Ximena Serrano** and **Mazlum Demir** of Turkey captured the 10,000m race walk titles in two exhilarating finals filled with drama on the fifth morning of action at the **World Athletics U20 Championships Cali 22** on Friday (5). Serrano claimed the women's title in a nail-biting finish against **Ai Ooyama** of Japan - the pair separated by less than a tenth of a second in a battle to the end.

Eighteen-year-old Serrano spectacularly improved her lifetime best in the process by almost two and half minutes to **46:24.35**, while Ooyama – aged only 16 – made a superb track debut, following an impressive 45:19 on the roads recently. Her Japanese teammate **Ayane Yanai** initially finished in fourth place but the 18-year-old was upgraded to the bronze medal position following Australia's **Olivia Sandery's** one-minute penalty for making three technical mistakes in the race - Yanai clocking **46:43.07** to her rival's **47:37.85**.

The 19-year-old **Sandery** finished fifth in March's World Athletics Race Walking Team Championships in Muscat and registered a fine 45:24.1 personal best in January – the fastest time in the world this year – so missing a medal will come as a disappointment to the Australian athlete.

Ukraine's 18-year-old **Valeriya Sholomitska** – fourth in this event in the 2021 World Athletics U20 Championships in Nairobi and also fourth in Muscat – was timed at **47:40.67** for fifth. Since fleeing her home country earlier this year, she has been training and racing in different locations around the world.

"I was expecting this win, we always come in positive and I completely trust in my skills. We came in prepared," said Serrano. "The last few seconds of the race were so hard, I thought I was going to come second and honestly, I don't know where that finish came from, it was amazing.

"We have had some Mexican teammates winning this season so today, we didn't have an easy assignment, we had pressure on us because they led a road for all of us coming next. I just thought, if all Latin-Americans are supporting me, then I have to give them an amazing performance, and so I did. Also, I felt really good on Cali's track and the people here are warm and so nice."

In the men's race, **Demir** – who led for several kilometres at the World Race Walking Team Championships before fading and eventually finishing 11th – lived up to his billing as the fastest man in the field to comfortably claim the 25-lap win.

Six weeks after walking to a 40:42.09 national U20 record, the 18-year-old improved on his sixth-place finish from Nairobi to grab the gold medal in 42:36.02, as Algeria's Ismail Benhammouda, 19, collected the silver with 42:42.49.

Demir's compatriot, **Hayrettin Yildiz**, narrowly claimed the bronze medal with a tight finish against **Oussama Farhat** of Tunisia - the 18-year-old crossing the line in **43:07.95** to the 17-year-old's **43:20.84** lifetime best.

Colombia's big hope **Mateo Romero** was heartbreakingly sent to the 'sin bin' with only 500m remaining, losing his medal position to eventually finish 12th in 44:21.40, as Kenya's **Heristone Wanyonyi** – the surprise winner of this title in Nairobi last year – was disqualified.

"Coming here as a world leader, I was used to this but I managed my stress and became a world champion," said Demir. "And my training partner and my teammate is on the podium. It's a great honour for my country, because we made history. We've never had two medallists in one event. We came here fit and managed to get two medals."
